MYSTERIOUS MURDER CASE AT

Couple Register as Fred Tyler and Wife, But Man Is Missing When Attendants Discover Body of His Companion.

Minneapolis.—Minneapolis police are confronted by another mysterious murder, which promises to develop as many sensations as sid that of Millie Ellison, who was murdered at the National hotel, as few months ago.

At five o'clock Wednesday afternoon attendants at the Glenwood hotel on Hennepin avenue, broke into a room which had been occupied by a couple who registered on Tuesday as Fred Tyler and wife, and found on the bed the dead body of a beautiful young woman. Blood was oozing from a wound in the top of the head, and apparently she had been dead for several hours. It is said that the man who accompanied her was seen leaving the hotel early in the day, but no one can give an accurate description of him.

Nothing was found to positively identify her identity, it being the police theory that the couple registered under assumed names. It was found that death was caused by a bullet which had been fired into the top of her head.
