A charge that Wall street and the big corporations are controlling the house "momey trust" inquiry at Weshington was made by Representative Lindbergh of Minnesota, Republican, in a resolution which would compel every member to disclose his business and corporation affiliations. Each member of the house would have to file his own bank holdings and those ôf his family. . . .
