BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

July 22, 1963 North Barrington School

8:30 P.M. Following Public Hearing on Proposed Tax Levy.

The President declared a querum present and opened the meeting.

Trustee Forrest moved the minutes of the June 24 meeting be accepted as written - seconded by Trustee Urick - passed unanimously.

OFFICERS! REPORTS:

TREASURER: Treasurer Keagy reported his accounts have been under audit and he has just received his books back. He reported the following balances:

Treasurer Keagy reported the amount credited to the Motor Fuel Tax Account available for projects is \$8,016.33.

Treasurer Keagy also advised he had received a check from the North Barrington Property Owners Association - in amount \$400.00 - to be used for police communication equipment. The Board of Trustees expressed their appreciation for the generous cooperation of the Board and membership of the Property Owners Association. Trustee Schunk moved for approval of the Treasurer's report - seconded by Trustee Urick and passed unanimously.

VILLAGE CLERK: The clerk presented invoices totaling \$1,483.68 as per list attached to become a part of these minutes. Trustee Krumlinde meved for approval of invoices - seconded by Trustee Lafferty and passed unanimously.

POLICE: Chief Rey E. Svacha reported the pelice received and precessed the fellowing complaints:

A call from the Sheriff's office acting on a relay call from Barrington to investigate a reported disturbance in a North Barrington resident's home.

Two complaints from a family "persecuted" by teenagers.

Three degs captured and transferred to Dr. Neyes' Animal Hespital.

Assisted at two motor vehicle accidents.

Searched for deer struck by a resident's car.

Investigated reports of a prowler.

Neisy after-heur beach party.

One arrest was issued for a traffic violation that resulted in a conviction.

Chief Swacha reported the July 4th Fireworks Display held by the Country Club required more trained personnel than the department could supply. Three eff-duty police efficers from other villages were hired through the Fex Valley Police Reserve at a cost of \$30.00.

Chief Swacha also advised the FCC has issued a construction permit and license for the radio. The basic equipment has been ordered and some pieces have been received. The erection of the tower is now in progress.

BUILDING OFFICER: Mr. R. J. Kerr reported one permit issued - \$121.00. Nothing pending.

ROADS: Supt. G.E. Davis reported the traffic signs have been installed by Mr. R. H. Freking.

Mr. Davis advised an estimate of \$3,700 has been received from the consulting engineers to extend the culvert - widen Woodland Drive from Glen Circle to Brookside Road to 22 ft. and resurface. The cost of this work will be covered by Motor Fuel Tax funds.

In addition, \$3,500 of general road repair will be done - mainly sealcoating.

FIRE COMMISSIONER: No report.

HEALTH OFFICER: No report.

The President advised a complaint has been received from a resident relative to septic flowage from the North Barrington School, which is effensive. This is under investigation with the County Health Department, Dr. Jack Neyes and Dr. Kishkunas.

Chief Svacha and Lt. Barta discussed the stray degs which are picked up and impounded at the Neyes Animal Hespital. In most cases they have been stray pets who have been picked up within a day or two and the ewner paid the costs, but at the moment Dr. Neyes is boarding two dogs, which it is felt no one will claim. This will be pursued with Dr. Neyes by the Trustees Committee on Public Safety.

MOSQUITO ABATEMENT: No report.

The President advised he had received the first written complaint or request from a resident regarding fogging and the alleged effect on humans and wild life. Enclosed with the letter was an article relating the alleged harmful effects. The President advised this has been discussed with Mr. Lyle Palmer and literature has been received from both Clarke Outdoor Spraying Inc., and Dr. Jack Noyes refuting the harmful claims. Dr. Noyes has also advised that mosquites in this area are affecting dogs with heart worm, which causes premature death of dogs. This subject will be pursued, and the material condensed for distribution in the next newsletter.

In discussion of fogging formulas, Mr. R. J. Kerr suggested a product called "Vapona" be explored. This will be further discussed with Mr. Clarke.

CIVIL DEFENSE: No report.

PLAN COMMISSION: No report.

The President reported a public hearing will be held on July 31 on zoning matters. A quorum was not present at the hearing called on June 26, necessitating another hearing, which will be held at the Biltmore Country Club - July 31 - 7:30 P.M.

The President also advised that as approved at the June meeting Plan Commission members have been reappointed for terms of 2, 4 and 6 years.

BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS: The President advised the Beard of Zoning Appeals membership should be increased from 5 to 7 members. The President read proposed Amendment 8.5 - amending Ordinance No. 8, Section 12, increasing the membership to 7. Mr. J. A. Dattile, Chairman, Beard of Zoning Appeals, questioned the number required for a querum and requested that it be defined, if not already covered. After discussion the proposed amendment to Ordinance No. 8 was referred to the Trustees Committee on Zoning and Planning for review.

PARKS AND AUXILIARY SERVICES: No report.

The President reported Supt. L. P. Getsch is doing some research work on Dutch Elm and Oak Wilt, as well as nexious weeds. He is also arranging to have the recreational properties mowed.

TRUSTEES COMMITTEE REPORTS:

FINANCE AND LAW: Trustee Urick reported a public hearing had been held immediately preceding this board meeting for the purpose of considering the proposed Annual General Corporate Tax Levy - Ordinance No. 48.

Trustee Urick advised that based on budgeted amounts for the various departments—Annual Appropriation Bill — Ordinance No. 43 — totaling \$16,800 was passed by the Board of Trustees on June 24, 1963. Because of other revenues such as Motor Fuel Tax credits — Road and Bridges — and \$400 received from the North Barrington Property Owners Association toward the purchase of police radio equipment — the proposed levy is \$12,000 as follows:

After discussion Trustee Schunk moved for adoption of Ordinance No. 48 - seconded by Trustee Forrest:

BY ROLL - AYES: Trustees Ferrest, Krumlinde, Lafferty, Schunk and Urick.

NAYS: None

ABSENT: Trustee Bliss

Metien passed unanimously.

Trustee Urick presented the proposed ordinance for licensing scavenger companies. After discussion Trustee Schunk suggested the ordinance be tabled at this time, and referred to the Trustees Committee for further dtudy as there was some feeling it would deprive small scavenger firms from picking up refuse and cleaning out septic tanks.

PLANNING AND ZONING: Trustee Ferrest mentioned the fortunate decision in the South Barrington area denying the Hoffman Estates annexation north of Illinois Toll Read. He also added that Representatives Murphy and Bairstow (Lake County) had tried to pass bills to remove or weaken County zoning throughout Illinois in the 1963 State Legislature, which were defeated on the last day of the session by Senator John Graham of Barrington.

ROADS & PUBLIC UTILITIES: No report.

The President advised Resolution No. 107 designating additional arterial streets, passed by the Board on April 22, 1963, had been disqualified by the State because the length of the reads was not shown. The President presented Resolution No. 107.1 - describing the same reads as shown in Resolution No. 107, but with the additional information required as follows:

BILTMORE DRIVE FROM SIGNAL HILL ROAD TO 1,025 ft.NORTH.
SIGNAL HILL ROAD FROM HIGHWAY 59 to 4,580 ft. WEST. (Cuba-Ela Twp Line.)

After discussion Trustee Urick moved for adoption of Resolution No. 107.1 - seconded by Trustee Schunk and passed unanimously.

- 9:25 P.M. Trustee Forrest asked that the meeting be recessed for 10 minutes so that the trustees could listen to the Liston-Patterson championship bout on the radio.
- 9:35 P.M. After Mr. Patterson had been knocked out in the first round by Mr. Liston the meeting was reconvened.

The President presented Resolution No. 118 - a resolution authorizing execution of agreement for engineering services by Murry and Moody, Registered Professional Engineers, involving the improvement of city streets, including work on Woodland Drive bridge. After discussion Trustee Forrest moved for adoption - seconded by Trustee Schunk and passed unanimously.

The President then presented Resolution No. 119 - a resolution for improvement under the Motor Fuel Tax Law of Woodland Drive from Glen Circle to Brookside Read involving pavement widening, culvert extension and surface treatment at a cost of \$3,700., which includes the 10% charge for engineering services. After discussion Trustee Krumlinde moved for adoption - seconded by Trustee Forrest and passed unanimously.

The order for street name wights has been placed with the Rydin Sign Company at a cost of \$1,635. Three signs will be paid for by the developers of the Oaksbury Subdivision.

Mr. B. M. Jaremus, Deputy Read Superintendent, is working on description and status of arterial reads which the State has requested. Also, Mr. Jaremus will explore and study the clerical requirements of the State on use of Motor Fuel Tax so that future projects will not require that type of service of professional engineers.

POLICE AND PUBLIC SAFETY: No report.

BUILDING REGULATIONS: No report.

The President advised he had received a written report from J. Wm Braithwaite on his review of the Zoning Ordinance. After discussion the report was referred to the Trustees Committee on Zoning and Planning for further study.

HEALTH & SANITATION: No report.

LAW: Ne repert.

OLD BUSINESS: The President reported:

Mr. J. Wm Braithwaite is working on the wording of the Health & Samitation Ordinance.

Relative to STOP signs and NO PARKING signs - an ordinance is necessary to enforce - and this will be pursued with Attorney Braithwaite.

A meeting is scheduled for Thursday, July 25 - 8:00 P.M. - at the Biltmere Country Club to consider the proposed liquor license. The President and the Trustees Committee on Finances will meet with Board representatives of the Club.

Mrs. June K. Gress - 109 Seminele Drive - has been appointed to replace Mrs. E. Espenshade, as chairman of the United Drive for the Village.

The Plan Commission is working on streets and reads to be considered for vacating.

The President advised that because of some of the activities that have prevailed at the Club, and their apparent lack of knowledge of how the Village functions, our operations have not been as efficient as desired. The President read his letter of July 22 to Mr. George Traner, President, Biltmore Country Club, a copy of which is attached to become a part of these minutes.

The President inquired about the removal of dead trees and was informed by Supt. Davis that Mr. W. Berghern had agreed to do the work but had not done so as yet. Mr. Berghern will again be contacted and if his work is such that he cannot undertake the job without delay Township Highway Commissioner R. H. Freking will be contacted.

The State Highway Department has moved the Village name sign on Highway 59 to a location which more nearly approximates the boundary of the Village.

Relative to annexation of the Club beach property, Attorney J. Wm Braithwaite advised that a formal petition, signed by the Club efficers, has not yet been received. He will prepare a petition for their signature.

Mr. Braithwaite also advised petitions have been prepared for filing with the Board of Review for exemption of the 12 tax bills on the recreational properties and Wild Life Refuge deeded to the Village by the Biltmere Home Owners Ass'n.
