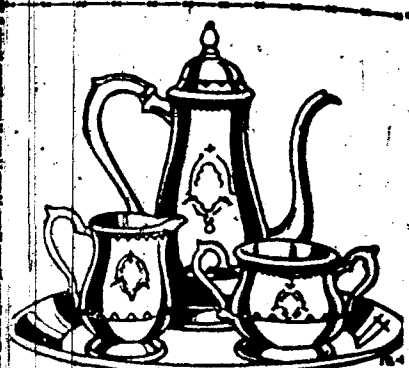

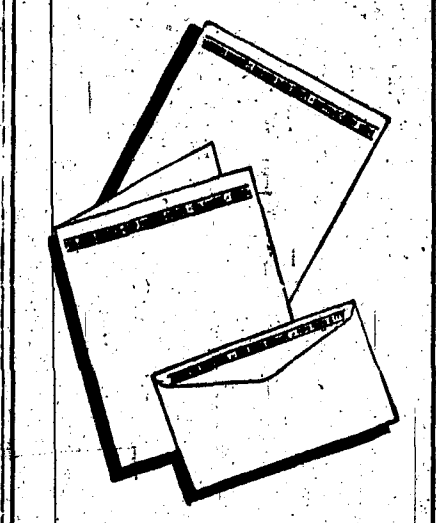
## Stag Day Draws Large Crowd to Biltmore Course
