MUST CONSIDER HEN IN T. B. ERADICATION

Springfield.—The farm has must be considered in any plan for complete eradication of tuberculosis from livestock. Dr. W. H. Welch, chief veterinarian in the state department of agriculture, observes. From a study of trial tests performed, tuberculosis in swine is traced directly to swine tuberculosis in the poultry flocks. In lieu of a thorough test and the removal of fowls infected with tuberculosis, the veterinary authority urges segregation. Chickens ranging in feed lots and roosting in calf pens are considered a particular menace as a potential source of swine tuberculosis in domestic animals.
