
From the Democratic Republic of Congo (formerly Zaire), Angola and the Republic of Congo, you'll see sculpted figures, masks, musical instru-




Breathtaking Exhibition of Central African Art Comes to the Art Institute


Visitors to The Art Institute of Chicago have a rare opportunity to see 125 breathtaking works of art from Central Africa, brought to the United States for the first time in the exhibition Masterpieces from Central Africa: Selections from the Belgian Royal Museum for Central Africa, Tervuren. Drawn entirely from the renowned collection of the Tervuren Museum (as it is popularly called) near Brussels, Masterpieces from Central Africa is a celebration of the art of the diverse region known as Central Africa and of the vision of the artists from many different cultures who created it.

On view now through March 14, 1999, Masterpieces from Central Africa brings together works of great beauty, subtlety and power from the Democratic Republic of Congo (formerly Zaire) and neighboring portions of Angola and the Republic of Congo. These masterpieces-including sculpted figures, masks, seats, neckrests, staffs, bowls, cups, musical instruments, royal regalia and ceremonial weaponsbring forth images that range from naturalistic portrayals of humans and animals to fantastic composite beings and abstract motifs.

Most of the works on view were made in the Democratic Republic of Congo during the late 19th or early 20th centuries. These masterpieces display both striking

forms and inventive combinations of materials. Masks offer a stunning range of styles, from an elegantly lifelike Yombe face mask to others that are powerfully abstract. Figures include delicate, naturalistic renderings, as well as those, like a nail-studded nkisi nkonde figure, that are lavered with medicinal substances to imbue them with spiritual force. The nails were driven into the figure to activate its power against wrongdoers. Similarly, another figure is bound in cloth, knotted fiber and padlocks, a visual metaphor for keeping problems at bay. Many of the artworks combine figural representation with utility in unexpected and symbolic ways. A Mangbetu box has the softly rounded legs and beautiful head of a woman, while a Luba stool is supported by a standing female figure.

Central Africa

An expansive region that straddles the equator, Central Africa extends more than 1,000 square miles, from the Atlantic Ocean to the Great Lakes (Tanganyika, Victoria, etc.) with the Congo River, which has supported and transported people for centuries, arcing upward from the coast into the region's northern reaches. Historically, the rainforest area near the equator has been sparsely populated and politically decentralized. The grassland to the south, however, have invited settlement,



Prospective singers should prepare one song of their choice; the selection need not be from the classical repertoire. An accompanist will be provided, free of charge. Singers should have a basic giving rise to dense populations and centralized states, including the Kongo, Kuba and Luba kingdoms.

In the 15th century, trade between Europeans and communities on the Atlantic coast was established, effecting regional economic and political systems. In the 18th and 19th centuries, the slave trade had a profound impact on the region, sending tens of thousands of Central Africans to the Americas. In 1884, what is today the Democratic Republic of Congo was declared the private property of King Leopold II of Belgium. Eventually, after increasing international protest arose against the cruelty of the King's reign, the Belgian government assumed control of the territory in 1908. Harsh and exploitative, colonial rule brought great hardships and, in 1960, mounting protest forced Belgium to grant independence to the country. Since then, political strife and more recently, civil war, have continued to ravage the nation. Amid these difficulties, some artistic practices have lost their relevance. But others thrive as individuals continue to blend traditional practice with contemporary experience.


The Royal Museum for Central Africa The Royal Museum for Central Africa was founded in 1897-98 by King Leopold II. Its first exhibition, part of the Brussels International Exposition, was intended to

high school, college, church or synagogue, or a community chorus. Brief vocal exercises and sight-singing will be included in the audition.

The second half of the Elgin Choral Union's 1998-99 concert season includes performances of Mozart's Requiem with the Elgin Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Robert Hanson; Brahms' Alto Rhapsody with the New Philharmonic: and Beethoven's Missa Solemnis. In addition, the

promote commercial and public interest in Belgium's new colony in the Congo River Basin. In 1910, when the permanent museum building opened, the collection already included more than 30,000 objects. Like other ethnographic museums of the colonial era, the Tervuren Museum bought or acquired objects from European merchants, travelers, colonial representatives and missionaries who had obtained them in a variety of ways. Often, objects associated with ritual or political power were taken by force or coercion; others were gained by purchase or gift, or because they had been discarded. From its inception, the Tervuren Museum also sent scientific missions to Central Africa, thus becoming the primary center for research on all aspects of the area.

When the Congo region won independence in 1960, the Tervuren Museum forged a supportive relationship with the former colony; during the 1970s, for example, the museum helped to return more than 700 objects to the Institut des Musées Nationaux du Zaire. Today, the museum is renowned for its dedication to field research and cooperative work with foreign students, scholars and institutions, particularly those from the Democratic Republic of Congo. Ironically, as the brutal realities of colonization indelibly altered the lives of Africans, the collections of museums such as the Tervuren became an invaluable factor in the preservation of the cultural history and the rich artistic legacy of Central Africa.

Once again, the holiday season reminds us of the visual riches afforded by fresh plant material in the house. Evergreens, which we may scarcely notice outside, impress us indoors with the loveliness of their texture, myriad hues of green and the surprising designs they produce with nearby objects.

Flower arrangers know well the satisfactions that come with fresh foliage and flowers. The woman who can take a sprig of this, a stem of that and a blossom or two and make them into something that pleases her has more than "home decor" at her fingertips. She has a hobby that offers fun, challenge and creative outlets for as long as she lives.

During 1999, opportunities for the novices to develop skills in flower arranging will be offered by the Council of Barrington Garden Clubs. Open to all women of our area, each class is a series of either two or three sessions. The two-part introductory class conveys the "how-to" knowledge of plant material that underlies any successful "arranging". In subsequent series, students learn design principles which permit them to critique their work and pinpoint changes which could produce a more pleasing result.

The instructor for the three classes planned to date is an expert both in floral artistry and in educating others on these skills. For nine years, Joyce Grattoni has been teaching classes in floral design at Harper College. As manager of the Flower Shop there, she has the additional knowledge of what the commercial world offers-both in international plant material



How to Choose a Dance School for Your Child

Performing Opportunities-As dance is a performing art, it is imperative that the students get the chance to dance for an audience. However, a good school should stress education and not detract from that for the sake of performing. A fancy costume will never cover up poor dancing!

Tuition-Do some comparison shopping as to class rates. Classes should be competitively priced but one should not think that the cheapest class means more for your money. As with everything, quality costs more. Schools should have discounted tuition for multiple classes if your child is a serious student. Family discounts may also be available.

Even pre-schoolers taking lessons should have a fun, interesting and beneficial class. A little extra time will result in a decision that you and your child will be happy with for years to come!



Get Past the Myths, Experience the Benefits of Resistance Training to Achieve Fitness By Jeff Bobek, C.S.C.S., C.P.T.

your physical fitness and health? How can you maintain a youthful physique and your physical abilities? How can you maximize the loss of body fat? According to many experts, the answer is to include resistance training as a part of your fitness activities. What is resistance training? Resistance training is simply a more descriptive term that is used to categorize the anaerobic exercise traditionally referred to as strength training.

Certainly, proper nutrition and participation in aerobic exercise, such as brisk walking or jogging, play an important role in achieving fitness. However, what you don't know or haven't considered about resistance training may be preventing you from achieving your optimal fitness goals. Unfortunately, there are some unfounded myths inhibiting fitness seekers from including this valuable training method in their exercise routines.

Myth #1, resistance training is only for young men or athletes!---Resistance training for general fitness is considered by many experts to be the most effective way to stay fit, regardless of age or gender. To some, strength training conjures up notions of massive bodybuilders painfully hoisting heavy weights above their heads. Resistance training can be done in a variety of ways with varying intensities that need not involve either pain or overly heavy weights. Equipment can range from simple, inexpensive devices to elaborate machines, but much can be achieved with resistance tubing or some dumbbells and a bench. In short, resistance training is for evervone!

Myth #2, strength training bulks you up!-Concerns of bulking up or becoming overly muscular due to resistance training are not well founded, especially for women. Women are simply unable to experience muscle growth similar to men because of their relatively low levels of the hormone, testosterone. For men or women, large gains in muscle mass are unlikely to occur without high intensity

What is the most effective way to improve weight training methods and a genetic tendency for sizable gains.

Proper resistance training is likely to improve one's physical appearance by improving the body's size, shape and posture. Gains in muscle size and shape are generally offset by a greater loss of body fat, and in most cases, result in a reduction of body measurements at the waist and hips. In addition, resistance training is likely to improve flexibility, range of motion and endurance; and is the only way to increase muscular strength.

Myth #3, muscle turns to fat when you stop exercising!-Muscle and fat are two distinctly different substances. A lack of resistance activity will simply cause muscle to atrophy (shrink), not turn into fat. However, this fact points out the importance of maintaining the body's muscles as we grow older.

Muscle and other lean body mass regulate the body's metabolism, or rate of energy use. Muscles shrink as a person ages, which causes metabolism to slow down. Unless calorie consumption is reduced and/or physical activity is increased, a slower metabolism will result in a gradual increase in body fat.

Not only is resistance training an effective calorie burner, it also serves to boost metabolism by increasing muscle tissue. Experts estimate that for each pound of lean body mass gained, the body will burn approximately 50 extra calories per day. Added muscle means more calories burned, even during rest!

Resistance training can also inhibit the effects of osteoporosis, protect the skeletal joints, improve balance and coordination and prevent injuries.

Facelift Surgery

Aging of the face is inevitable. With time, the effects of gravity, genetics and sun exposure begin to demonstrate their impact on our appearance. Fine wrinkles begin to appear at the corners of the eyes. The sharply demarcated jaw line becomes less defined with the appearance of jowls and the smooth contours of the neck are lost. The actual timing of when these events take place varies from person to person. Once these signs of aging become apparent, a facelift, also known as rhytidectomy, could provide the desired facial reiuvenation.

What is a Facelift?

A facelift allows rejuvenation of the lower two-thirds of the face. It addresses the sagging neck, jowls and cheeks. It may be combined with liposuction and tightening of the muscles in the neck to provide a tighter, smoother contouring. The incision for the facelift extends from the patient's temple hairline down in front of and then just inside the ear, and continues around the lobe behind the ear into the hairline. All incisions are placed where they would fall in a natural crease or hidden within the patient's hair. The skin is then raised and the underlying soft tissues are tightened. This places the tension beneath the skin and prevents a pulled or too tight look. The skin is then redraped over the underlying tissues. The excess skin is trimmed and the incisions are closed with fine sutures. Depending on the extent of surgery, the procedure can last from two to four hours. Following the surgery, the patient will have a dressing placed to protect the entire area where the incisions have been made and the skin has been raised. A hospital.

What Can the Patient Expect After Surgery?

Most patients report very little pain after surgery, however, there is some degree of discomfort due to the swelling. The patient will be instructed to sleep with the head elevated on two to three pillows. Medication is prescribed to allow the patient to tolerate the mild pain. The dressing that was applied immediately following surgery is removed on the first day after surgery. Recovery usually takes between two to three weeks although most patients are able to go back to work in one to two weeks. The incisions are barely noticeable even early on since they are hidden in natural contours and the hair.

Where Can This Procedure be Performed?

Facelifts are commonly performed at the Plastic Surgery and Laser Center. Some patients prefer to spend the night there while others go home following surgery. Either twilight or general anesthesia is used. Facelifts can also be done in the



Business Asset Valuations

One year to the millennium! Happy New Year to all my friends who have followed my articles over the past few years and to all the new readers of my articles. Thank you for all your support. I hope I can continue to deliver topics that are of interest to you. If there are any specific items that you wish discussed concerning estate planning, business planning, elder law or other related legal and tax issues, please let me know.

Business valuations and appraisals vary depending on the purpose for such valuation. For example, one might want to know the fair market value for estate tax purposes rather than the maximum investment value of the property. Investment value takes into consideration the possibility of increase in profitability and/or value of the property. "Fair market value" is defined by the Treasury Department as "the price at which the property would change hands between a willing buyer and a willing seller, neither being under any compulsion to buy or to sell and both having reasonable knowledge of relevant facts." (Reg. 20.2031-1(b)).

The valuation of actively traded stocks and bonds is not difficult to determine. However, the determination of the value of stock that is not actively traded is more complex. The use of restrictive agreements, i.e., buy-sell agreements, redemption agreements, etc., may be effective in determining the value of a business only if certain conditions are met in the agreement.

Three requirements are necessary to fix a stock price for estate tax purposes between unrelated persons: 1) during the life of the shareholder, he/she must first offer any shares he/she owns to the business or other shareholders at the fixed price in the agreement before selling the shares to an outsider; 2) upon the death of the shareholder, his/her estate must sell the shares at the agreed upon price; and 3) the agreement must set for the price or a method for valuation of the shares. (Regs. 20.2031-2).

However, when the agreement is between related persons, three additional items are considered to protect the value as stated in the agreement for estate tax purposes: 1) the agreement must be an arm's length business arrangement supported by adequate consideration; 2) the agreement cannot be a device to transfer property for less than adequate consideration to the shareholder's beneficiaries; and 3) the agreement must be similar to other arrangements entered into in an arm's length transaction. (Reg. 25.2703-1 (b)(i)).

Where there is no active market for stock and no agreement fixing the value,



the Treasury has set forth valuation factors. These factors must be considered in determining the fair market value: the business' net worth; prospective earning power; the capacity to pay dividends; goodwill of the business; the economic outlook of the particular industry involved; the management; the control represented by the stock to be valued; the value of actively traded securities of businesses in a similar line of business; proceeds of life insurance policies payable to or for the benefit of the business; restrictions or options on the sale of the stock; and other "relevant factors." (Reg. 20.2031-2(f)).

Each factor must be weighed to determine its importance. The type of business will determine the weight of each factor. The guidelines for this method of valuing closely held securities are from the Treasury Department. Other methods are being used by appraisers which are sure to be tested in the future.


Once the value of the business is determined, then the value of the specific stocks must be determined. With closely held businesses, the value of ownership interests depend on the control represented by the stock interest in addition to the marketability of the stock. A minority interest may be allowed a minority interest discount, even when the transfer is within a family. Most courts have found that a 50% shareholder may obtain some minority discount.

When there is no active market, the valuation is subject to an appraiser balancing the above identified factors and is not easy to determine. A buy-sell agreement or redemption agreement is your best insurance at setting a value of a closely held business.





The beauty, grandeur and resilience of the prairie lands of America's Great Plains is the subject of a photography exhibition on view at The Art Institute of Chicago through January 17, 1999. In Place of Prairie: Photographs by Terry Evans presents approximately 50 color and black-andwhite prints by Chicago-based photographer Terry Evans that capture both vast and minute features of the North American continent's heartland in its various transformations by the human hand. Taken between 1990 and 1997, these remarkable aerial and ground views comprise an intensive ecological study of the mixedgrass prairie lands that spread from central Saskatchewan to central Texas. Combining a gorgeous formal rigor with a penetrating and sympathetic eye, the photographs alternate viewpoints that crane from sky to land to sky, exploring the impact-both positive and negative-of human settlement on this great expanse.

The exhibition was organized by the Art Institute in collaboration with Openlands Project, a nonprofit conservation group dedicated to preserving and enhancing open space in northeastern Illinois, in celebration of its 35th anniversary.

The original tallgrass prairie of North America was likened to both sea and desert. In less than two centuries, it has become one of the most fertile agricultural and grazing regions in the world. Since the explorations of Lewis and Clark, the prairies have undergone tremendous change

gone are the herds of countless bison, the rich biodiversity and the unadulterated horizons of waving grasslands, replaced by the enhancements and depredations of cities, farmland and industry.

Terry Evans's photographic inquiry into the remaining undisturbed native prairies began in her home town of Salina, Kansas in 1978. At first, she was interested in capturing details of the landscape solely from ground level. Then, in 1989, Evans realized that aerial exploration would allow her to see the pattern of human marks left on the prairie: effects of planting, rotational grazing, old cemeteries and a military bombing range. A 1997-98 Guggenheim Fellowship helped Evans

(Un)Conscious Articulations: Fifty Drawings by Arturo Herrera

An exhibition of recent works on paper by Chicago artist Arturo Herrera is on view in The Art Institute of Chicago's Galleries of Prints and Drawings (G. 120) now through January 31, 1999. The 50 small-scale pieces in (Un)Conscious Articulations: Fifty Drawings by Arturo Herrera draw on the venerable Dada/Surrealist tradition of collage to create images suggestive of early childhood memories that are at once provocative, disturbing and often hilarious. All untitled and all dated 1997-98, the small-scale (101/2" x 131/2") collage/drawings are made of commercially prepared papers and mixed media, laid down on white envelopes. The pieces have been generously lent by Chicago collectors Susan and Lewis Manilow.

For the works featured in (Un)Conscious Articulations, the Venezuelan-born (1959) Herrera takes his imagery from American popular culture, appropriating illustrations from fairy tale and other children's books that he cuts up and reassembles-sometimes painting or drawing over them. The recombined forms coalesce into fantastic hybrids that mine the same rich psychological vein that can be seen in some classic Surrealist images. Amidst the fragmented figures created by the artist, one can recognize

Illinois State Treasurer Judy Baar Topinka announced the introduction of legislation designed to earmark a \$600 million revenue stabilization-or "rainy day"- fund to help Illinois through tough economic times. The bill, HB 3906, is sponsored by Representatives Bill Black of Danville and Larry McKeon of Chicago.

our bills on time."

The bill calls for an automatic transfer of money to a special revenue stabilization fund in any fiscal year in which general fund revenues are estimated by the Governor to exceed the prior year's general fund revenues by at least 4%. The amount transferred would be .25% of the anticipated general fund's revenues. The proposed fund would be capped at \$600 million.

According to the Illinois Economic and Fiscal Commission, in the last ten fiscal years revenue growth increases have ranged from a high of 9.1 percent in 1995 to a low of 3.3 percent in 1991. If such a law was in place during a fiscal year with

a \$38 billion budget, about \$95 million would have been placed in the fund.

The only states without such contingency funds are Illinois, Montana, Hawaii, Arkansas and Oregon. Thirty-two states have capped the size of their revenue stabilization funds.

According to Topinka, she remains flexible concerning the cap size, methodology and other technical aspects of the fund.

"Illinois needs to have a statute-based contingency fund, and the time to do it is now," Topinka said. "I remain openminded on how it is accomplished, but it is clear that this state needs to catch up with the rest of the nation by concentrating more on saving instead of spending."
