

Wellness Place Cancer Support Center **Introduces Executive Director and Space**

If we were to summarize the many strong suits of Patricia A. "Patti" McDonald, we could borrow from her resume: "strategic planning, organization, project management and implementation expertise, along with the communication and leadership skills needed to guide organizational development and achieve mission. Education in health administration, business and physiology. Experience establishing a successful nonprofit."

The very first Executive Director of Wellness Place, recently introduced, comes to this start-up organization with all of the above skills and more. On Thursday, March 16, The Barrington Community Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago will sponsor a bus trip to see "Monet to Moore: Millennium Gift of Sara Lee Corporation."

In 1980, Sara Lee began acquiring artwork as a tribute to its founder, Nathan Cummings, (1896-1985). A great businessman and enthusiastic art collector, his philanthropic contributions were legendary. His entrepreneurial success was partly due to his openness to new ideas; his eagerness to learn about unfamiliar aspects of life; his capacity to use personal discoveries to set new directions for himself and his business; and his ability to act quickly and decisively to achieve his objectives. These same basic characteristics also resulted in his success as an art collector.

Mr. Cummings became interested in art while living on the 21st floor of the Drake Towers in Chicago. An advertising man convinced him to have a painting made of the view from his window. He was so pleased with the painting that he soon began buying art.

Nathan Cummings started collecting on a grand scale. Although he valued the opinion of outside experts, he trusted his own judgment even more. He acquired the very best works of artists he loved most. Late 19th-century and classical 20thcentury works of art were his favorites.

Poor Report Cards—What to do?

new year, it is also the halfway point in your child's school year. The skills developed during the first half of the year will be your child's foundation for the more difficult work ahead. Shortly, schools will be distributing midyear report cards.

Report card day brings stress to many families. If you and your child are unhappy about a report card, what should you do? When you look at your child's report card and performance record, the most important things to evaluate are these: Is your child doing his or her best? Is he or she achieving his or her highest potential?

According to Dr. Raymond Huntington, founder and president of Huntington Learning Centers, "Parents know their own children. If you believe your child could be doing better than his or her grades show, you owe it to your child to remedy the situation."

"More than current grades are at stake," Huntington continues, "If grades are mediocre or poor, it means your child is not gaining valuable skills. This can come back to haunt your child later. The skills children learn in school are like building blocks. If a skill is not learned adequately, future skills will suffer. When a child tries to build advanced skills on a shaky foundation of knowledge, there is likely to be trouble ahead."

Mediocre or poor grades can result from a variety of problems. Dr. Huntington offers the following suggestions for what to do when a child brings home a poor report card:

1. Examine the situation realistically. It's important to remember that every drop in grades indicates that valuable skills are being missed. An effort should rington at 847-382-3655.

While January marks the beginning of the be made to learn and reinforce those missing skills. While this is being done, it's also important to identify and remedy the basic problem, so it does not continue to hurt your child's education.

2. What is really the problem? Is there a behavior problem? Sometimes, bright students get bad grades for behavior related activities. Does your child hand in homework? Is it correct and on time? Is your child bored with schoolwork, and so is not paying enough attention? These are not excuses; they are symptoms of different problems. You must identify the problem before you can remedy it.

3. Talk with your child. Why does your child think he or she got poor grades? Does he or she take the situation seriously? How does he or she plan to do better? It is important that your child knows you take the situation seriously. Work with your child to develop a plan that will help him to achieve better grades. Let your child know that you are supportive and that you believe in his or her abilities.

4. Talk with your child's teacher or counselor. Your child's teacher or counselor is a professional educator. What are his or her observations? What does he or she recommend?

It is important to remember that the difficulty that caused these poor grades may be a serious problem. Your child may have missed one or more important basic skills. It is vital that you get help for your child as soon as possible, before the problem gets worse.

Planned Giving—Part II: **Supporting Organizations** by Sharon L. Keller, J.D., LLM

Can it be that spring is just around the corner? With any luck, we may be able to work in our yards or play a little golf before the end of this month. Last month, I discussed Community Foundations with you. This month, I would like to continue the discussion of planned giving and discuss Supporting Organizations.

A Supporting Organization is a separate corporation or trust that is organized for a public charity's benefit. A Supporting Organization may be created to support a Community Foundation. The first step is to obtain a determination letter from the IRS that the Supporting Organization is a qualified charity under 501 (c)(3) and 509(a). The Supporting Organization must be organized and operated exclusively for the benefit of a specific charity or several public charities. The Supporting Organization must specify the supported charities by name and limit its support to those charities. The Supporting Organization must operate in close conjunction with the supported charity if it is not controlled by the supported charity.

As a result of the relationship to a public charity, a donation to a Supporting Organization qualifies for a gift deduction of up to 50% of the Adjusted Gross Income of the donor. This differs from the private foundation where the law limits the donor's charitable gift deduction to a private foundation of 30% of Adjusted Gross Income.

The Supporting Organization cannot be controlled by a substantial contributor to the Supporting Organization, members of their families, related corporations, trusts or partnerships. Although the creator of a Supporting Organization forgoes some degree of the control available if the organization were a private foundation, he or she may still sit on its board, appoint a minority of the board members and be involved in the investment decisions. The supported charity must appoint one or

more directors, trustees or officers of the Supporting Organization.

The Supporting Organization must be operated, supervised, controlled by or operated together with the public charity it is supporting. 




REMODELING 2000... STORY #1

When asked to comment on the difficulties of designing a "custom





BAAC Awards Artsboost 2000 Grants

The Barrington Area Arts Council (BAAC) tributed by BHS students, \$1,140. and the Illinois Arts Council, a state agency, are pleased to announce the recipients of the Artsboost 2000 Grants.

This year, BAAC matched a \$11,250 Community Arts Access Grant from the Illinois Arts Council with \$2,965 to award Artsboost Grants totaling \$14,215.







New Benefits for Taxpayers Who File Electronically

Revenue Director Glen Bower, Comptroller Dan Hynes and State Treasurer Judy Baar Topinka unveiled initiatives to encourage taxpayers to file their tax returns electronically.

One initiative is designed to pay accurately filed state income tax refunds "in about 10 days" to taxpayers who both file electronically and have their refunds directly deposited into their bank accounts.

Topinka and Bower also announced an expansion of the treasurer's office credit card program that will let Illinoisans pay their income taxes by credit card.

The three state officials touted the ease, cost-effectiveness and speed of electronic commerce. "By paying refunds in about 10 days and allowing credit card payments, we give taxpayers reasons to use electronic filing," said Bower.

"This program is a win-win situation," Hynes said. "Taxpayers receive their money more quickly and the state saves money in the process."

Hynes said that more than 126,000 taxpayers, one out of five eligible, used direct deposit for their income tax refund last year.

Topinka said that in July she negotiated a master credit card agreement that lets agencies like the Department of Revenue offer this service for the first time. Taxpay-

ers can make payments by calling a tollfree number and using MasterCard, Discover or American Express.

"America continues to move toward a paperless society, and I believe that government should adjust to the changing times to better serve its citizens," Topinka said. "By allowing Illinoisans to pay their taxes through the use of credit/debit cards, we can offer an efficient way to conduct state business faster while providing quality service."

"We've been working with Director Bower and his staff over the past several months and I'm pleased that they have signed on to our program. It's a tremendous opportunity for the taxpayers of the state," Topinka added.

Besides offering faster refunds and credit card payments, the Department has made several other enhancements to its electronic filing program, including:

• Letting taxpayers choose among four electronic filing options instead of preselecting taxpayers who can file in a specific way.

• Tripling the number of taxpayers who can file via the Internet.

• Providing a Personal Identification Number (PIN) in tax booklets that can be used as a signature for electronic filers.

• Eliminating preprinted social security

Director Bower encouraged taxpayers to carefully review the criteria on page four of their tax booklets to select the electronic tax filing method that is best for them. Options include:

• I-File—Free Internet filing through the department's website, open to taxpayers whose only subtraction is their state tax refund and whose only credit is the property tax credit, using the PIN as a signature.

• TeleFile—Free filing by touch-tone reduce the scrutiny telephone available to taxpayers who have no additions or subtractions and no credits. Taxpayers must complete the TeleFile worksheet before calling the early in the season.


• E-File $\frac{f^2}{f}$ Electronic filing through a tax professional, available to more than 5 million taxpayers.

• Retail Software—Filing through software either purchased off the shelf or offered on-line.


Each electronic filing method provides a confirmation number so the taxpayer can prove that they have filed and each performs computations which eliminate math errors.

Bower said the faster refunds will not reduce the scrutiny of tax filing and that each electronic return will go undergo the same review as a paper document. And, he urged taxpayers to file their returns early in the season.

Also included in the exhibition is a group of seven important Renaissance portraits from the Art Institute's own collection.

Raphael and Titian offers a rare opportunity for American viewers. The Donna Velata has never before received a public showing outside Europe, and its presence in this exhibition represents only the third time a Raphael painting has ever been shown at the Art Institute. Also, the Titian picture has been shown only once before in the United States, and this is its first major public display since a recent restoration.

The Raphael and Titian portraits are on loan to the Art Institute from the renowned Pitti Gallery in Florence where they are considered to be two of the greatest masterpieces



This extraordinary loan arrangement is part of an unusual cultural art exchange whereby the Art Institute lent seven paintings by Claude Monet to the Pitti Gallery for a dossier exhibition on that artist. On view at the Pitti, June 1 through September 1, 1999, it was the first exhibition devoted solely to Monet ever mounted in Italy.

Raphael and Titian presents the two Pitti treasures along with a group of six Italian Renaissance paintings and one drawing from the Art Institute's own collection, all but one from the 16th century. They are: Baccio Bandinelli's, Two Studies of the Head of a Youth (c. 1550); Portrait of a Noblewoman Dressed in Mourning, c. 1593, by Jacopo da Empoli (Jacopo Chimenti); Ridolfo Ghirlandaio's Portrait of a Gentleman (c. 1505); Giovanni Battista Moroni's Gian Lodovico Madruzzo (1551-52); Portrait of a Gentleman, c. 1590, by Palma il Giovane (Jacopo Palma); Alessandro de Medici, 1534-35, by Pontormo (Jacopo Carrucci); and Ugolino de Nerio's

Virgin and Child Enthroned with Saints cause of its beauty and its influence on Peter, Paul, John the Baptist, Dominic and a Donor (1325-35).

Seen together, this carefully assembled grouping attempts to reveal not only how the Renaissance masters Raphael and Titian profoundly changed portraiture in 16th-century Italy, but also how the conventions they established can be seen in portraits produced throughout Europe over the next 300 years.

The Donna Velata is unquestionably Raphael's greatest portrait. He was inspired to paint it partly as a response to Leonardo da Vinci's Mona Lisa. In his treatment, the younger painter worked to develop his own ideal of female beauty and deportment, which, unlike Leonardo's mysterious and idiosyncratic painting, is quite accessible and possessed of a natural grace-qualities that contemporary artists in Italy and later painters throughout Europe found they could imitate to some degree. The Donna Velata's graceful pose and even her facial type were emulated in works by artists ranging from Guido Reni in the 17th century

later artists, the Donna Velata became one of the most famous pictures in the world. Adding a bit of notoriety to the picture's fame was the belief, erroneously held for centuries, that the subject was Raphael's mistress.

In its way, Titian's Young Englishman has made nearly as much of a mark on the history of portraiture as the Raphael picture. Dating to the period of Titian's early maturity; the Young Englishmanwhose identity and true nationality remain unknown-is one of the finest examples to be found of the Venetian master's signature portrait mode with its grand yet informal presentation of its subject. The suave, unaffected pose and psychological directness of the sitter inspired countless other portraits by such artists as Rubens, Van Dyck and Rembrandt. Displayed with the Raphael Donna Velata, the Young Englishman will provide a telling contrast both in terms of gender-based portrait formats-the dynamic standing male in expansive posture versus the seated, contained female-and the different styles of to Ingres in the 19th century.
