Any woman is eligible for membership in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is not less than







New Artist—Caroll Callaway —Joins Gallery




French Village by Caroll Callaway, 16" x 18", oil.




Country Lane by Caroll Callaway, 20" x 24", oil.

No New Tax Breaks

Welcome to the new millennium! I hope you all enjoyed the holiday season. It is now time to revitalize and focus on the new year ahead of us. Since this is an election year, it will be interesting to see what Congress will do with legislation concerning the estate tax.

It has been said that when it appears that very little is happening in Congress, you need only to look a little closer to see that nothing is happening. The recent experiences with federal tax legislation take this observation to the next level—even when a lot of activity seems to be taking place, the ultimate outcome is close to nothing.

In 1999, a bill that would repeal the estate, gift and generation skipping transfer taxes (GST) was passed by both houses of Congress and sent to President Clinton, only to be vetoed by the President. He stated that the bill was too expensive. Congress also included a long term phase out of the individual alternative minimum tax, rules allowing considerably more flexibility in the allocation of the generation skipping transfer tax exemption, expansion of the favorable tax treatment of conservation easements, relief from the marriage penalty, various rules expanding the availability and utility of IRAs and a general reduction of tax rates. All of these items were vetoed.



It is doubtful we will see any estate tax relief, even though there is still talk about an immediate introduction of the milliondollar exclusion now scheduled for 2006 and for some relaxation of the rules governing allocation of the generation skipping tax exemption.

We will have to wait and see if Congress and the President can come to any consensus on the various tax issues prior to the elections in November. Until then, it is business as usual. There is still the necessity to plan your estate to minimize taxes and avoid probate.

I am attending a week-long estate tax conference this month. Next month, I will report new and interesting material for your enjoyment! Until then, Happy New Year! *Have a very safe, healthy and prosperous January 2000!*





Fall Elections and First Report Cards **Make Education Priority for Parents**

With education the number one issue in November elections, parents are voicing-and voting-their concerns over the quality of their local schools. And, in many school districts, November means the end of the first marking period. So, report cards bring the education issue home

Besides the ballot, parents are looking for other effective ways to help their children get a better education. For many parents, learning centers are the answer to low grades and poor classroom performance. 

I would like to share a brief story with February. The significance of this upcomyou about a client who was involved in ing New Year will amplify these personal reflections by, oh... say 2,000 times! How do we avoid another century of not making our goals?

Goal setting is a multi-tiered process. It should be progressive, quantifiable and safe. An example of an unsafe goal would be trying to lose 30 pounds in 30 days. To do so would require extreme dieting and excess exercise that would actually result in a loss of your lean tissue (muscle) and metabolically set you back in the long run. Losing two to three pounds per week is generally considered a safe amount of weight to lose without losing valuable muscle mass. An example of a method of quantifying your workout is your weight, although if you are in any resistance program you may gain some muscle weight while losing fat. If that's the case, you can use body fat or girth measurement as your gauge. Your favorite pair of jeans that you haven't been able to squeeze into could also be your barometer. In terms of your goals being progressive, you should set short-term goals six to ten weeks apart and long-term goals of six months to a year. Make your goals realistic.






"Hindu" Necklace

The design of the necklace is based on a piece done for an Indian Maharajah, and the only major difference between the two is the color of the gems. Also, the original necklace had an Indian-style cord to fasten the back instead of the complete collar of gems. "Cartier 1900-1939" includes this "Hindu" necklace, along with more than 200 pieces of jewelry and objets d'art. The exhibition runs through January 16, 2000. 

Design from the Heartland: Henry Glass, John Polivka and Richard Ten Eyck

The achievements of three Midwestern American masters of industrial design are featured in an exhibition currently at The Art Institute of Chicago. On view in the Kisho Kurokawa Gallery of Architecture (G. 227) through February 27, 2000, *Design from the Heartland: Henry Glass, John Polivka, and Richard Ten Eyck* is part of an ongoing exhibition series that explores fields of design closely related to architecture.

Design from the Heartland examines the work of three designers who practiced their trade over a 50-year period in the Midwest's great centers of manufacturing: Henry Glass (b. 1911) of Chicago; John Polivka (1910-1999) of Minneapolis; and Richard Ten Eyck (b. 1920) of Wichita. The exhibition brings into focus the remarkable-yet by now omnipresent-contributions that these designers have made to transportation, domestic and office environments for a wide range of companies such as Cessna Aircraft, Control Data Computers, Fleetwood Furniture, Hesston and General Mills. Toasters, screwdrivers, airplanes, fans, computers and armchairs are but a' few of the products that have been shaped by their eyes for design and innovation.

The exhibition presents approximately 85 objects ranging from fascinating rare preliminary design studies and finished presentation renderings to selected examples of manufactured products. Highlights include Glass's popular modernist 1940s "American Way" and 1950s "tube frame" furniture; Polivka's famous designs

for mainframe cabinets, graphics and related equipment created for Control Data's super-computer pioneer Seymour Cray; and Ten Eyck's sleek Cessna aircraft of the 1960s and Vornado fans of the 1950s and 1980s.

The exhibition also includes a supplementary program in the Schiff e-Gallery that features audio and video clips of a number of other Midwestern designers from the 1930s through the 1980s as well

as important products they created. These products—like those presented in the main exhibition—have had a significant impact on American culture in the areas of transportation, communication, recreation, domestic life and the world of work. Although many of the designs have become familiar icons, the designers responsible for them have often been overlooked.

The practice of industrial design, which first appeared in the 1920s as a distinct profession, incorporates many facets of design. A successful designer must consider the selection of material, the creation of forms that fit the human body, the application of engineering innovation

and the choice of color if he or she is to merge aesthetic styling with practical functionality.

Glass, Polivka and Ten Eyck each established his own independent design firm soon after the end of World War II. Each took advantage of advances in materials, technology and aesthetics to provide a high level of style and pragmatism to a booming consumer culture. Although they were contemporaries, the three designers embraced different spheres of activity: Glass made his name in furniture; Polivka in household and office products; and Ten Eyck in the world of transportation and heavy industry.

Today, their vast bodies of work, along with that of countless other designers practicing in the Midwest and throughout (Please continue on page 36)



Loyola Focuses on Identifying Victims of Domestic Violence

School of Medicine is preparing to launch an innovative program-one of the first of its kind in Illinois-to teach medical stuidentify victims of domestic violence, counsel these patients and refer them to appropriate resources for help.

The Illinois Violence Prevention Authority (IVPA), a state agency, has awarded a one-year, \$30,000 grant to Loyola's medical school to plan and launch the educational program. Although the LUC Stritch School of Medicine in Maywood, IL is one of about 80 Illinois organizations and law enforcement agencies to receive IVPA financial assistance this year, it is the only grant recipient focusing on the training of health care students and professionals as a frontline defense against domestic violence.

"Because of a lack of specialized training, physicians often fail to identify victims who seek treatment for illnesses stemming from domestic violence," said Dr. Fern Hauck, director of research in the family medicine department of the LUC Stritch School of Medicine. "This failure in identification is considered one of the primary stumbling blocks for reducing and preventing incidents of such violence."

Illinois police recorded nearly 128,000 domestic violence offenses in the state in 1997. Of these incidents, 75% of them involved assault and battery charges.

During fiscal year 1997-98, nearly 32 Barrington LIFESTYLES January 2000

Loyola University Chicago (LUC) Stritch 39,000 adults and 12,500 children sought shelter and related services from Illinois domestic violence programs. More than 16,500 of these victims, an estimated dents, residents and physicians how to 10,000 of them children, were turned away due to lack of space. Experts say that only 8 to 10% of domestic violence victims seek help from referral programs or the courts.

> Loyola's program will provide education and training in diagnosing domestic violence to 65 third-year medical students during their six-week family medicine clerkship and to eight residents in the Loyola-Provident Family Practice Residency Program. The LUC Stritch School of Medicine has an affiliation with Cook County's Provident Hospital in Chicago.

> The students and residents are expected to interview and screen more than 500 women who are 18 years of age or older. Screenings will be conducted at 19 Chicago-area family practice clinics where Loyola students undertake family medicine clerkships and residents do rotations.

> "Medical students and residents will learn to use special questionnaires in screening women who are seen in the family practice offices," Hauck said. "Patients identified as victims will be counseled and referred to resources such as domestic violence hotlines and shelters. Women who are suffering from violencerelated symptoms, such as anxiety or depression, will also be referred appropriately."

Kinerase—An Effective New Anti-Aging Skin Cream

ing agents. In fact, there were virtually no side effects reported at all in clinical studies while close to 100% of patients showed noticeable improvement in their skin by 24 weeks of treatment. The response of patients currently using Kinerase in our office has been very positive.

Kinerase is applied twice daily to the face, neck, hands or chest. Other topical agents such as makeup and sunscreen may be used over the Kinerase. Kinerase causes no increase in photosensitivity so patients are free to perform everyday activities with normal precautions against sun exposure.

Kinerase is currently under limited distribution and is available at The Center for Facial Plastic Surgery or behind the counter at local pharmacies. volved in reviewing patient medical records to determine whether or not victims of domestic violence have been identified as such by their health professionals in the past," Hauck said.

"Our program's emphasis is on female patients because they constitute the overwhelming majority of abuse victims in the home," Hauck explained. "These patients may contact physicians to complain about headaches, dizziness, depression and other conditions that are common but are also frequently related to domestic violence. They will open up to being abused if the physician asks them the right questions in a sensitive way."

Supervising the training will be physicians who serve as preceptors for Loyola medical students and residents at the various participating clinic sites.

The Loyola University Chicago Child-Law Center and Sarah's Inn, a domestic violence shelter and counseling center in Oak Park, IL, will collaborate with Hauck and her team in training the preceptors for the program, including preparation of training manuals. Additionally, both the law center and Sarah's Inn will provide referrals and assistance to women identified as victims of abuse.

"The Loyola law staff will consider court orders of protection and other legal residents and 100 fellows.

"The medical students will also be in- safeguards on behalf of women referred to the center," said Cathryn Merrick, research study coordinator in Loyola's family medicine department. "Sarah's Inn will assist abused women in obtaining necessary resources, such as shelter.

Hauck and collaborators will spend the next several months completingithe planning and development phase of the initiative. The six-month field portion of the program will begin shortly after Januarv 1.

Approximately 80% of the IVPA grant will cover salary expenses. The remainder will pay for subcontractual costs, supplies, postage, travel and conference fees.

LUC Stritch School of Medicine is located in a state-of-the-art educational facility on the campus of Loyola University Medical Center, 2160 S. First Avenue, Maywood. The school, which provides instruction to 520 medical students, has been in the vanguard of institutions that have created new, active learning curricula to help students meet the challenges of 21st century health care.

An estimated 8,000 to 9,000 students compete each year for 130 openings in the medical school's first-year class.



Beatrix Farrand's American Landscapes


The next "Members Present Art" lecture will be Tuesday, January 25, 1 PM at the Barrington Area Library. Jeanette Muench will review a recently published book on the life and works of Beatrix Farrand by Diana Balmori, Diane Kostial McGuire and Eleanor M. McPeck.

Beatrix Farrand (1872-1959), one of America's greatest 20th century landscape architects, was born into an old New York family. She studied with Charles Sprague Sargent at Boston's Arnold Arboretum before eventually setting up her own landscape practice. She was one of the seven founding members of the American Society of Landscape Architects.

Farrand traveled frequently to Europe's most celebrated gardens, studying the relationship between the buildings and the gardens. She synthesized the best of Europe for America, never imposing on the land an arbitrary concept. She carefully studied the light, wind and grade of each area before designing for that specific site. In her most successful projects, Beatrix




