State News

Fred C. Dodd, Springfield, who has been assistant state superintendent of charities for more than two years, has retired from the state service.

One of Mr. Dodd's duties was to put out the Welfare Bulletin for the department, but this is to be discontinued in the future.

Mr. Dodd has had more years of state service than any man in office now in the state.

Frank Whip, superintendent of state prisons, has served under 12 former governors.

Power to subpoena witnesses and to hold the ranks of Illinois miners, will be secured for an investigation committee in a joint resolution passed in the house of representatives.

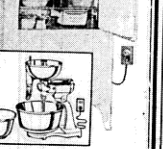

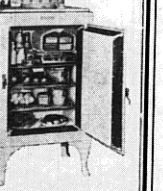
