TUBERCULOSIS DAY.

Tuberculosis Day Will be Held of October 27—Everybody is Urged to Give Special Attention to It.

to Give Special Attention to it.

Churches and religious societies to the number of at least 100,000, will be urged to give special attention to the prevention of tuberculosis on Sunday, October 27, or on some day during the week preceding or the week following that date. This season has been set apart and designated as the Third National Tuberculosis Day by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, which makes this amouncement today.

Based on these figures and on the mortality statistics of the census bureau, over \$2,000 of the \$3,000,000 communicants in churches in the United States die from tuberculous swerp year. This figure assumes that the death rate, of 1.00 per 1,000 population in the Registration. Area applies to all churchgoers, when, as a master of fact, the rate would probably be higher.
