What some consider to be a simple desk accessory has been locked in the treasure vaults of kings and collected by the world's most famous personalities. Collector paperweights have increased steadily in value over the past 30 years—in 1990, one rare piece sold for the record setting price of \$258,000!


The story of the glass paperweight begins in 1845—little more than 50 years after a mob beheaded Louis XVI and proclaimed France a republic. In the turbulent center of Napoleonic France, Parisian glass houses began to produce pieces of crystal that would permanently impact the history of glass art.

The paperweight—for that was its original purpose—was initially produced as an elegant gift item for sale to a burgeoning middle class. Each piece carried a sentiment. A pansy weight spoke of "tender thoughts" and friendship; the rose was a token of love.

The pieces received an instant enthusiastic response. The French factories strived to surpass each other, and what was first sold as a gift metamorphosed into a presentation piece. When Queen Victoria called nations to exhibit their finest accomplishments at London's Great Exhibition of 1851, France displayed paperweights.

Now, 150 years after the first pieces were forged, glass artists continue to include their most complex glasswork in paperweights. Enthusiasts worldwide collect them for their investment potential and the chance to enjoy the beauty of a crystal world you can hold in the palm of your hand.



#### Energy Balance—A Practical Approach to Controlling Body Fat By Jeff Bobek, C.S.C.S., C.P.T.

The most practical solution to control*ling body fat is a simple concept explained* by the principle of energy balance. The principle of energy balance states that body weight is maintained when a person's total energy intake (calories of food consumption) equals their total energy expenditure (calories burned). Calories consumed in excess of total energy expenditure will result in weight gain and the storage of those extra calories as body fat. Calorie consumption deficits will result in weight loss. However, it should be noted that increases in the body's musculature can occur while energy intake and expenditure are in balance, thus resulting in improvements in body consumption (the ratio of lean body mass to body fat) and possible weight gains.

So why wouldn't drastic reduction in food consumption result in big losses of body fat? Simply put, body fat is a slowrelease energy reserve designed for survival when food is scarce. 





### Women's Health Issues in Orthopedics by Mary K. Morrell, M.D.



Mary K. Morrell, M.D. Women can lead longer, more active and healthier lives thanks to recent innovations in the field of orthopedic surgery. Orthopedic surgeons are the primary care specialists in the treatment of the musculoskeletal system which includes bones, joints, ligaments, tendons and muscles. Many alternatives are now available that don't involve surgery! Three major fields experiencing these advancements today are osteoporosis, osteoarthritis, and female sports injuries.

#### Osteoporosis

WHAT IS OSTEOPOROSIS? Osteoporosis is a preventable and treatable bone disease that affects over 28 million Americans. It involves a decrease in bone mass that leads to an increased risk of fracture. The risk of a woman experiencing a hip fracture is greater than her risk of breast, uterine, and ovarian cancer combined. It is a leading cause of disability in older women.

ARE YOU AT RISK FOR OSTEOPOROSIS? The National Osteoporosis Foundation recommends that all women over 65 years old should have osteoporosis testing. Risk factors have been identified that can lead to a simple calculated osteoporosis risk estimation. Included in these risks are white or Asian women, light skin, family history, small frame, recent fracture, estrogen deficiency (post menopause), inactivity, cigarette smoking, steroid use, and poor health. Osteoporosis is not just a disease of older women. Awareness and treatment needs to be started as early as the teenage years.

M.D. HOW DO I FIND OUT IF I HAVE OSTEOPOROSIS? Bone density testing is readily available to determine your osteoporosis risk. Osteoporosis screening can be performed within minutes in our office by placing your finger in a DEXA machine. Results are immediately printed out and treatment can be started if necessary. Medicare and most insurance carriers often reimburse osteoporosis testing.

WHAT ARE MY TREATMENT OPTIONS? Many pharmaceutical agents are now available to help prevent bone resorption. Hormone replacement therapy (estrogen) is the most effective in preventing bone loss but it is often poorly accepted due to side effects and other risks such as breast cancer which may preclude one from being treated with this therapy. Other medications now being used are calcium and vitamin D supplements, biphosphonates (alendronate), calcitonin nasal spray (which also provides some pain relief from osteoporotic fractures), and selective estrogen receptor modulators (raloxifene). Repeat testing should be performed after 6 months of therapy to determine effectiveness.

#### Osteoarthritis

WHAT IS OSTEOARTHRITIS? Osteoarthritis is a progressive loss of articular cartilage from years of wear and tear on the joint that creates joint pain, stiffness and loss of joint function. Women are three times more likely to develop osteoarthritis than men. The occurrence of osteoarthritis increases with age but it can be related to other disease processes and trauma.

HOW DO I FIND OUT IF I HAVE OSTEOARTHRITIS? Diagnosis of arthritis starts with a detailed medical history of the patient and their joint complaints. Next a complete examination of the involved joints is performed checking for motion, swelling, and localized tenderness. Finally specific joint X-rays are obtained which will reveal arthritic changes in the bone.


WHAT ARE MY TREATMENT OPTIONS? Most cases of osteoarthritis can be treated with simple remedies such as heat, analgesic creams, and a gentle exercise program. There are many local arthritic classes now available and even physical therapy programs that may be beneficial. Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs are commonly prescribed for the treatment of arthritis and recently new drugs have been developed with less stomach side effects. A natural agent with glucosamine and chondroitin sulfate is producing good results in decreasing symptoms of arthritis after 2 to 3 months. Cortisone

injections into the joint are often effective in decreasing arthritic pain. New injections of hyaluronan which is a joint lubricant are now available in our office. While these treatments cannot completely cure arthritis, they may be effective for many years and no other intervention ever needed. If all conservative treatment fails though, surgical options are discussed such as arthroscopy and even joint replacement.

#### The Female Athlete

Women are becoming more active in sports and participating in higher level athletics which is leading to an increase in female sports related injuries. The anatomic differences between men and women often result in differences in the types of sports injuries that women sustain. A female basketball player is twenty times more likely than a male player to sustain an anterior cruciate ligament injury. Well over half of all the cases of tendonitis and bursitis occur in women. Patella or kneecap pain is much more common in women and requires extensive quadriceps strengthening. Rehabilitation and exercise programs need to be tailored to female athletes. Most weight machines are not configured for women. Specific muscle groups need to be addressed differently in women. Finally, different motivational factors exist in women athletes. All these issues should be evaluated in the treatment of female sports injuries with specific attention to the gender differences.

For some the Lodge Look implies massive log homes, big sky country, and towering mountains. If you grew up in the Chicago area, however, the memories that spring to mind can be quite different.



The Lodge Look to many of us recalls a time when school, paper routes and piano lessons seemed far behind and anything seemed possible.






#### **Depauw University Inducts Barrington Resident to Hall of Fame**

### **Facelift Surgery**

Aging of the face is inevitable. With time, the effects of gravity, genetics and sun exposure begin to demonstrate their impact on our appearance. Fine wrinkles begin to appear at the corners of the eyes. The sharply demarcated jaw line becomes less defined with the appearance of jowls and the smooth contours of the neck are lost. The actual timing of when these events take place varies from person to person. Once these signs of aging become apparent, a facelift, also known as rhytidectomy, could provide the desired facial rejuvenation.

#### What is a Facelift?

A facelift allows rejuvenation of the lower two-thirds of the face. It addresses the sagging neck, jowls and cheeks. It may be combined with liposuction and tightening of the muscles in the neck to provide a tighter, smoother contouring. The incision for the facelift extends from the patient's temple hairline down in front of and then just inside the ear, and continues around the lobe behind the ear into the hairline. All incisions are placed where they would fall in a natural crease or hidden within the patient's hair. The skin is then raised and the underlying soft tissues are tightened. This places the tension beneath the skin and prevents a pulled or too tight look. The skin is then redraped over the underlying tissues. The excess skin is trimmed and the incisions are closed with fine sutures. Depending on the extent of surgery, the procedure can last from two to four hours. Following the surgery, the patient will have a dressing placed to protect the entire area where the incisions have been

facelift may also be combined with eyelid and forehead surgery to provide rejuvenation of the upper one-third of the face.

#### What Can the Patient Expect After Surgery?

Most patients report very little pain after surgery, however, there is some degree of discomfort due to the swelling. The patient will be instructed to sleep with the head elevated on two to three pillows. Medication is prescribed to allow the patient to tolerate the mild pain. The dressing that was applied immediately following surgery is removed on the first daysafter surgery. Recovery usually takes between two to three weeks although most patients are able to go back to work in one to two weeks. The incisions are barely noticeable even early on since they are hidden in natural contours and the hair. Where Can This Procedure

was held at The Studio of Long Grove. "Roy's bad luck was our good luck," continues Hilligoss. "A strained back kept him from traveling from his home in London to attend our first show. The show was a huge success, nonetheless, and we received a promise from the publisher for a second show in October of '92. This show was even more successful and this time the artist attended." And although it was said that he would not be willing to address an audience, the artist had a great time

speaking to a large crowd of fans and collectors. His career has soared since that exciting beginning. The Studio of Long Grove is now assembling a major retrospective showing of works by Roy Fairchild-Woodard including originals oils, aquatints, serigraphs on paper, and a beautiful group of serigraphs on linen which have been enhanced by the artist and which look spectacular-some even challenging the original artwork.

Roy Fairchild-Woodard was born in 1953 in Surrey, England. He lives and works most of the year in his country home. This peaceful environment is fundamental to his well being and stability as an artist, although he travels throughout Europe to obtain new sources of inspiration. He is particularly influenced by the painters of the Renaissance and he visits Italy in particular to study frescos, tapestries and paintings and to see for himself the techniques with which they were executed.

His vision is coloured by his immersion in this past. His surfaces are rich and sumptuous and he uses varied interwoven elements such as fabrics and flowers in his work. The crumbling plasterwork of ancient frescos are also alluded to in his use of plaster as base for acrylic and oil overpainting.

His admiration for Egon Schiele and Gustav Klimpt can be seen in occasional references of line and decoration - By Some Golden Thread but he has extended their techniques to produce something altogether bolder and contemporary.


After leaving school at sixteen to train as a technical illustrator, he then took a degree in graphic design. Having completed his education he set up his own studio.

He soon found it was difficult to make a living from his own work and supported himself and his family for several years by producing, under the name of Woodard, illustrations for record sleeves, advertisements and books, as well as decorative serigraphs and lithographs. He achieved considerable popularity with his suites of pastel coloured figurative prints. Experimenting with different techniques he developed entirely new methods of achieving effects in serigraphy to obtain qualities of light and colour that are now in general use. His own painting and printmaking is done under his mother's family name, Fairchild.

# Gustave Moreau

#### BETWEEN EPIC AND DREAM

have the rare opportunity to view the fantastic imagery and jewellike colors of the singular 19th century French painter Gustave Moreau (1826-1898). Gustave Moreau: Between Epic and Dream, which is on view in Regenstein Hall, the Daniel F. and Ada L. Rice Building now through April 25, 1999, covers 50 years of the remarkable career of this artist, bringing together more than 180 paintings, watercolors and drawings from public and private collections worldwide. Included in the exhibition are not only most of Moreau's masterpieces and Salon paintings, but many watercolors and drawings that have not been previously exhibited or even reproduced.

Gustave Moreau was much admired in his own time, although he is not especially well known to the American public. The epic-scale dreamlike imagery, exotic eroticism and pristinely rendered violence of his paintings—coupled with their classical and biblical references—show an artist very much following his own path. And although there is some kinship between Moreau's richly crowded canvases with their dramatic lighting and brilliant, jewellike colors, and those of the British Pre-Raphaelites and the French/Belgian Symbolists, his works look like no other.

A man of elegance and erudition, Moreau reinvigorated the tradition of history painting by adding a new, imaginative and poetic dimension to it. Later, Surrealists such as Andre Breton found strong encouragement in Moreau's fearless declaration that "I have allowed my imagination free play and I have not been led astray by it.'

his time to be overly materialistic and indifferent to religion and art. He looked to the art of antiquity, the Middle Ages, the Italian Renaissance, 17th century France and non-western cultures to develop a form of expression that offered spiritual guidance in what he believed to be an age of confusion. He went to Italy in 1857, where he copied pictures in museums and churches beside his friend, the young Edgar Degas.

While works of the Italian masters left a lasting impression on Moreau, even after he permanently resettled in Paris, his art continued to evolve in unpredictable directions.

His early paintings are imbued with the beauty and violence of Romantic art, while those of the 1860s and 70s make epic statements by fusing classical erudition with technical knowledge. One can see in these the drama of the Romantic

painters Delacroix and Gericault, as well as the exquisitely precise draftsmanship of Poussin and Ingres; also evident in his fairy tale-like images is the artist's love of Persian and Indian miniatures.

Moreau's late works will certainly come as a surprise to many viewers. These paintings and watercolors from the late 1870s, 80s and 90s reveal the artist as one of the first to explore the expressive qualities of color in abstract compositions, evoking an emotional response almost solely through color, line and form. In the 1950s, they caught the eye of Robert Motherwell and other Abstract Expressionists, who saw them in the Musee Gustave Moreau in Paris, the museum the artist established just before his death.

#### Osteoporosis—Don't be a Victim

Now is the time to begin preventing osteoporosis, a disease where bones gradually become thinner and increasingly fragile. Although men and women suffer from osteoporosis, the disease tends to be more severe in women because bone loss increases rapidly after menopause. There are genetic factors that predispose certain women to the disease: fair-skinned, thin-framed, blond women and those with a family history of osteoporosis are at greatest risk. The following is a list of lifestyle-related factors that may lead to the development of osteoporosis:

- Lack of exercise
- Smoking and alcohol consumption
- Inadequate dietary calcium intake
- Excessive caffeine intake

Osteoporosis may be prevented by combining exercise with good nutrition. Exercise

Weight-bearing physical activity is necessary for developing and maintaining a healthy skeleton. Also, activities that increase muscle strength can be beneficial to non weight-bearing bones. Walking and cross-country skiing would be good choices for most adults, including those who are previously sedentary; step aerobics and kick-boxing are good choices for healthy, active adults and highly impactive activities such as running and jumping are good for young adults (unless contraindicated). Every individual has a medical history and fitness level that dictates which activities are best.

The resistance program for bone strength must contain weight-bearing exercises. Traditional seated weight ma-

chines for the lower body do not increase forces on the hip whereas functional exercises like lunges and step-ups do. They also promote an increase in balance, ankle-strength and flexibility.

A certified trainer will help in the selection and modifications of appropriate exercises

#### Diet

Bone strength can be heightened by eating a high-calcium, high-fiber, low-fat diet. Considering two-thirds of your bone is composed of calcium, it's not surprising that a diet that's high in calcium is essential for healthy bones.

The following are the recommended daily allowances in calcium for various individuals:

• 18-50 years, 800 mg

• Pregnant or lactating women, 1600 mg for mothers under age 19 or 1200 mg for mothers over age 19

• Women over 50, 1000-1500 mg

• Men and women over 60, 1000-1500 mg

Vitamin D is needed to metabolize calcium. Although the sun is our best source for Vitamin D, fortified milk products are effective substitutes.

#### **Final Regulations Approved** for Roth IRAs by Sharon L. Keller, J.D., LLM

Happy Spring! This month brings the official close of another Chicago winter. I am looking forward to warm weather and sunny days. I have previously written about Roth IRA's and apologize for an additional article about them. However, on February 3, 1999, the IRS issued the final regulations relating to Roth IRAs. The final regulations are applicable to taxable years on or after January 1, 1998.

A Roth IRA is generally treated under the Internal Revenue Code like a traditional IRA with several significant exceptions. Similar to traditional IRAs, income on undistributed amounts are subject to specific limitations. Unlike traditional IRAs, contributions to Roth IRAs cannot be deducted from gross income, but qualified distributions from Roth IRAs are excludable from gross income. Listed below are some of the clarifications that came from the final regulations.

Q: What is a Roth IRA?

A: A Roth IRA is a new type of individual retirement plan that individuals can use beginning in 1998. Roth IRAs are treated like traditional IRAs except where the IRS has specified different treatment. For example, aggregate contributions (other than by a conversion or other rollover) to all an individual's Roth IRAs are not permitted to exceed \$2,000 for a taxable year.

Q: May a Roth IRA be established for the benefit of a minor child or anyone else who lacks the legal capacity to act on his or her own behalf?

A: Yes, a parent or guardian of a minor child may establish a Roth IRA on behalf of the minor child. However, in the case of any contribution to a Roth IRA estab-



lished for a minor child, the compensation of the child for the taxable year for which the contribution is made must satisfy the Code's compensation requirements, (IRS Code Section 408A(c)).

Q: Are contributions to education IRAs disregarded for purposes of applying the limitation on regular contributions to Roth IRAs?

A: Yes.

Q: What types of contributions are permitted to be made to a Roth IRA?

A: There are two types of contributions, regular contributions and qualified rollover contributions.

Q: What is the maximum aggregate amount that an individual is eligible to contribute to a Roth IRA as a regular contribution for a taxable year?

A: The maximum aggregate amount that an individual is eligible to contribute to all his or her Roth IRAs as a regular contribution for a taxable year is \$2,000 or, if less, that individual's compensation for the year. For Roth IRAs, the maximum amount

David Sedaris, bestselling author and Billie Holiday in a rendition of Away in a comic social commentator on National Public Radio's Morning Edition, will present a lecture called "Shouts and Murmurs from the Author." #### **Treating Headaches Naturally** by Carole Childers, C.N., L.N.C., All Ways Healthy

As many as 50 million Americans suffer from headaches. Chances are, you experience at least one per year-95% of women and 90% of men do. Headaches come in many forms and have a variety of causes. Often a sign of physical or psychological overload, headaches are one of the body's most powerful warning signals.

Headaches differ according to how and where the pain occurs. Some of the types of headaches include tension, cluster, simple, combination and migraine. Migraines are especially intense and are often accompanied by nausea and impaired vision.

A headache may be a symptom of stress, caffeine withdrawal, allergies, certain infectious diseases or the result of too much alcohol. A common cause of headache is simply muscle tension in the head or neck. It may also be the result of constricted or expanded blood vessels as well as altered pressure in the head, which can occur when the weather changes.

Natural methods can often be as effective as traditional methods (standard medications) in preventing or relieving headache pain, without any possible side effects. Some of these methods include relaxation, exercise, massage and homeopathic remedies. In addition, it is helpful to abstain from smoking and alcohol. Headaches can sometimes be alleviated

by a cold compress; try moistening a cloth with cold water, put two drops of peppermint oil on it and apply to the painful area for about 15 minutes. Here are some other natural treatments to try:


• Relax and Avoid Stimuli-Create a soothing environment free of external stimuli such as light and noise. Make sure the room is well ventilated. Consciously try to relax, with the help of a relaxation technique such as yoga if needed.

• Acupressure—Use your thumb and index finger and press against the bridge of your nose at the corners of your eyes. Or rub the center of the fleshy webbing between your thumb and index finger.

• A Soothing Footbath-A footbath diverts the blood supply away from your head and to your feet. Bathe your feet in a basin of warm water (95 degrees) and add hot water at five-minute intervals until the water reaches 115 degrees. After soaking your feet for five minutes, pour in cold water until the temperature is lukewarm. Put on wool socks and lie down for about 20 minutes.

• Herbal Remedies-Talk with a natural care provider about taking herbal supplements to prevent headaches. Kava kava has been shown to relieve tension headaches while feverfew and ginkgo biloba have been used to prevent migraines.



#### Women in Chicago Architecture

stitute of Chicago through March 14, 1999, celebrates the contribution that women have made to the field of American architecture. "Women in Chicago Architecture" highlights the role of women in the shaping of the city of Chicago, with a focus on 12 projects undertaken by Chicago firms in which women are principals.

Historically, women's contributions to architecture have not been fully recognized, but today there are more women in the field than ever before. They work as architects, engineers, specifications writers, landscape architects. delineators and project managers. In the US, there are only 18 female administrators, deans or directors of schools of architecture. Two of these pioneering women, however, are working in Chicago at the University of Illinois at Chicago and Illinois Institute of Technology. Of all students enrolled in the architecture programs at IIT, UIC and the School of The Art Institute of Chicago, more than 30% are women. In recent years, four women have held the position of president of the Chicago Chapter of the American Institute of Architects. Although women have not yet gained full access to equal opportunities in architecture, significant progress has been made.

#### Physical Design Critical to Alzheimer's Care

The early stages of Alzheimer's disease lies a homelike setting and an alternative can be characterized by memory loss, nervousness, and depression, but the impact of the disease is truly felt when a loved one fails to recognize friends and relatives or cannot perform ordinary tasks.

Many individuals and families turn to long-term institutional care at this stage. However, experts have questioned the suitability of a nursing home's design for those persons with dementia. With nursing homes, several factors are known to aggravate the disease and induce disorientation, including noise levels and the lack of visual cues among others. A building layout can increase the confusion people with Alzheimer's disease already experience.

A new trend in dementia care focuses on residential living, thus shifting the care away from the nursing home model. Located in Wheeling, New Perspective, Inc., is one such innovator. Established in 1994, New Perspective is the first dementia-specific sheltered care facility in Illinois. Their mission is to offer persons with Alzheimer's and their famito traditional long-term care. New Perspective's uniqueness is in its physical design-three small, freestanding cottages.

Each cottage has only 16 residents, which encourages social interaction and makes it easier for residents to orient themselves. The short hallways have no dead ends, accommodate just 12 rooms, and are filled with pictures, quilts, and artwork done by the residents.

New Perspective designed the yard to encourage residents to safely enjoy the outdoors. A secured walking path joins the three houses so residents can stay active by taking a walk, joining in group activities at another cottage, or caring for a garden.

The residential design for Alzheimer's care maximizes independence, supervision, orientation, and functioning, which results in decreased anxiety and agitation for the resident as well as peace of mind for the family







"Our program to safely invest state funds has returned more than \$1 billion over the past four years. This is a perfect time for the General Assembly to establish a 'rainy day' fund to protect taxpayers from an inevitable economic downturn."

The 1998 interest return was earned from the investment of a daily portfolio averaging about \$5.8 billion. The average rate of return was 5.46%.


# Your Personal Landscape— #1: The Entry Walk

For an individual who is not married, the dollar amount is phased out ratably between modified AGI of \$95,000 and \$110,000, for a married individual filing a joint return, between modified AGI of \$150,000 and \$160,000 and for a married individual filing separately, between modified AGI of \$0 and \$10,000.

Q: On a conversion of a regular IRA to a Roth IRA, what happens to the 4 year spread of payment of income taxes in the event of a divorce?

does not affect the application of the 4 year spread for 1998 conversions.

Q: What happens to the 4 year spread in the event of the death of the taxpayer?

**A:** The surviving spouse must be the sole beneficiary of the Roth IRA in order to elect to continue application of the 4 year

spread after the Roth IRA owner's death. Q: Can an election to recharacterize an IRA contribution from a Roth IRA to a SEP IRA or a SIMPLE IRA be made on behalf of a deceased IRA owner?

A: Yes. The election to recharacterize an IRA contribution may be made by the executor, administrator or other person charged with the duty of filing the decedent's final Federal estate tax return.

Q: Is a recharacterization subject to withholding?

A: No. A recharacterization is not a designated distribution and therefore, not subject to withholding.

Q: Is there a time limit on recharacterizations of IRAs?

A: Effective January 1, 2000, an IRA owner who converts an amount from a traditional IRA to a Roth IRA during any taxable year and then transfers that amount back to a traditional IRA by means of a recharacterization may not reconvert that amount from the traditional IRA to a Roth IRA before the beginning of the taxable year following the taxable year in which the amount was converted to a Roth IRA or, if later, the end of the 30 day period beginning on the day on which the IRA owner transfers the amount A: A change in filing status or a divorce from the Roth IRA back to a traditional IRA by means of a recharacterization.

> Q: Why would someone need to reconvert a Roth IRA to a traditional IRA?

> A: In the event the Roth IRA owner's adjusted gross income exceeds \$100,000.

> Q: May a beneficiary aggregate his or her inherited Roth IRAs with other Roth IRAs maintained by such beneficiary?

A: A beneficiary's inherited Roth IRA may not be aggregated with any other Roth IRA maintained by such beneficiary (except for other Roth IRAs that the beneficiary inherited from the same decedent), unless the beneficiary, as the spouse of the decedent and sole beneficiary of the Roth IRA, elects to treat the Roth IRA as his or her own.

These are just the major points concerning Roth IRAs. If you have any further questions, consult a tax professional or your favorite copy of the Internal Revenue Code of 1998 and Regulations for Section 408A. Have a healthy and prosperous March.

The Plan

Many people have a hard time understanding what all those symbols on a plan represent, so we thought we'd share with you some ways to understand what the drawing is trying to tell you so you'll be better able to judge the quality of your landscape design.

All plans should place your residence and all other structures on the property in their proper location (a survey is required to do this) and drawn to scale. The diameter of each circle represent the tree or shrub's

tant consideration—what you want! Do a style of drawing that helps you differentiate the different types of plants used (i.e. deciduous, evergreen, groundcovers). And always keep in mind "the right plant for the right location." The plant's mature size must always be considered so you don't have a too large or too small a plant for a given area.

### **Plant Materials**

All plants are not created equal. In your design, try to pay attention to variety in the texture, color and size of your plant materials. A good mix of heights give the landscape dimension while large groupings of the same plant can help create variety in texture and color throughout all the seasons. Also, once the choice of plants is made, ensure that they are adapted to our climate. We recommend materials that have been grown in Northern Illinois/Wisconsin nurseries. Many lawn and garden centers sell bulk plant materials with undersized root systems to accommodate volume shipping. Many of these same plants often come from the South, allowing

#### **March Tips**

• Undercoverings: Choose an overcast day to avoid the shock of the sun and remove winter windscreens from boxwoods, roses and evergreens. • Dormant Pruning: It

may still be possible to do some late pruning. · Pest Control: Using dor-

mant spray now can prevent problems late in the season.

• Transplanting: As soon as the soil thaws, transplant as needed. But don't get caught off-guard by an early spring like last year. Be careful transplanting those plants that don't take well to fall planting like Birch, Red Maple, Rhododendron, Magnolias and Dogwood. • Landscape Design: Finalize your landscape plans as early as possible to take advantage of the spring digging season.






