"The Art of Papermaking"

"The Art of Papermaking" by Veronica Potter is the next program in the popular Members Present Art Series sponsored by The Barrington Community Associates of The Art Institute of Chicago. The program will be on Tuesday, March 6, 1 PM, at the Barrington Public Library, 505 N. Northwest Highway.

Paper is made from the cellulose found in plant fibers or from recycled papers. There are basically two methods of making a sheet of paper—the Dip Method and the Pour Method-both requiring a mould and a deckle. The mould is a screen stretched over a wooden frame. The deckle is an open frame that prevents the pulp from running off the mould while the sheet is forming and gives the "deckled edge" to handmade paper.

Ear Candling... One Ear at a Time

The low flame of the wick creates a slow vacuum, which softens and pulls the old wax into the base of the candle. When the candle has burned down sufficiently, one can then examine the base of the candle to see just what was in the ear.

Theoretically, such effects are possible because all the passages in the head are interconnected, allowing the candles to drain the entire system osmotically through the membrane of the ear. Ear Candling also acts as a catalyst to clear out debris accumulated on nerve endings. This allows for clear vibrational flow to the corresponding area of the mind, body and spirit. This clears the way for other methods of healing.

Infection Control and Your Dental Visit

Some people are so concerned about contracting the HIV or AIDS virus and other diseases that they are avoiding dental visits and neglecting their oral health. Dentists are frequently silent about the infection control methods in their office because they think bringing up the subject will worsen a patient's fears. If you have any doubts, ask your dentist about his infection control procedures. He should willingly discuss them with you.

The Center for Disease Control has set up what are termed Universal Precautions to be used by all staff involved in patient care. These precautions include the use of gloves, masks, needles, saliva ejectors and other items that are disposed of after each

Instruments which are not disposable are sterilized with high heat or gas sterilization. In our office, dental instruments are kept in cassettes. These cassettes are first immersed in a large ultrasonic cleaner to remove debris and then rinsed and transferred to the autoclave for high-heat 381-4040.



Making Assumptions

about what someone is thinking or about what someone is doing or about why they are behaving in a certain way? If you are like most other people, the likelihood is pretty good that occasionally you do that.

Have you ever considered what message that gives to the other party who you made the assumption about? Or have you ever considered that there is more than a 90% chance that your assumption is actually inaccurate? Lastly, have you ever stopped to think about the damage that assumptions can do to relationship health?

One of the largest relationship pitfalls that people find themselves in is "guessing" what is going on in the mind of the other person. The impact to both parties is great if you play out the damage. For instance, when you assume something about the other person, you are actually taking away his or her right to communicate what is really going on for them. This can feel disrespectful for that person, certainly not endearing you to him. When you figure that you "know" what is going

How often do you make an assumption on in the mind of the other, your actions or words will reflect that "assumed" knowledge. If you are wrong, which in most cases you are, then your attitude toward that person will be incongruent or inappropriate to the situation. A misunderstanding occurs, or worse yet, a blowout happens-both of which could have been avoided by asking the person what was going on with him or her in that situation. Hurt, anger and frustration are three very common outcomes of making the mistake of assuming you know what is in the mind of another person without checking it out with him for accuracy.



Tips from the Top

Today's very tricky stock market brought a long awaited call from my friend, Napoleon. This was his first call for the year 2001. Napoleon invests heavily in stocks, so I was curious as to how his portfolio was faring. Napoleon told me that by the end of 2000, the stock market's performance had been the most disastrous for investors in a decade.

Napoleon and I discussed the article written by David Lereah, Chief Economist of the National Association of Realtors, in which he wrote that the Bush Administration and his economic advisors would offer short-term policies directed toward lowering interest rates and stimulating consumer demand. Mr. Lereah stated, "The good news (for the housing market) is that the Fed has lowered the Federal Funds rate by one-half of a percentage point, providing a needed boost to homebuying.'

One thing David Lereah mentioned in his article about the Bush tax cut proposal which is positive—the labor force will take home larger paychecks hence stimulating consumer spending. However, he warned, "Lower taxes could do some harm to the bond markets." So the big question is, where should people invest?

The answer is real estate!

I am very surprised that financial planners do not talk to their clients about investing in real estate. When you consider the leveraging factor (down payment vs. purchase price) as well as the tax benefits (Uncle Sam's contribution), real estate makes a great investment.

Napoleon hadn't considered the return on investment until we talked about his home. He bought his home seven years ago for \$225,000, putting down the standard 20%. Napoleon and his family moved into their dream home for \$45,000? In 2001, Napoleon's home is now worth \$400,000. Napoleon thought he would only make \$175,000 profit, which to him was disappointing. However, when we analyzed it, Napoleon actually made \$355,000 (\$400,000 - \$45,000), a return on investment of almost 900%! Since Napoleon had paid off his mortgage, the 900% was his. Wow! Napoleon was impressed.

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
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
