The Monroe Doctrias Scouted.

Strange as it may seem, the first American professor installed at the University of Berlin under the Theodore Roosevelt trust declared in the presence of the emperor that the Monroe doctrine is outworn and should no, longer shape the attitude of the United States toward European powers havying interests in the western head-sphere. The propounder of this theory, J. W. Burgess, formerly of Columbia university, holds that the principle advocated by President Monroe should be discarded because practically all European countries have about the control of the contr

and enunged in the settlement of European and Asiatic affairs.

Int only ten years ago, when the nations of Europe were as far advanced in representative government. President Cleveland reiterated the Monroe doctrine in the case of England's interference in the affairs of the republic of Venerucals, and his position was sustained by the masses of his countrymen of all parties.
