The new rates become effective for new members May 1, 1912. Old imembers have until January 1, 1913, to make their choice of seven optional plans. If by that date they have not declared their, preference they will arbitrarily be given the new whole life plan rating as 15 cents a month to evry \$4,000 at 45.

These increases were found to be necessary when officials of the acutary department showed that in less than four years the society would have a deficit as the existant plan of rating. In order to give the largest possible precedule with the smallest possible assessment burden a further relief is made to members more than 45 years old. This is a condession of allowing a cash payment of \$2 a month for \$1000 protection with the right to charge the remaining \$1 or more a month (according to the age) against their certificates, to be deducted with four per cent compound interest at death. By a vote of 210 to 109 the house of representatives passed the Under wood bill revising downward the irot and steel schedule of the Papne-Al drich tariff law. The measure reduced duties from from 30 to 50 per cent.

Prof. Milton Whitney, chief of the bureau of soils of the department of agriculture at Washington, has informed Secretary Wilson that only weeker states are cooperating in the bureau's soil survey investigation. Additional funds are needed, he says, for the nonco-operating states.

The speaker appeals for the support of a representative delegation of "loyal Missouril Democratis" who will stand by him as long as he has a chance for the nomination.

The duke of Fife, brother-in-law of King George V. of Great Britain, died at Assuan, Upper Egpyt, of pleuro-neumonia. He had been ill only a few days.

An imperial army of 10,000 men, under Gen. Chang Fun was decisively defeated by a Canton republican army under Gen. Wong Ching, near Ku Chan, according to a cablegmir received in San Francisco by the Chinese Free Free. Four hundred Manchus are reported to have been killed.


