Mr. SABO. Mr. Speaker, today I rise to bring to the attention of the American people and my colleagues here in Congress two important and noteworthy dates. They are both very significant to our fellow citizens and to our dear friends, the people of Norway.

Next week—April 9, 1990—is the 50th anniversary of the Nazi invasion of Norway. April 21, 1990 is the 50th anniversary of the death of the first American serviceman in uniform in World War II.

The Norwegian people will be commemorating their resistance to the April 9 invasion in solemn ceremonies throughout the country. It is appropriate that we too honor the Norwegian people's heroic resistance to totalitarian aggression. The steadfast leadership and refusal to bend under pressure of King Haakon VII were—and remain today—examples to the world of personal and national moral courage.

The contributions of the Norwegian Merchant Marine during the war also deserve special mention. And the heroism and persistence of the men and women of the Norwegian resistance forces must never be forgotten. They remain bright shining testimony of the bravery of these freedom-loving people.

On April 21, 1940—nearly 18 months before the United States entered World War II—the first American serviceman was killed. Capt.

Robert Moffat Losey, a military attache assigned to the American Embassy in Oslo, was killed in a Nazi bombing raid on the town of Dombås in the county of Dovre in Norway.

On the 50th anniversary of that date, Norwegian officials from Oslo, Dombås, and Dovre, representatives from the American Embassy, military officers from the armed services of both the United States and Norway, and representatives of the Sons of Norway will participate in ceremonies at the Memorial Park in Dombås. They will honor the memory of Captain Losey and the many Norwegians who died or suffered as a result of the invasion and subsequent occupation.

Mr. Speaker, as the son of Norwegian immigrants, I am very proud of the nation of my ancestors. It remains the home of many of my relatives today.

Norwegian immigrants to the United States have enriched our land far beyond our ability to repay. The contributions they have made are especially important and evident in the State I have the privilege of representing, Minnesota, and the State of my birth, North Dakota.

While my pride and warmth for Norway is personal in many ways, I encourage all Americans to join me in expressing our respect, admiration, and appreciation for the Norwegian people. Norway was a brave and true ally during World War II. The Norwegian people suffered and fought valiantly in that great struggle against tyranny.

Today Norway remains a staunch NATO ally and a firm supporter of Western democratic ideals. Let us join together with our great Norwegian friends and remember with the utmost respect the sacrifices and hardships that began on April 9, 1940 and the noble American life that ended on April 21, 1940.


Dear Mr. Lee:

Will you please note the contents of this letter and then forward either the letter or a minute of the same to the secretary of the Class of 1907?

Rev. Leon A. Losey, '07, slept away Sunday morning, July 8th, in the Miles City Hospital after a brief illness and an unsuccessful operation for ruptured appendix. It fell to my lot to conduct the funeral the following Wednesday, July 11th, with both the service and interment at Terry, having been called home from Synod for the purpose.

Mr. Losey after his graduation from Auburn Theological Seminary in 1911 held pastorates in the Westminster Church of Auburn, N. Y., and the Presbyterian Church at Preble, N. Y. He left Preble and spent a year in Inter-Church Work and then came west where he was pastor for two years in our church at Basin, Wyoming, whence he came last September to Terry, Montana. He had been doing a fine work at Terry and the whole community where he was the only pastor in the county is heartbroken.

Please communicate also to the '07 Class Secretary that Mrs. Losey is desirous of locating as a pastoral assistant, director of religious education, or director of women and girls' work in some church preferably east. Robert the son, the '07 Class Boy, will be ready for college next year (1924). There is also a ten year daughter. Mrs. Losey is fully qualified for such a position as I have indicated and I cannot commend her too highly. It is quite possible that some of Leon's Class may be able to help her locate.

Captain Robert M. Losey, Killed Sunday in Norway, Was 1907's "Class Boy"—Mother Taught Here.

Captain Robert Moffet Losey, whose death by a German bomb in a raid at Dombas, Norway, on Sunday has been announced, was the son of the late Reverend Leon A. Losey, class of 1907 at Princeton University, and the late Mrs. Losey, who was Miss Nellie Moore, a resident at Princeton while teaching at the Mt. Lucas School. After the death of Captain Losey's father, who was a Presbyterian minister, Mrs. Losey became associated in the work of the First Presbyterian Church of Trenton, during the ministry of Reverend Peter K. Emmons.

Captain Robert Losey was the "class boy" of 1907 at Princeton, but elected to attend West Point, where he was graduated with high standing in 1929. He was detailed to the Air Corps and was graduated from the Advanced Flying School at Kelly Field, Texas. Later he was assigned for graduate work at California Institute of Technology, where he received Master of Science degrees in Meteorology and in Aero Engineering in 1937.

He had been with the Chief of Air Corps at Washington, previous to last January, when he was sent to Helsinki as Assistant Military Attache for Air, to the United States Legation in Finland. A short time ago he had been transferred to Stockholm.

At the time of his death Captain Losey was assisting in the transfer of a party of families of the American Legation and Consulate at Oslo. Beside his wife, Captain Losey is survived by a sister, Mrs. Morris Lee of Douglasston, Long Island, who as Miss Margaret Losey often visited in Princeton, and an aunt, Miss Iillian Losey of New York.

Captain Robert M. Losey, U.S.A., who was killed by a splinter from an exploding German aero bomb in Norway on April 21, was Bob Losey, our class boy, son of our late classmate, the Rev. Leon A. Losey. Bob, who was in the air service, had been assigned as attaché to the American Legation in Finland. He was in the danger zone of Norway as observer and was directing the evacuation of American citizens when he met his death. He was thirty-one years old and was graduated from West Point in 1929.

Bob's ambition from his boyhood was towards a military career and he had achieved a brilliant one, obtaining a captaincy at an early age. Despite his military duties, he never lost his love for Princeton and was a frequent attendant at our reunions, leading the 1907 parade on several occasions. Bob's father died in 1923 and his mother in 1939. He is survived by his wife, Kay Banta Losey, and a sister, Mrs. Morris Lee of Washington, D.C.

Award

Captain Robert M. Losey was the first United States Army officer to be killed in the present European war. A meteorological officer of the air corps, he was serving as an official military observer attached to the United States Legation for Norway and Sweden when, on April 21, 1940, he was the victim of an air attack on Dombas, Norway.

Captain Losey was not a Princeton graduate, but, son of the late Reverend Leon Losey '07 and class boy of 1907, he was, according to a member of 1907, "the finest Princeton alumnus who never went there."

Recently, the Institute of the Aeronautical Sciences founded an award to be presented yearly for outstanding contributions to the science of meteorology as applied to aeronautics. Its name: the Robert M. Losey Award.

Son of James Taggart and Jennie Maria (Merritt) Losey, was born May 28, 1880, in Nelson Pa. He made a public confession of his faith in the First Presbyterian Church of Beecher's Island (Nelson), Pa., at the age of twelve. His preparatory studies were pursued in the Cook Academy at Montour Falls, N.Y., and he graduated from Princeton University in 1907. During the next year he attended the Moody Bible Institute. He entered the Seminary at Princeton in 1908 as a partial student, remaining one year. From 1909 to 1910 he was stated supply of the church at Esperance, N.Y. He was licensed by the Presbytery of Wellsboro, Sept. 22, 1909, and ordained by the Presbytery of Albany, May 31, 1910. He entered the Auburn Theological Seminary in 1910, graduating therefrom in 1911 and remaining a year longer as a graduate student. He was pastor of the Westminster Church of Auburn, N.Y., from April 26, 1911, to Jan. 23, 1915; pastor of the church at Preble, N.Y., from 1915 to 1918, and pastor of the church at Byron, N.Y., from 1918 to 1919. He was secretary of the Inter-Church World Movement from 1919 to 1920, stated supply of the First Church of Basin, Wyo., from 1920 to 1922, and pastor of the church at Terry, Wyo., from April 6, 1923, until his death there, July 8, 1923, following an operation for appendicitis, in the 44th year of his age. He was buried at Terry.

He was married June 13, 1907, in May's Landing, N.J., to Nellie Madeline Moore, who with one son and one daughter survives him.

1. FIFTY YEARS AGO THIS MONTH, THE FIRST AMERICAN SERVICEMAN DIED IN THE SECOND WORLD WAR. HE WAS A MILITARY ATTACHE SERVING IN THE LINE OF DUTY. ON 21 APR 1940, TWENTY MONTHS BEFORE THE U.S. OFFICIALLY ENTERED THE WAR, CAPTAIN ROBERT LOSEY, U.S.A. AIR CORPS WAS KILLED WHILE OBSERVING A BOMBING ATTACK AT DOMBAAS, NORWAY. CAPTAIN LOSEY WAS THE ASSISTANT AIR ATTACHE TO NORWAY AND SWEDEN.

2. AFTER TAKING STEPS TO ENSURE THE SAFETY OF FLORENCE JAFFRAY HARRIMAN, THE U.S. MINISTER TO NORWAY, CAPTAIN LOSEY LEFT THE RELATIVE SAFETY OF SWEDEN AND RETURNED TO NORWAY. HE TRAVELED TO DOMBAAS TO ASSIST FURTHER EVACUATION OF U.S. CIVILIANS AND TO GATHER ADDITIONAL INFORMATION AT DOMBAAS, A KEY RAILROAD INTERSECTION UNDER REPEATED ATTACK BY THE GERMANS. IN HER MEMOIRS, MRS HARRIMAN RECALLED THAT HE HAD TO CONVINCE HER TO LET HIM GO.

3. ON AUGUST 22, 1987, A MEMORIAL COMMEMORATING THE DEATHS OF 29 NORWEGIANS AND CAPTAIN LOSEY WAS DEDICATED IN DOMBAAS BY KING OLAV V AND FORMER AMBASSADOR ROBERT STUART. A MEMORIAL CEREMONY HAS BEEN CONDUCTED ON APRIL 21ST EACH YEAR SINCE. THE MOST RECENT CEREMONY COMMEMORATING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ATTACK ON DOMBAAS, WAS ATTENDED BY AMBASSADOR RUPPE, DATT, AIRA AND MANY OTHERS.

4. THE FACT THAT CAPTAIN LOSEY WAS KILLED ON ACTIVE DUTY ON 21 APRIL 1940 IS WELL ESTABLISHED BY RECORDS OBTAINED FROM WEST POINT. PAGE 798 OF THE BIOGRAPHICAL REGISTER OF THE OFFICERS AND GRADUATES OF THE U.S. MILITARY ACADEMY, 1920-1930 LISTS CAPTAIN LOSEY AS SERVING AS ASSISTANT MILITARY ATTACHE FOR AIR TO NORWAY AND SWEDEN AT THE TIME OF HIS DEATH. A LETTER FROM THE WHITE HOUSE DTD 07 JUL 1983 REPORTS THAT "THE ARMY'S CENTER OF MILITARY HISTORY CONFIRMS THAT HE WAS THE FIRST AMERICAN SERVICEMAN TO DIE IN WORLD WAR II AT THE HANDS OF THE ENEMY".

5. WE HAVE BEEN UNABLE TO LOCATE ANY LIVING RELATIVES OF CAPTAIN LOSEY. WHEN HE DIED IN 1940, HE LEFT A WIFE BUT NO CHILDREN. WE UNDERSTAND HIS WIFE LATER REMARRIED BUT HAS SINCE DIED.

6. IT IS SIGNIFICANT THAT THE FIRST RECORDED U.S. MILITARY CASUALTY OF THE WAR WAS AN ATTACHE DOING HIS DUTY IN A NEUTRAL COUNTRY. FROM THE INFORMATION AVAILABLE IT IS APPARENT THAT CAPTAIN LOSEY COULD HAVE REMAINED IN THE RELATIVE SAFETY OF SWEDEN, BUT ELECTED INSTEAD TO RETURN TO THE SCENE OF THE ACTION AND CONTINUE HIS DUTIES. HE WAS NO STRANGER TO WAR SINCE HE PREVIOUSLY COVERED THE WINTER WAR IN FINLAND DURING 1939-1940. IN FULL RECOGNITION OF THE DANGERS, CAPTAIN LOSEY CONTINUED HIS ATTACHE ASSIGNMENT IN THE FINEST TRADITIONS OF THE MILITARY SERVICE. ACCORDINGLY, CAPTAIN LOSEY IS HEREBY NOMINATED FOR ENTRY TO THE ATTACHE HALL OF FAME. AMBASSADOR RUPPE STRONGLY SUPPORTS THIS NOMINATION.

to Port Arthur -- all the while preparing voluminous reports on the then-new Trans-Siberian Railway and the movement of war materials. McCully's reports were compiled into a book published in 1977 by the United States Naval Institute. Admiral McCully's other credits include commanding the scouting fleet and the 6th Naval District. Of interest, all but one of McCully's seven children were adopted. All were born in Russia and all bore Russian names.

Captain Robert Moffat Losey, U.S. Army Air Corps, Deceased. A graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, Captain Losey was no stranger to war. As an attache, he covered the Winter War in Finland during 1939-1940, and then moved on to Sweden and Norway. Evacuated from Norway at the outset of German attacks, Captain Losey could have remained in the relative safety of Sweden, but volunteered to return to the scene of the action to continue his reconnaissance duties. He was killed by a bomb in April 1940, while observing a German attack on Dombaas, Norway. He thus became the first U.S. military casualty of World War II. In 1987, a memorial commemorating the deaths of 29 Norwegians and Captain Losey was dedicated in Dombaas by King Olav V. A memorial ceremony is now held there every April.

This year's induction was conducted by Lieutenant General Harry E. Soyster, USA, Director, DIA; Major General Charles F. Scanlon, USA, Deputy Director for Attaches and Operations; and Brigadier General Jon A. Reynolds, Assistant Deputy Director for Attaches. Ambassador Paul Wolfowitz, Under Secretary of Defense for Policy, the Guest Speaker, stated that "The Attache System has never been stronger, more important, or more highly respected. The firsthand perspective that Military Attaches provide to decision-makers throughout the government--in the Department of Defense, the Department of State, and indeed right into the White House--cannot be provided as effectively by any other

organization." "With the next generation of Attaches we will have to ensure that each can instantly demonstrate the excellent judgement and keen communications skills exemplified by members of the Attache Hall of Fame. I am confident that the next generation of Attaches will be up to this task. I've seen the stuff of which they are made. They are made of the same kind of stuff as the people we have come here to honor today. The Attache Hall of Fame is filled by men and women who have served at the far reaches of the world, doing their duty, with honor, for their country."

The Attache Hall of Fame is located in the Directorate for Attaches and Operations, on the fourteen floor, 3100 Clarendon Blvd., Arlington, Virginia.

COMMEMORATING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE NAZI INVASION OF NORWAY
AND THE FIRST UNITED STATES CASUALTY OF WORLD WAR II

Mr. SABO. Mr. Speaker, today I rise to bring to the attention of the American people and my colleagues here in Congress two important and noteworthy dates. They are both very significant to our fellow citizens and to our dear friends, the people of Norway.

Next week - April 9, 1990 - is the 50th anniversary of the Nazi invasion of Norway. April 21, 1990 is the 50th anniversary of the death of the first American serviceman in uniform in World War II.

The Norwegian people will be commemorating their resistance to the April 9 invasion in solemn ceremonies throughout the country. It is appropriate that we too honor the Norwegian people's heroic resistance to totalitarian aggression. The steadfast leadership and refusal to bend under pressure of King Haakon VII were - and remain today - examples to the world of personal and national moral courage.

The contributions of the Norwegian Merchant Marine during the war also deserve special mention. And the heroism and persistence of the men and women of the Norwegian resistance forces must never be forgotten. They remain bright shining testimony of the bravery of these freedom-loving people.

On April 21, 1940 - nearly 18 months before the United States entered World War II - the first American serviceman was killed. Capt. Robert Moffat Losey, a military attache assigned to the American Embassy in Oslo, was killed in a Nazi bombing raid on the town of Dombas in the county of Dovre in Norway.

On the 50th anniversary of that date, Norwegian officials from Oslo, Dombas, and Dovre, representatives from the American Embassy, military officers from the armed services of both the United States and Norway, and representatives of the Sons of Norway will participate in ceremonies at the Memorial Park in Dombas. They will honor the memory of Captain Losey and the many Norwegians who died or suffered as a result of the invasion and subsequent occupation.

Mr. Speaker, as the son of Norwegian immigrants, I am very proud of the nation of my ancestors. It remains the home of many of my relatives today.

Norwegian immigrants to the United States have enriched our land far beyond our ability to repay. The contributions they have made are especially important and evident in the State I have the privilege of representing, Minnesota, and the State of my birth, North Dakota.

While my pride and warmth for Norway is personal in many ways, I encourage all Americans to join me in expressing our respect, admiration, and appreciation for the Norwegian people. Norway was

a brave and true ally during World War II. The Norwegian people suffered and fought valiantly in that great struggle against tyranny.

Today Norway remains a staunch NATO ally and a firm supporter of Western democratic ideals. Let us join together with our great Norwegian friends and remember with the utmost respect the sacrifices and hardships that began on April 9, 1940 and the noble American life that ended on April 21, 1940.
