



Riding the Air

A Workable Airship Certain Within Two Years

By HOMER W. HEDGE,



NE essential reason for the comparatively slow progress made in the development of the aeroplane is that, as with the bicycle, it is, and must be, part of the operator, and its operation has to be learned. Though the driving force be mechanical, it must be guided by human intelligence. To experiment with the workable, but primitive scroplane of to-day, requires any amount of pluck. When it has become a realized fact, every operator will have to learn how to operate the machine individually. Birds, though built to fly, are taught by their mothets, and if they try it on their own account, invariably ble.


