

Brain Research Foundation Names Creativity Award Winners for 1994

Research Foundation were welcomed by Mary Smart, Chairman of the Brain Research Foundation's 1994 Creativity Awards Benefit, in the Laboratory located within the Center for Molecular Neurobiology in the new Jules F. Knapp Medical Research building. Gwill Newman, Vice Chairman of the Brain Research Foundation formally announced the winners of the 1994 Creativity Awards.

The Creativity Award, established six years ago by the Brain Research Foundation, recognizes and acknowledges the creative potential of the human brain. The Foundation supports the work of the Brain Research Institute of the University of Chicago, which helps fund discoveries about how the human brain works and finds cures for its worst failings.

Three of Chicago's Most Creative **Couples Honored**

The June 15 benefit fund-raiser will be a summer evening cruise on Lake Michigan, aboard the S.S. Odyssey II. The Brain Research Foundation will recognize the contributions of three of Chicago's most gifted couples who are using their creativity on behalf of the human community. This year, the honorees are: Patricia and Martin (Mike) Koldyke; Desiree Glapion Rogers and John Rogers; and Carole and Gordon Segal. Each couple will receive the Creativity Award for their varied and generous demonstrations of the creative power of the human brain.

THE KOLDYKES: Martin (Mike) Koldyke is Chairman of Frontenac Company, Chicago, a venture capital firm he founded in 1971. He is on the boards of Rand McNally & Co.; American Healthcorp, Inc.,; and Gen Derm Corporation. Mike is also Chairman of the Chicago School Finance Authority, jointly appointed by the Mayor and the Governor. He is the founder and chairman emeritus

Guests and board members of the Brain of the Golden Apple Foundation for Excellence in Teaching. In addition, he is an active member of the Commercial Club of Chicago and last year was Crain's Chicago Business, "Executive of the Year," as well as the City Club of Chicago's 'Citizen of the Year.''

In 1973, Patricia Koldyke co-founded the Illinois Council Against Handgun Violence. More than 20 years later, she remains active on its board of directors. She is a director of the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations and a trustee of the Brain Research Foundation as well as a member of the board of Northwestern Memorial Corporation. She became director of the Golden Apple Foundation Scholars Program in 1988, working with awardwinning teachers to recruit and support outstanding Illinois high school seniors for college training preparatory and careers in K-12 teaching.

Chicago Chamber Musicians Adds Four New Brass Ensemble Members



The Chicago Chamber Musicians (CCM) has added four new brass members to their ensemble. They are (back row, / from left): Gene Pokorny, tuba; Charles Geyer and Barbara Butler, trumpets; and Michael Mulcahy, trombone. The four new artists along with CCM founding member Gail Williams (front row, center), horn, will comprise what is to be called the "CCM Brass." With the addition of the new brass members, CCM is believed to be the first and only chamber ensemble that has a resident brass group. In addition to participating in the ensemble's subscription concerts and outreach performances, the

CCM Brass will tour as a quintet playing separate venues.

CCM has gained national attention for its innovative community outreach programs including its free "First Monday" series held the first Monday of each month at the Chicago Cultural Center; its model arts education program now in its sixth year at Chicago's Sullivan High School; and its "Music Allegro" series which brings live music to nontraditional venues such as the Lawson YMCA "Emergency Housing Program" and The Lamb's Farm, serving people with mental disabilities.

Homes Needed For Exchange Students

This summer, families in Barrington and surrounding northwest suburban communities will have the opportunity to build a warm, rewarding international friendship by sharing three weeks of their lives with a foreign student from France or Indonesia.

EF Educational Homestay Programs, a division of EF Intercultural Foundation and a non-profit organization, is sponsoring two groups of foreign students coming to the area in June and July. With the goal of encouraging cross-cultural awareness and international understanding, EF brings students (ages 14 to 19) to the U.S. every summer to help young foreigners learn about the American way of life first-hand, flex their English language skills, and share a bit of their own culture with American host families. Students coming to the Chicagoland area this summer are especially interested in exploring what family life in the Midwest is all about.

The first program, June 15 to July 5, is a fairly structured approach to immersing the students in both the English language and American culture. The Indonesian students participating in this program are quite proficient in spoken English and will attend English classes 3 to 4 mornings a week to polish up their language skills. Classes will be held at a central location in the village of Barrington. The students will also join in planned educational and recreational afternoon field trips on weekdays, and have free time to spend with host families in the evenings and on weekends.

Busy, dual career families often find the structure of this program best matches their family lifestyle.

In contrast, the Immersion Course scheduled for July 10 through July 30 is a relatively unhurried, uncomplicated program which allows the host family and student time to get acquainted and pursue common interests. The French students who will take part in this program have studied English for 3 to 4 years and seek to really explore American English and culture by interacting with host families and adapting to their daily lives in the U.S.A.

Both programs will include three fullday excursions to the museums and sights of downtown Chicago, as well as more recreational destinations such as Gurnee Mills and the Illinois State Beach. Other optional activities will be offered to the students, including a trip to Great America, a mud volleyball tournament for the French students, and a day at the Bristol Renaissance Faire for the Indonesian group. Host families are more than welcome to join in on any of these activities.

All students come with their own spending money and will carry full medical and travel insurance. Each student will require a bed, but not his or her own room. If an extra bed is needed, one can be rented for the family. There is no program fee to become involved, but families will be asked to provide meals for the students, as well as some transportation. Carpools will be arranged to keep driving to a minimum. In addition, each participating host family will have a chance to choose which student they would like to welcome into their home.



Coach Davis Teaches Lessons of Life, Sports in Newly Formed Venture

Dan Davis, coach of multiple sports at comes from people who are well inten-Hoffman Estates High School has begun a new pursuit—personalized instruction in the techniques and training methods of football, basketball, baseball, soccer, and weight training for young athletes (both boys and girls) aged 9 and older. But, don't be surprised if his students come away from their lessons with more than enhanced skills in their sport of choice. Davis has become a bit of a local legend in reaching out to kids with basic messages of self-sufficiency, respect for others and positive thinking. He has successfully communicated these messages as a teacher and coach for the past 13 years. In the process, he has come a long way from his rural roots in Texarkana, Texas, where he excelled in football, baseball, basketball and track.

A graduate of Texas A&M. Davis was Captain of a Southwest Conference Champion football team and a pro prospect before he went into coaching. Today, he sees a need for more individual attention for young athletes. "Fundamentals are extremely important as a young athlete begins preparation for competition in his/her sport of choice. Unfortunately, instruction often tioned, but who don't have the knowledge or experience to get the young athletes started right. We all know how hard it is to break bad habits."

Davis' program is designed to bring the athlete and his parent or coach together in close coordination. 

Students Can Learn to Pay Attention

The ability to focus attention may seem simple to you. But paying attention is a skill that must be learned. Many students cannot control their attention because they have never learned how to direct their thoughts and energies.

Dr. Raymond Huntington, founder and President of the Huntington Learning Center, says that parents can help children improve their ability to concentrate. The following are three methods Dr. Huntington recommends in helping your children improve their attention:

1. Using positive self-talk and positive images. At sporting events you often see one player standing alone, muttering to himself, "OK, you can do it! Keep your eye on the ball." This is "self-talk," an important tool for controlling attention. Children can be taught to use it.

People also improve their attention span by controlling the images they see in their mind's eye. When a runner is half-way through the race, she may picture herself crossing the finish line; or a dieter may imagine his new appearance when tempted by an ice cream cone. These images help keep attention focused, and increase motivation to complete the task.

2. Asking questions about the work. Another way to direct attention is to ask

questions while studying. Some general instructions are: "What is this paragraph about? What is the evidence that supports the central idea? Is this argument true or false? Why?" Asking themselves questions helps students bring their attention back to the task at hand.

3. Setting specific study goals. One way to improve is for children to work toward specific goals as they study. You might want them to study until they can tell you the main point of the paragraph, or until they can solve a specific math problem. Together set reasonable goals, and discuss each goal with your children. Remember that many small goals are better than a single large one.

At the Huntington Learning Center, study skills are integrated into specially designed tutoring and enrichment programs. 

Tribal Expressions' Summer Showings

Paintings, sculpture, pottery, baskets and other Indian art create a relaxed aura of reverence at Tribal Expressions in Arlington Heights. It is an American Indian Art Gallery, for those who want to match art with their soul and not their decor. Continuing through the summer the gallery will be showing monoprints and lithographs by Navajo artist, Tony Abeyta.

Tony Abeyta's powerful images grew out of early experiments painting abstract, intangible motion, like capturing the movement of a tornado. Color plays an important role in Tony Abeyta's pictures. His paintings range from intense dark blues, reds, and greens, to light pale washes. Deity figures take the shape of human figures in his paintings helping them transcend from their world into ours. Tony's work is based on cultural heroes of the past, mythology and his own experiences in his native culture.

Son of the noted Navajo painter Ha So Deh, Tony received a degree in fine art from Maryland Institute's College of Art in Baltimore, and did post graduate work at the Chicago Art Institute as well as in France and Italy. In 1992, he received the singular honor of being named the SWAIA Indian Market Poster Artist, and received the highest Indian Market award in easel art, Best in Paintings, Drawings and Graphics.

Tony's 1993 publication "Masks", a series of 10, two color lithographs printed on hand-made Twinrocker "Yale with Flax" paper, is available at the Arlington Heights gallery. Four of the prints from this edition won "Best of Division in Graphics" and "First Place" at the 72nd annual Southwestern Association of Indian Affairs (SWAIA) Indian Market in Santa Fe.

Also included in the gallery collection is a monoprint of Tony's that was featured on New Mexico Public Television. 40 hours of video sessions were condensed into a 30 minute special to illustrate the development, and techniques utilized by Tony to complete just one of his colorful monoprint pictures. Collectors, students, and connoisseurs of Indian art agree that Tony Abeyta's monoprints and lithographs are worth examining.






What First-Time Home Buyers Want

The most common reason for renters to buy a home is that they want to own their own property. According to "What First Time Home Buyers Want," a survey produced by the National Association of Home Builders, 95 percent of respondents cited ownership as a key motivating factor. Other key reasons for buying a home were: more space (55 percent), location (35 percent) and a better neighborhood (28 percent). In choosing a home to buy, most people are looking for: energy efficient (96 percent), a bigger lot (74 percent), less crime (71 percent), a better neighborhood (69 percent), and less noise (67 percent).

Potential first-time buyers want significantly more space in their next home. Renters who intend to buy want a median size of 1,900 square feet - a definite increase over the average 1,300 square feet in single-family rental homes and the average 875 square feet in apartments. However, when asked to choose, first-time buyers strongly preferred keeping bedroom space over group activity space or larger bathrooms. More than half of the potential first-time buyers preferred a larger family room instead of a living room and a larger living room over a dining room.



The most desired household amenity was a washer/dryer followed by a linen closet, an additional bathroom, central air conditioning, walk-in closets, a microwave oven, dishwasher, pantry, security system and a fireplace. They also expressed a preference for high ceilings. One in four prefer to have an 8-foot ceiling, but most (75 percent) prefer ceilings that are 9 feet high or higher. Of those, 27 percent prefer 9-foot-ceilings, 35 percent prefer 10-foot ceilings and 10 percent prefer 11-foot ceilings.

Kitchen and bathrooms are key selling points for any home. The strongest preference in kitchen features was a large countertop (78 percent), followed by a walk-in pantry (75 percent), special use storage (53 percent) and a bay window (50 percent). Nearly three-quarters of the respondents would rather have more wall cabinets than windows. In bathrooms, renters who plan to buy prefer two bathrooms (46 percent), but nearly as many (40 percent) prefer more. For the master bath, a vanity with one bowl was the renters' top choice. Two-bowl vanities followed at 46 percent. This group want the toilet separated from the bath tub, do not prefer bidets and will not accept a sink without a base.

Renters who plan to buy a home prefer wall-to-wall carpeting in the living room. family room/den/recreation room, bedrooms and hallways. Other floor materials and covers vary with the room and usage.




