Protecting Your Legal Rights— Independent Contractor or Employee?

With few exceptions, employment laws apply only to employees and not to independent contractors. Federal and state laws vary regarding the criteria to legally determine whether an individual is considered an independent contractor or an employee. Generally, an independent contractor is an individual that performs services free from the direction and control by the company with regard to both the manner and method that the work is performed. The determination is important since, unlike an employee, an independent contractor is not eligible for overtime pay, benefits, unemployment or workers' compensation benefits. Moreover, an independent contractor is exempt from protection under Title VII and the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, which protects employees from employment discrimination.

To clarify the relationship, the individual and the business should have a contract which defines the independent contractor relationship. Such an agreement should state that the contractor is not an agent or employee of the company and that the contractor has the sole discretion to determine when, during what hours and where the work will be performed. Additionally, the contract should specify the amount of compensation to be paid for the services performed and provide that the independent contractor will invoice the business for those services. Importantly, the agreement should specify that the independent contractor will be responsible for the payment of all taxes. To better protect the contractor and the


Because the designation of an individual as independent contact has significant legal consequences for the individual and the business, the relationship should be carefully analyzed and a contract should be prepared which details the terms of the relationship. Of course, the best time to determine the legal effect of the relationship is before the commencement of work. As such, it is highly advisable to consult with an attorney to analyze the proposed relationship and to prepare a valid and enforceable independent contractor agreement. "We specialize in fillings, bonding, braces, bleaching, extractions, gum surgery, veneers, crowns, nitrous oxide, implants, dentures, partials, root canals." The ad was for a single practitioner that was trying to market his practice to a broad consumer base. It reminded me of my dental school days, because we were all required to do the things mentioned in the ad. What we didn't realize then is that we all knew a little about a lot.

When a dentist graduates school and gets his license, he is allowed to perform any of the above mentioned procedures. As he continues to practice, he discovers what procedures he is best at. These are typically the ones that he enjoys most. He may choose to go back to school in order to become a specialist in the area that he enjoys. Many dental schools offer twoto-four-year specialty programs that graduates or practicing dentists can attend and learn more about the procedures they are interested in. Upon graduation, they receive a specialty license and are required to limit their practice to their specialty. Plastic Surgery and People's Fears

Many people think and talk about getting plastic surgery for years but fear prevents them from taking that final step and actually carrying through with it. Their concerns are understandable, and undergoing surgery is certainly not something to be taken lightly. Yet many of these fears can be eased with a little more knowledge and some accurate information.

Fear of the Results

A facelift is probably the procedure most feared by patients. One concern they have is that a facelift won't look natural; nobody wants to look pulled or too tight. The goal is to look refreshed and not as if surgery was performed. So how is this accomplished? Rather than depending on The fear of post-operative pain prevents extensive skin undermining and pulling as is commonly done, we use a less invasive technique that depends more on tightening the deeper layers beneath the skin. This lifts and tightens the skin in a more natural way, distributing the tension from beneath the skin rather than directly from the incisions. 

Peterson Says Governor's Priorities Off Track

State Senator Bill Peterson (R-Long Grove) says the fiscal year 2006 budget reflects another year of shortchanging pension deals in order to fund state operations.

Governor Rob Blagojevich presented his third budget address to the General Assembly recently. Much like last year, the governor is offering tax and fee hikes while increasing spending and ignoring pension funding. Some of his new initiatives include imposing a 75-cent cigarette tax increase, a tax on computer software, diverting money from specially allocated state funds to use for educational purposes and expanding FamilyCare.

Governor Blagojevich is further cutting the state's pension obligation to future employees as a way of reducing the \$2 billion projected budget deficit.

The governor is finding creative ways to avoid adhering to the 1995 pension law," said Peterson. "He is projecting overly optimistic estimates of the pension savings and spending the \$800 million on his administration.

Actual savings in fiscal year 2006 for the changes the governor endorses would be much lower than his \$800 million. Actual savings are estimated at less than \$75 to \$100 million. These front-loaded "savings" may relieve some of the governor's current financial pressures, but his forecasts dressing these issues.

provide no solid protection against future benefit changes. There is no guarantee that the savings will ever materialize. Their existence assumes the courts bless the proposed reforms, which are expected to be challenged as unconstitutional diminishments of pension benefits.

This is the same pattern of irresponsible spending behavior the General Assembly witnessed with his bonding; future governors and legislators are left to deal with the shortfall, while future children and grandchildren are left with the bill.

'This is about more than funding pensions; it is about employing a sound fiscal policy that can include future accountability and protection," said Peterson. "While I applaud the governor's recognition of the crisis at hand, I fear it is translucent."

Illinois ranks last in the nation for funding pensions, with approximately \$40 billion more in liabilities than assets. The governor laments this problem, but is still not fully funding the system.

"His priorities fall in quick fixes to a longterm budget jam," said Peterson.

The General Assembly now has the opportunity to scrutinize over the governor's proposed blueprint and impose its priorities on the administration. The Senate Republican caucus looks forward to ad-

Gum Recession—What Does it Mean?

Exposed roots are the result of gum recession, not the natural aging process. There are many factors that contribute to a receding gumline. 

Want to Revitalize Your Outdoor Living Area? Here are Four Easy Tips to Get You Started:

• Clean Up Your Act—Remove all leaves and debris from your beds and lawn areas. If you never got around to trimming or pruning your shrubs at the end of last season, you may consider doing this prior to debris removal.

• Get Crabby—Want to prevent that pesky crabgrass from popping up everywhere this year? The key is to apply a fertilizer with pre-emergent crabgrass control. The ideal time for application is based on temperature, but the general rule is that when you see the Forsythia (yellow flowering shrub) starting to bloom, it's time, typically around mid-April.

· Live on the Edge-One of the easiest ways to improve the overall look of your landscaping is to edge tree rings and plant beds. For a professional look, make sure that tree rings are uniform circles and that the bed lines are smooth and flowing curves. A sharp spade shovel is just the tool for cutting a definitive edge.

• TuMULCHuous Plant Beds-Tree and shrub beds should be replenished with mulch every one or two years. Recommended mulch depth is about three inches. Perennial, ground cover and annual areas should have one-to-two inches of compost. Mulch and compost help plants retain moisture throughout the growing season.

Daria Sapp Receives Citizens for Conservation's William H. Miller Conservation Award

the William H. Miller Conservation Award, to Daria Sapp.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the award that honors CFC founder and longtime president Bill Miller and recognizes outstanding contributions toward conservation in the Barrington area.

In presenting the award, CFC board member Patsy Mortimer spoke of how Sapp had started her conservation work with Citizens for Conservation.

"[Daria] has gone on to share her interest, knowledge and enthusiasm with many other organizations in the Barrington area," said Mortimer. "She is someone to whom every Thursday is a conservation day as well as any other day it takes to get the job done.'

Mortimer continued. "She was on the CFC's Prairie Committee in the mid-80s and helped make the momentous decision to recreate a prairie on the old farmland, which is now known as Grigsby Prairie. She initiated CFC's restoration program, now a model among restoration programs, by organizing a group of callers, including herself, to call all CFC members to collect seed three times a week-Thursday, Saturday and Sunday-in the fall of 1986. This schedule continues for CFC restoration workers today. She was on the CFC board of directors over five years, serving as restoration chairman and vice president.

"At about the same time, she became steward of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County's Spring Creek Nature Preserve, but only the 500 high-quality acres immediately south of Lake-Cook Road. Often, she worked alone, clearing brush from overgrown areas that became beautiful prairies, sometimes revealing fields of

> "In 1992, she transferred her Thursday morning restoration focus to Stillman Nature Center, working with a small group of volunteers to create seven acres of prairie there. She also started a small prairie next to the Barrington Hills Village Hall.

> "She continued to support CFC preserves, manning her brush clearing machine for a group of volunteers who wanted to work Thursdays during the winter to clear brush encroaching on the Wagner Fen island in Tower Lakes, allowing rare fen plants like grass-pink orchids and beaked spike rush to bloom again.

> 'As a member of the Garden Clubs of Illinois, she started one of the first environmental schools in the country in Springfield in the '90s, bringing the school to the Chicago area the next year. Certified environmental consultants are now available to lead garden club tours throughout Illi-

"Today," continued Mortimer, "she continues her conservation work at Stillman, on BACOG's Water Resources Committee and League of Women Voters of the Barrington Area's recycling survey and as founder of a group, the Not-At-Home Prairie Companions, who expand their appreciation of natural areas by visiting different Chicago area prairies to see the first pasqueflowers in March, through the waving prairie grasses in October.

'She has doggedly worked to further natural area restoration in the Barrington area for 20 years, both as a leader and a hands-in-the-dirt worker," Mortimer con-




