






#### Mozart's Don Giovanni Comes to Woodstock Opera House

The American Opera Group will present Mozart's Don Giovanni at the Woodstock Opera House in Woodstock, IL on May 21 and 22 at 8 PM. The performance promises to be a thoughtful interpretation of the nightmarish tale of an seemingly amorous rogue, his sexual adventures and attempts of retribution by three ladies whom he has deceived.

Young and talented, The American Opera Group, under the directorship of Paul Williams and associate artistic director Nicolas DiVirgilio, consists of a cast of 26 energetic and gifted professionals. Incorporated in 1996, and with only one performance to their credit, the company selected Don Giovanni because, among other reasons, it is a wonderful tragic/comedy about a young nobleman obsessed with amorous conquests. "It's like a modern day soap opera... unconfined crimes of buried wickedness," explained Williams, who is also the company's founder.

Williams' extensive theatrical career includes well over 150 different productions in Germany, Italy, Canada, Mexico and the

USA. Recently, he was stage director for Die Komische Kammer Oper München, in Munich. Germany last summer where he plans to return in June to direct another opera. His other credits include: stage director for Die Bühnen der Stadt Köln (Cologne, Germany); The San Francisco Opera; The Lyric Opera of Chicago; and general director of the Opera Theater of San Antonio.

Nicholas DiVirgilio, associate artist director, brings a wealth of experience. Retired leading tenor of the Metropolitan and San Francisco Operas, and many of the European Opera houses, he will be intimately involved in matters concerning the artist. DiVirgilio is Professor of Voice at University of Illinois at Champaign Urbana.

Francesco Milioto, as musical director, worked with Williams last summer in Germany. Williams was so impressed with him, he asked him what opera he would like to conduct for American Opera Group. Don Giovanni was his response. Milioto has conducted numerous performances in Italy and Canada.

#### **Art Associates Spring Excursion**

Lake Forest's Ragdale Foundation, Tiffany church windows, Barat College sculpture and the historic Deerpath Inn are all part of the spring excursion organized by the Barrington Community Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago for Wednesday, May 19.

The Ragdale Foundation was established by poet Alice Hayes in 1976 to provide a place for talented artists, writers, poets, dancers and musicians to come together at a place of work and retreat. The artist's community is now the fourth largest in the country.

Alice's grandfather, Chicago architect Howard Van Doren Shaw, designed and built "Ragdale" as a summer place on a 50-acre farm, oriented to take advantage of the "Italian sunsets" seen from Green Bay Road. For Shaw, the name, taken from a dissimilar English manor house, symbolized Wordsworth's ideal of "plain living and high thinking." It is built in the English Arts and Crafts mode-a simple English cottage-style house with an irregular double-gabled facade. The interior includes an Inglenook in the beamed living room, a MacIntosh-style dining room fireplace, a barrel-vaulted entrance gallery and many pieces of furniture designed by

Shaw himself.

The Ragdale landscape includes the lawn, the prairie and an English formal garden.

John T. McCutcheon, the Chicago Tribune's Pulitzer-winning cartoonist, based the prairie pictured in his famous cartoon, "Injun Summer," on the prairie at Ragdale. He married into the Shaw family of artists.

Ragdale was the first of many estates designed and built by Shaw on North Green Bay Road between 1887 and the beginning of World War I. It is perhaps the last to survive intact. In 1986, the Estate was donated to the City of Lake Forest and the property transferred to Lake Forest Open Lands. This City/Foundation/Open Lands partnership will continue to protect this example of classic estate architecture and landscape.

In addition to Ragdale, tour-goers will visit the First Presbyterian Church of Lake Forest to view the many Tiffany windows, some resurrected and restored for the 1991 renovation project of the church.

The sculpture at Barat College is another stop and the Deerpath Inn is the luncheon destination.

The original Deerpath Inn was located



He wanted to present his operas outside the hustle-bustle of the city; in the country where people could go and more fully experience the beauty of the opera because of the quiet and natural beauty of the surrounding area. In 1876, Wagner began The Bayreuth Festival in that small Bavarian town. Even today, the popularity of The Bayreuth Festival continues."

#### **Poor Results on Nationwide Reading Test Push Anxious Parents to Learning Centers**







#### **Elder Care Bill Advances**

House Bill 77, which is designed to encourage Illinois citizens to save money for their long-term health care needs through a special program in the Treasurer's Office, passed the House last March by a vote of 113-3. The bill was sponsored by Rep. Susan Garrett (D-Lake Forest). According to Illinois State Treasurer Judy Baar Topinka, the legislation's goal is to establish the financial infrastructure to assist citizens in planning and investing for their future long-term health care needs.

"Planning for health care needs later in life is vital for all citizens," Topinka said. "Everyone wants to live an independent lifestyle as long as possible. But as a person's advancing age takes its toll, there is a continuum of care that is available to help individuals lead a productive life well into their senior years. Planning for the financial demands of elder care is a crucial issue that we must confront to ensure that our later years continue to be fulfilling."

HB 77 calls for the following measures: • The State Treasurer would develop and implement an education program and marketing strategies designed to inform residents about the options available for financing long-term health care and the need to accumulate the financial re-

sources necessary to pay for that care.

• The Treasurer would receive moneys from Illinois residents into the fund and invest moneys within the fund on their behalf.

• The Treasurer would develop, publish and implement an investment policy covering the management of funds in the Elder Care Savings Fund.

• The State Treasurer would serve as an ex-officio member of the Elder Care Trust Authority.

• Income derived from investments in the fund would be exempt from state taxes with the exception of estate, transfer and inheritance taxes.

• Funds could be applied to custodial care services; care in a hospice licensed under the Hospice Program Licensing Act; or long-term health care services for the aged, the disabled or persons diagnosed with HIV or AIDS or a related condition. These services would include, without limitation: chore-housekeeping services, a personal care attendant, adult day care, assistive equipment, home renovation, home-delivered meals and emergency response systems and care in an assisted living establishment.

#### History of The Living Trust by Sharon L. Keller, J.D., LLM

The Living Trust, also known as the Revocable Trust, is a legal entity created to hold title to assets. It has been used to enable an individual or a family to hold title to assets so that the assets can eventually pass to the heirs without the intervention of any further legal process (probate). The Living Trust is not a tax shelter, but rather it is a means by which people can avoid probate and married couples can fully utilize the federal estate tax equivalent exemptions given to them by Congress. Reportedly, fewer than 1% of the people in the United States have discovered the value of the Living Trust and have taken advantage of its many benefits

Many people ask, "When did the concept of Living Trusts start?" The Living Trust is not really a new concept; it comes from English common law, which is the very basis for the legal system of the United States. The concept of a Trust existed long before this nation was conceived; the origins of a Trust go as far back as AD 800 to the days of the Roman Empire. In fact, a Trust became the preferred method of holding property in Europe during the Middle Ages.

The English people adopted the Trust from Roman law as early as the 12th century to preserve their property from the many abuses under the crown. For example, a landowner was obligated to provide relief, or money, to help supplement the lord of the land for numerous causes (such as the marriage of the lord's daughter or the knighting of the lord's son). In addition, the king imposed nearly 100 forms of tax. The landowner was prohibited from selling his land or dividing the land among his children or grandchildren. If the landowner were convicted of a crime, he forfeited all he owned to the lord or king, leaving his family destitute.

Accusing a peasant of a crime was a very common means of acquiring the peasant's land and, in the end, was quite profitable for the landlord. The peasants soon found that the Trust provided a means to protect their lands from this wrongful acquisition by the noble of the land.

The practice of holding title to land in a Trust eventually became commonplace. The Trust permitted one party (the Trustee) to hold the property for the benefit of the owner and eventually to pass this property to the owner's children. Over the years (and following continued abuse by the Crown), passing title of land to a Trust became an ordinary practice.

By 1535, the king and his nobles challenged the legality of the Trust and attempted to prohibit its use with the "Statute of Uses." The king and his nobles considered the Trust to be evil because it permitted privacy of transfer, legal avoidance of unreasonable taxes and regulations, preservation of the estate of convicted criminals and, most important, loss of revenue to the king and his lords.

The challenge to the Trust fell upon the have a healthy and prosperous May!



common law judges of England in The Chancery Court, the highest court in the land. The judges, who had absolute jurisdiction over legal estates, upheld the validity of the Trust concept. Within the next five years, the "Statute of Uses" was effectively abandoned—and the Trust was securely embedded as part of English common law, having survived the formidable challenge by the king and his nobles.

The colonists brought the Trust to America, where Patrick Henry is given the first recorded credit for drafting a Trust on this continent. In 1765, he wrote a Trust for Robert Morris, governor of the colony of Virginia. Thus, the Trust was written more than two decades before the adoption of the U.S. Constitution.

Historically, the Living Trust has been used by people of great wealth, such as the late President Kennedy, William Waldorf Astor, John D. Rockefeller, H.L. Hunt (The Texas oil billionaire) and J. Paul Getty. Until very recently, very few people in the United States had Living Trusts; however, as people are becoming more aware of the advantages, more and more are adopting the Living Trust as a way to preserve their estates and avoid probate.

In 1990, The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) commissioned a two-year study on the probate process. AARP set out to determine whether the avoidance of probate efforts were warranted through the use of a Living Trust. The answer was: yes!! The AARP study established that a Living Trust "completely avoids probate's public scrutiny, delays and costs." Another study set out to see if an estate could be too small to reap the benefits of a Living Trust. The study provided evidence that the greatest impact of probate costs was on estates of \$100,000 and less. In fact, the study found that the impact on estates valued at less than \$10,000 was so great that these estates were eliminated from the study to avoid skewing the results. For example, one \$10,000 estate incurred probate costs of \$7,400, leaving only \$2,600 for the heirs. The study showed that the greatest percentage of the probate costs burden was borne by the smaller estates.

The Living Trust is an entity that is available to all of us. It is the best way to assure the immediate transfer of assets upon death with the least impact of estate taxes. See you next month. Until then, have a healthy and prosperous May!







#### **Good Shepherd Hospital Receives State** Approval to Build New "Medical Model" **Health and Fitness Center**

Good Shepherd Hospital in Barrington has received final approval from the State of Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board to construct an innovative, freestanding "medical model" health and fitness center that will provide prevention, wellness and rehabilitation services for residents of Barrington and surrounding communities. The facility will be located on 4.75 acres at the intersection of Barrington Road and Cornell Avenue in Barrington.

The 68,000 square foot, \$17 million dollar facility will feature medical programming that complements the hospital's clinical pathways including women's health, children's services, cardiac rehabilitation, physical therapy, behavioral health, oncology, senior health, complimentary medicine, a spine clinic, fitness programs to reduce illness and prevent disease, fitness programs for the physically and mentally challenged, a health resources library and community health education.

The center's foundation is based on a unique "medical model" philosophy as opposed to a "fitness club" philosophy, providing members and patients alike with a range of health care services designed not only to address an individual's physical (fitness) needs, but to help foster healthy lifestyle changes and, when necessary, the appropriate use of medical care. The center will be staffed by highly trained professionals such as exercise physiologists and licensed physical therapists. These professionals can, on an as-needed basis, work directly with physicians and offer a medical monitoring component.

The center will offer a continuum of health services offered by the hospital and will be overseen by a multi-disciplinary Medical Advisory Board chaired by the Center's Medical Director.

The new facility will also feature a Spine Center. Building on its strengths in Fitness Center is anticipated to open its surgery and physical medicine, the Spine doors to the public within 18-20 months.

Center will be the only program of its type in the Northwest Suburbs. It will offer comprehensive, integrated care for those suffering from chronic and acute spine conditions related to degenerative spine disease, herniated discs, compressed spinal cords and other conditions.

To help patients and their families navigate the health care process with ease and to ensure that care is delivered efficiently, the team will also include a designated care manager

The genesis of this project was a result of Good Shepherd's Governing Council directed—Healthy Communities Task Force, that performed a health needs assessment of the hospital's service areas and is supported by patient survey information, physician interviews, market studies and a financial feasibility analysis.

The project has garnered outstanding community support including the Villages of Barrington, South Barrington and Wauconda; the Barrington Park District; the Buehler YMCA; numerous local officials; community groups; esteemed civic leaders; and local businesses. The Health and

are the sun's invisible "burning" rays. They cause sunburn and skin cancer. The higher the UV index level the greater sun's UV rays are and the faster you will burn.

How much UV exposure reaches you depends: (1) time of day-10 AM to 2 PM is maximum, a good rule is "if shadow is shorter than you are take extra precaution" (2) season/altitude-the air is cleaner and thinner high up, "the higher the altitude the greater UV exposure" (3) where you live or visit-the closer to the equator the stronger the rays (4) length of time spent in the sun-don't forget to include doing daily activities, walking the dog, waiting for the bus, sunroof exposure as sun exposure.

Facts: (1) Protecting skin during the first 18 years can reduce risk of some types of cancer by 78%. (2) Cataracts are also associated with UV exposure. (3) Snow reflects sun back about 85% of UV rays.

Use sunscreen of an SPF 15 or higher whenever you spend time outdoors. Apply 1/2 hour before going out or apply daily to face and arms as you would make up in the morning.


What is Ultraviolet Radiation UV? UV rays utes with nothing before burning. By using SPF 15, it provides 15 times more protection or 150 minutes before burning. UVA rays penetrate skin more deeply (thus A=Aging); UVB burn rays damage the epidermis increasing the risk of skin cancer. Don't forget to apply to ears, toes and around the eyes and wear sunglasses. Avoid tanning salons. Practice skin selfexamination: Skin growth increases in size and appears pearly, translucent, tan, black, brown or multicolored.

Mole changes in size, color or texture. Spot or growth continues to itch, hurt, crust, scab, erode or bleed. Open sore that lasts more than four weeks or heals and reopens.

Tips for Children: Don't use sunscreen on babies under 6 months. Keep in shade. Try fragrance-free-scents attract bugs. Use sunscreen while playing outdoors, don't forget ears, toes, nose and fingers. Make sure sitters know and follow your rules for sun protection. Some medications cause skin sun sensitivity. Avoid 10 AM to 3 PM exposure.

#### Toothbrushing—A Hazard to Your Health?

The headline article of the April 13, 1999 Business Section of the Chicago Tribune outlines a class action suit filed against two toothbrush manufacturers and The American Dental Association. The suit alleges that there are potential risks to teeth and gums with the use of a toothbrush and that their clients suffered damage that would have been avoidable if there were instructions in the toothbrush packaging and a warning on the brush.

Without expounding on what I consider ridiculous allegations, let's see how gum recession might be mistakenly blamed on tooth brushing trauma.

It used to be thought that toothbrush trauma was caused by incorrect tooth brushing. A newer discovery made possible with electron microscopy is that, in patients who grind their teeth, the teeth actually bend during the grinding action. This results in microscopic fracturing and loss of little "chunks" of tooth, starting at the base of the enamel. Frequently, there is sensitivity.

Yes, the toothbrush brushed off these loose bits of tooth structure, but these fragments were already loose. It is analo-

gous to a street cleaner cleaning a street. If the pavement is in good condition, no damage occurs. But if the surface is roughened from frost damage, the loose fragments are swept away-it wasn't the street sweeper's fault.





# Shoulder Thermal Capsular Shrinkage The arthroscopic solution for the painful unstable shoulder

#### Shoulder Instability

The shoulder is not a true ball and socket joint. It is more like a ball (humeral head) and saucer (glenoid). The humeral head is held in the glenoid by ligaments that provide stability to the shoulder joint. Oftentimes, athletes and laborers injure their shoulders, which stretches out the ligaments. These patients then develop increased loosening of the shoulder whereby the humeral head tends to "pop out" of the glenoid. This is known as dislocation or subluxation. This causes a feeling of apprehension in using the shoulder in certain positions and pain. Recurrent subluxation or dislocation defines the unstable shoulder.

#### Diagnosis

The diagnosis of shoulder instability is based on the history that the patient gives the physician, i.e. Did the patient have significant trauma to the shoulder? Did the patient have an acute dislocation? Does the patient do repetitive strenuous shoulder activities on the job or in sports activities that put excessive strain on the shoulder, causing instability? Also, a careful physical exam by a qualified shoulder specialist can usually provide the necessary evidence to make the diagnosis of shoulder instability. X-rays and MRI's can be helpful, but are not always necessary.

#### Treatment

The treatment algorithm for instability is the following: Conservative nonoperative treatment such as physical therapy and anti-inflammatories for a prolonged period of time to help strengthen the secondary stabilizers of the shoulder joint is the first line of treatment. If this fails, the ultimate and definitive treatment option is surgery.


#### Surgery—Open Versus Arthroscopic

The open technique involves a long incision and extensive surgical dissection. The ligaments are then approached and cut, and then oversewn one over the other which, in effect, tightens the shoulder and decreases the volume of the shoulder joint. This necessarily limits the patient's range of motion slightly. The surgical repair has to be protected for several weeks before aggressive physical therapy can commence. This procedure usually cures the problem but could end up limiting the athlete's or laborer's motion, thereby hampering their careers.

#### Arthroscopic Thermal Capsular Shrinkage

Thermal capsular shrinkage involves three tiny incisions or portals the size of the end of a normal pen. The surgeon does all the work through these tiny incisions arthroscopically (see sketch). The loose ligaments are treated with a radiofrequency probe which uses heat to "shrink" the loose ligaments. This, in turn, tightens up the shoulder and prevents further episodes of subluxation or dislocation. This new technique allows the patient to start rehabilitation earlier and does not limit the patient's range of motion nearly as much as the open procedure. It also permits the patient to return to his or her sport or job activities at an earlier date.



#### The William H. Miller Conservation Award to Vicki Klein, Pam Jackson

As Martin Luther King noted many years ago, "Our talents, our abilities are God's gift to us. How we use them is our gift to God."

This year's William H. Miller Conservation Award winners have used their wonderful organizational skills; their interest in conservation and the environment; and their passion for teaching their own children and other children to appreciate the natural world, to create a unique outdoor classroom at North Barrington School.

Beginning more than a year ago, Vicki Klein and Pam Jackson, members of the school's Environmental Awareness Committee, looked at the plans for a new school and came up with the idea of using what was to be an enclosed courtyard as an "interactive habitat" to teach kindergartners through 5th grade students more about the natural world. The plan was soon expanded to include primarily native landscaping for the entire school.

Their plan includes a prairie area, butterfly garden, bird sanctuaries and walking paths surrounded by wildflowers. They visited other schools in Illinois and Wisconsin that had created an outdoor classroom and learned that outdoor classrooms could be used for language arts, social studies, physical education, art, photography, music and, of course, science classes.

The two women worked throughout 1998 to organize the project. In addition to obtaining the support of Principal Deborah Cross, the women sought ideas from teachers and students and applied for and received several grants to fund the project.

Most important, however, was their success in getting the whole school community—parents, teachers and children excited about the project and the conservation principles it would teach to students. Dozens of families provided financial support and turned out for the initial work days this fall, learning about conservation and native landscaping. Perhaps we will be able to recruit a few of them to CFC work days sometime soon!

Eventually, the whole school grounds will include primarily native landscaping which, as we all know, will reduce costs of landscape installation and maintenance, require little watering beyond what nature provides and virtually eliminate the need for mowing and lawn chemicals.

It is fair to say that these two women have taken a leadership role in creating a model school; incorporating conservation principles into education in a community already known for taking a strong stand in supporting conservation activities.


#### Your Personal Landscape III— Screen Planting for the Front Garden

I will be remodeling my kitchen later this year. How can I tell if an island will work in my new kitchen?

aid traffic flow and help refine work areas. "Ideally, I allow 42" of clearance between the island and adjoining walls or cabinets. In a huge-traffic area, a space where appliance doors will be opened or a multi-cook kitchen, 48" or more is better. Sometimes the aisle can be less than 42" with clever appliance placement and space planning. I often suggest using an open ironing board to get the feel of an island in an existing kitchen."

Is it a good idea to put my sink or burners on the island?

Debbie suggests the following: "A second sink installed in the island is a good idea. It allows your children or guests a water source for drinks or hand washing, away from the sink you are using for meal preparation. Because the sink is one of the busiest areas in the kitchen, installing your main sink in the island can be nice. "Burners on the island, however, raise the issue of safety. The island becomes a natural gathering place for children or guests. It is not safe or comfortable to be that close to this hot surface. However, sometimes the island is the best place for a cooktop due to the layout of the room. It would be important in that situation to Kaye Hathaway feels that islands should work closely with your kitchen designer to create an island that addresses those safety issues."

In my new addition, the island will divide my kitchen and family room. What can I do to make my island functional but attractive so I don't feel like I'm cooking in the family room?

"We are fortunate to have to have so many furniture-type details which can be incorporated into islands," says Kaye. "In our showroom, we show both an arts and crafts style leg system and elaborately carved counter top brackets, and these are only a small sample of the possibilities for your new kitchen. I often make the part of the island closest to the family room a bit taller to provide a visual barrier to block the clutter of meal preparation, while still allowing the cook to be part of the action.'

#### What Makes a Kitchen Country?


At some point (and it may be soon), you will probably want to remodel your kitchen, and you may be leaning toward a "country" kitchen. 
## **Everything That's Old Is New Again**





any sensation. This type of anesthesia is eral Anesthesia. often used for dental work and commonly referred to as Novacaine. In most facial procedures, a dilute solution of Epinephrine is added to the anesthetic to constrict the blood vessels and minimize bleeding. For this reason, the area that has been injected appears blanched or white for several hours following injection. Straight local anesthetic is used for minor procedures, such as removal of moles and other small lesions and also for suturing lacerations.

Twilight Anesthesia is another type of anesthesia. This is a combination of intravenous sedation with local anesthetic. In this type of anesthesia, the patient is usually sedated to the point of being unconscious during the injection of the local anesthetic. Following the injection, the patient is allowed to wake up somewhat to remain in a state of drowsiness. Often times, the patient will sleep during the procedures performed under Twilight Anesthesia.

General Anesthesia is when intravenous medication is given, rendering the patient unconscious. The patient remains in this unconscious state throughout the procedure. Often times, local anesthetic is injected while the patient is under Gen-

The advantages and disadvantages of each type of anesthesia is discussed with you during the consultation. Who Performs Anesthesia?

For any anesthesia other than local (injectable), a certified anesthetist (CRNA) is used. There is a small fee for their services that may be covered by your insurance company, depending upon the surgery performed. We feel it is important to have a qualified CRNA for the patient's safety and comfort. This also frees the surgeon and enables him to fully focus on the procedure being performed.

#### **Is Any Testing Required Prior to Surgery?**

If Twilight or General Anesthesia is to be used, bloodwork will be required. This is usually done at the office and is included in our surgical fee, but can be performed at any hospital or outside laboratory of your choice.

In addition, a brief physical exam will be done prior to surgery. Women of child bearing age will have a urine pregnancy test the day of surgery. If you have any history of a serious medical condition, we will check with your primary care doctor before surgery is recommended.
