

A German map printed six weeks ago, from which additions have been made to this Japanese war department chart, places the Chickwan hill forts, captured by the Japanese, on the peninsula from which the Tiger's Tail promothery uses. This is southeasted Port Arthur and agrees with the location of the captured forts given in the forts in the above map. Chickwan hill is 504 feet at the summit. The forts on the sea side are built 330 feet above the sea.
