

## B. H. S. Prepares for Cage Tilts; Stores Moleskins

The old moleskins have been stored away in the mothballs for the winter and the basketball season has been taken down from the shelf in preparation for another basketball season. Coach Clark issued a call for cashmere last week and was nearly killed in the wash. There were so many of them on deck that they had to be taken down to go into the gymnasium. With the opening game less than two weeks away it was seen necessary to do considerable weeding out of "Zoo League" material. At present there are still twenty-five moleskins left on the stand.

If numbers alone made championship basketball teams, Barrington could be polished to a shine in the trophy case; but a few other factors must be considered. There is a great deal of veteran material to begin the season with. Only two of last year's regulars, Captain Grabenhorst and Bennett, are available, and the captain has suddenly developed an interest in football and his future prospects are very much in doubt. Willets is the only other player who has played on the first string last year. The remainder of the team will have to be picked up from last year's seconds and from some of the newcomers. The freshmen are to have a separate team this year if Coach Clark's plans materialize and they will get their experience playing freshmen teams from neighboring schools.

A schedule of nineteen games has been arranged with nine of them to be played on the home ground. Season tickets for these nine double-headers will be offered to the general public at two dollars each, which means each game cost about ten cents apiece. A two dollar ticket will be an investment which will bring in returns in the form of many enjoyable evenings this winter. It is claimed that they will be on sale at the ticket window.
