"There is no longer a strike at the stock yards, so far as the ability of the puckers to hire abundant labor is concerned. More men are available than are needed. It is now a question as to whether the puckers shall conduct their business or whether the jeaders of the unions now out shall dictate its conduct. That is the plain English of it. The strikers have no more legal interest in the packing houses that they have in the diamond fields of South Africa. They assume, atterfy without warrant, to control property owned by other men. The question is: Shall they be allowed to do it? Upon the answer to this question depends the industrial future of this city."
