Miss Lydia Dillie, teacher of the Davlin school from September 1 to November 1, was denied a mandamus in Lake County Circuit court Tuesday to compel the school board to recognize her claim to a contract to teach the school.

The school was turned over to Miss Gertrude Fitzgerald, the first teacher hired, the first of this month after Miss Fitzgerald had T. A. Simpson, Lake county superintendent of schools, issue her a certificate by mandamus action in the Circuit court.

Both teachers held contracts signed by two directors, one director, no longer a member of the school board, signed each contract.

45,000 MAJORITY AGAINST \$14,000,000 STATE BOND ISSUE

Unofficial but nearly complete returns of the November election indicate that the state \$14,000,000 conservation bond measure was defeated by approximately 45,000 votes, although to have carried it would have required a majority of all the votes cast for members of the general assembly.

The proposal carried in 26 counties of the state, including Cook county, where the voters endorsed it by a majority of 100,000, but defeated elsewhere over 140,000 against the proposition.

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BIG PROGRAM PLANNED FOR LIVE STOCK SHOW

Chicago will be host to the country from November 23 to December 6 when the International Live Stock Exposition will draw to it a mammoth display of the manifold wonders of the rural world.

Extending throughout twenty acres of buildings and a large part of the adjoining pens in the Chicago stock yards, this renowned exposition will unfold to the visiting thousands an ever filling pageant of the final products of scientific methods applied to present day agriculture, says R. H. Holde, secretary-manager of the show.

Although, according to the management, the exposition is not scheduled to open officially until November 23, the first Saturday following Thanksgiving, one important event, the junior live stock judging contest, will take place on Friday, Nov. 23. State champion teams of farm boys and girls are sent to Chicago from a large number of states to compete for national honors.

Saturday, Nov. 23, marks the official opening of the exposition. It will be a day crowded with events of interest to young people, with the junior live stock feeding contest, the collegiate live stock judging contest, and the opening of the 4-H Club congress.

Saturday evening will bring the first of the horse shows, which will continue each night, except Sunday, until the close of the exposition.

Crowded Program Monday

On Monday every available ring will be filled with aspirants for the highest honors of the year which go to International winners. Important on Monday's program are the steer contest, as well as many of the separate breeds of cattle, horses, sheep, and swine, while Tuesday will furnish a highly spectacular event on the occasion of the selection of the grand champion steer.

Auction sales of both purebred and fat cattle, fat sheep, and swine will be held on Wednesday and Thursday, culminating in the open air auction in the stock yards of grand champion steer and the various lots of commercial cattle which comprise in themselves one of the most important sights at the exposition.

Record breaking prices for these choice meat animals are expected.

Proclamation of the votes cast at the November 4 election has been issued by the board of election commissioners.
