Protecting Your Legal Rights— Pursuing a Claim of Discrimination

In order to pursue a claim of employment discrimination in federal court, the law requires that within a specified time frame the charge of discrimination be filed either with the federal or state administrative agency. The federal administrative agency is the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (or EEOC), and the Illinois state agency is the Illinois Department of Human Rights (or IDHR). 

employee may file a charge of discrimination with the EEOC against an employer with at least 15 employees for actions under Title VII (race, religion, national origin and gender) and the Americans with Disabilities Act and 20 or more employees under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act. In the IDHR, an employee may file a charge against an Illinois employer with 15 or more employees or as few as one or more persons if a charge alleges discrimination on the basis of physical, mental or perceived disability or sexual harassment.

In either agency, after the charge is filed and if both parties agree, the charge may be submitted to mediation for possible resolution. Participation in mediation is voluntary and confidential. If the mediation is unsuccessful, then the charge is investigated. If the investigation results in a finding that a violation has occurred with regard to one or all of the allegations, the employer and the charging party will be informed of the findings in a letter of determination that explains the finding. Thereafter, the agency will attempt to redevelop a remedy for the discrimination. ton Area Professional Women.

Whether or not the agency finds a violation, after the agency issues a Notice of Right to Sue, a lawsuit may be filed in federal court. In federal court, potential relief for violations may include back pay, hiring, promotion, reinstatement and/or front pay. Remedies may also include the payment of compensatory and punitive damages as well as attorney's fees and court





Art Associates to View Works by Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec

Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec (1864-1901) is considered one of the most enigmatic artists of the late-19th century. Influenced more by Degas than Manet, Lautrec found inspiration in the artificial world of public dances and the theatre rather than the more quiescent rhythms of the countryside. He discovered the avant garde society which frequented Montmartre, an area north of central Paris, that provided him with colorful images which were glamorous and tantalizing. Always the observer, Lautrec focused almost exclusively on the human being, to attitude and faces; his asymmetrical compositions with bold patterns of line and color reflect his astute character analysis.

The Art Institute of Chicago began assembling Lautrec's vibrant paintings and posters in the early 1920s and today boasts one of the most extensive collections in the world. To showcase works by Lautrec and other 19th century artists, the museum is presenting an exhibition entitled "Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre."

Barrington Associates members desiring more information about the artist are encouraged to attend the fall Membership Tea on Sept. 8. Laura Mueller will present an enlightening discussion of the highly anticipated exhibit. On Wednesday, Sept. 21, the Barrington Associates of the Art Institute will sponsor a bus trip to the Art Institute for a self-guided tour of the Toulouse-Lautrec exhibition. rington was recently awarded the Bonnylin Woods Martin Medal for "the most consistently innovative flower designs." The national award was presented at The Garden Club of America's Annual Meeting in Kansas City, Kan.

A national medal is a rare honor. In the 80-year history of The Garden Club of Barrington, a member of The Garden Club of America, only two other national medals have ever been awarded: one to Mrs. Robert C. Work in 1958 for conservation education and one to Mrs. Austin Zimmerman in 1971 for her achievements in botany. During the same period, garden club members earned over 103 major regional, state and show awards.





"The eyes are the windows to the soul!" Eyes are one of the most expressive features we have and reveal a lot about us. Subtle changes in their appearance let people know if we are happy, sad, well rested, or tired. We are able to "read" people and at the same time be "read" by others through our eyes. These are some of the reasons that a large portion of the cosmetics industry is devoted to enhancing the appearance of our eyes; through makeup, anti-aging and rejuvenating creams. Cosmetic companies realize that a first step in improving our looks is to improve the look of our eyes.

How Do the Eyes Change as We Age?

The effects of aging are usually seen first in our eyes. As we get older the skin of the upper eyelid tends to increase and become redundant. This can hide the smooth skin just above the eyelashes where women wear eyeshadow. If enough excessive skin forms, it can actually hang over the eyelashes and obstruct vision. There can also be bulging of fat from behind the eyelid, causing a fullness or discreet bulge in the middle corner of the evelid

In the lower eyelids the first sign of aging normally seen is a bulging of the orbital fat creating the puffiness most people refer to as "bags". This is caused by a relaxation of the septum, a membrane beneath the eyelid muscles, which allows the fat of the eyesocket to bulge out beneath the skin. This relaxation is a normal consequence of aging but can occur in young people as a family trait. As pressure is applied to the closed eye one can see this bulge increase. Excess skin of the lower eyelid can also form but not usually to the same degree as in the upper lid.

What Can Surgery Accomplish?

In the upper eyelid excess skin is removed to allow a smooth contour when the eye is gently closed. When the eye opens this results in a normal crease approximately 7mm above the lash line. Excess fat, if present, is removed with the skin to reduce the fullness of the upper this after the second postoperative day.

evelid. The incision line is closed precisely at the crease to hide it during the healing process. Eyelid skin heals very rapidly. Special techniques are used in Asian eyes and selected others to create a more prominent crease.

In the lower eyelid an incision is made just beneath the lashes or in selected patients on the inside of the lower eyelid. The excess fat, which is contained in three separate compartments, is then removed. Any excess skin is removed taking care not to place too much tension on the lower eyelid.

An upper and lower blepharoplasty can be performed together or in combination with other facial rejuvenation procedures such as a facelift or rhinoplasty. The eyelids can also be improved in certain individuals with chemical peeling and/or brow lifting. The need for these are determined at the preoperative consultation.

Where is Surgery Performed?

Eyelid surgery is most often performed in our office surgical suite, however if preferred, surgery can be performed at a number of different hospitals or ambulatory surgery centers in the area.

What is the Recovery Period?

Dissolving sutures are used in the lower eyelids and do not have to be removed. Nonabsorbing sutures are normally used in the upper eyelids and are removed on the fifth postoperative day. Makeup can be worn the day following suture removal and most people return to work at this time. There can be swelling of the eyes for one to two days following the operation which might interfere with vision so we recommend not driving until the swelling is down. After this most people can easily be out in public with sunglasses. Any bruising that occurs fades in the first 7 to 10 days. Makeup can conceal







Gum Recession—What Does it Mean?





Chemotherapy and Oral Health

by James T. Gavrilos, DDS

Cancer patients being treated with chemotherapy may develop serious oral problems from the side effects of chemotherapeutic drugs. These drugs kill healthy as well as cancerous cells; and when the salivary glands are damaged, a decrease in saliva leads to a dry mouth.

Dry mouth is unpleasant. It is frequently associated with a change in taste. The decrease in saliva can contribute to an increase in cavities and gum disease; and, in severe cases, associated pain may make the normal functions of eating and talking very difficult. A burning, swollen and peeling tongue may actually make it necessary to decrease or even stop the cancer

Prevention of or minimizing these oral problems during chemotherapy starts with establishing and maintaining excellent oral health. It is important to see your dentist at least two weeks before chemotherapy begins or as soon as possible if treatment has started. A complete exam may avoid dental infections which can upset the cancer treatment schedule. Patients with dentures must be sure of a proper fit with no denture sores. Your dentist can help you establish a proper level of oral health.

Here is a list of additional preventive measures from the National Institute of Health:

Avoid!

- Frequent snacks containing sugar, which contributes to cavities
 - Toothpicks



- Tobacco products
- · Alcohol (including mouthwashes that contain it)

Remember to...

- · Choose healthy foods that are easy to chew and swallow
- Take small bites; chew slowly; and sip liquids with meals
- Eat soft, moist foods; soften your food with gravy, sauces, broth, yogurt or other
 - Drink a lot of water
 - Suck (do not chew) ice chips
- · Call your doctor when your mouth hurts and work actively with your doctor

Proper oral hygiene instruction, custom prescription fluoride application trays and saliva substitution products are some of the other aids provided by your dentist and dental hygienist. New Legislation Shields IRAs from Bankruptcy Proceedings

On April 20, President Bush signed into ditionally, a nonspouse beneficiary of an will broaden IRA protection from bank-ruptcy proceeedings once the act becomes effective. The act provides bankruptcy protection for IRA assets held in both traditional and Roth IRAs from bankruptcy creditors. The protection provided by the holders regardless of which state they reside in. (In certain states, the bankruptcy protection is broader than that provided by the act, and residents of those states can still use those protections.) For nonrollover IRA accounts, the act limits the exemption to \$1,000,000. Eligible rollovers are protected from bankruptcy without any dollar limitation. The \$1,000,000 limitation applies only to traditional or Roth IRAs and does not affect SEPs, one-person plans.

With this greater protection from bankruptcy, it may make sense to roll assets now from a qualified plan to an IRA to receive greater investing flexibility. Paris Sizzles in the Summer at The Art Institute— "Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre"

Le Moulin Rouge, Le Chat Noir, The Can-Can, Wine, Women, Song, Thrill Seekers!

The bohemian life of Paris makes for a summer that sizzles in Chicago!

"Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre" has recently opened at The AM Institute of Chicago. This provocative exhibition tells the lively story of bohemian Paris at the end of the 19th century—with its artists, cafés, dance halls and underworld denizens. On view now through Oct. 10, the exhibition will look at the magnificently seamy world of the vibrantly creative Montmartre District through the work of the great Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec and his contemporaries from Degas to Picasso.

"Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre"

This summer, visitors to The Art Institute of Chicago will have the enticing opportunity to stroll the streets of late-19th century Paris and experience life on the wild side in "Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre"-meeting the bohemian thrillseekers of Parisian nightlife and the celebrities of the dance halls, the cafés and the circus. Co-organized by the Art Institute and the National Gallery, Washington, D.C.—where it has been a popular and a critical smash success—the exhibition brings together more than 250 works from collections worldwide by the ever-popular Toulouse-Lautrec as well as a broad range of his fellow artists and Montmartre neighbors.

Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec (1864-1901) is one of the more fascinating figures in

the history of art. Known today as chronicler of the late 19th century Parisian demimonde, his famous paintings and posters embody our picture of that dynamic, creative era. The ambivalent glamour and creative decadence of Toulouse-Lautrec's Montmartre is the subject of this major exhibition of 250 works of art, primarily by Lautrec, that have been brought together from public and private collections worldwide. These works comprise an extraordinary range of media, representing both high and low culture: paintings, drawings, posters, prints, sculptures, zinc silhouettes from the Chat Noir cabaret shadow plays, and such fascinating cultural relics as illustrated invitations, song sheets, advertisements and admission tickets.

Taking Montmartre—the enclave on a hill that was the site of the brothels, cafés and music halls the artist adored—as both a state of mind and an environment, the exhibition presents Toulouse-Lautrec's work alongside that of his contemporaries. This supporting cast includes not only such famous names as Edgar Degas, Vincent van Gogh and Pablo Picasso, but also such lesser-known figures as Louis Anquetin, Théophile Steinlen and Ramón Casas—artists who also captured the spirit of the age. Seeing Toulouse-Lautrec in this wider context allows viewers to not only experience a magnificent selection of great works of art but to appreciate anew the worldview of fin-de-siècle Paris, so markedly different from that of the earlier impressionist generation.

The exhibition will focus on several





What is Elder Abuse?

Elder abuse is a term referring to any negligent act by a caregiver or any other person that causes harm or a serious risk of harm to a vulnerable adult.

Elder Abuse does not discriminate. Elder abuse can affect people of all ethnic or economic backgrounds. It can affect men or women. An elder abuse victim may be your neighbor, friend or family member.

Is Elder Abuse Only Physical?

Illinois law defines abuse, neglect and exploitation as:

- · Physical Abuse—Inflicting physical pain or injury upon an older adult
- · Sexual Abuse—Sexual activity with an older adult when the older person is unable to understand, unwilling to consent, threatened or physically forced
- Emotional Abuse—Verbal assaults, threats of abuse, harassment or intimida-
- Confinement—Restraining or isolating an older person other than for medical us/aging.

- · Passive Neglect-The caregiver's failnecessities
- Willful Deprivation—Willfully denying an older person medication, medical care, shelter, food, a therapeutic device or other physical assistance
- Financial Exploitation—The misuse or withholding of an older person's resources by another

Anyone who suspects that an older person is being mistreated by someone should call the Department on Aging's Senior HelpLine at 1-800-252-8966 (voice and TTY) from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.
