### PARCELS POST LAW JANUARY 1

An article is mailable if not over 11 pounds in weight nor more than 12 inches in length and girth, soundment, nor likely to injure the malls or pastal equipment of the employee. Flat rate 2 cont per ounce up to four cuucoes regardless of distance.
