Pruning of Street Lights for Village Economy Dropped

Trustees Approve Resolution Providing for Economy Budget Committee

Barrington's street lighting system will not be subjected to any more pruning and pruning it was decided at the regular meeting of the board of trustees Monday night upon the suggestion of Herman Kuhlman, trustee, who, together with other board members, had been investigating the matter.

The street lighting system has already undergone two reductions in sizes of bulbs and elimination of lights during the past year.

"The people will not stand for any more cuts in lights in the residence section," Mr. Kuhlman stated in giving the results of the investigation to the board.

A resolution instituted by Earl Hatle and seconded by J. J. Carroll provided for an economy budget committee to be named unanimously by the board. The measure shall appoint a committee of three members of the board to investigate the financial conditions of the village, the present financial condition of the village, and the present financial condition of the village.

Herman Kuhlman raised the subject of pruning of burning off dead grass and rubbish on vacant lots. He reported that often the fire department is called to these areas when persons get a little careless and this at an expense to the taxpayer of \$30 or \$40 per fire. The fire department was instructed to take the small fire truck out for protection while men from the street and water department burn off the vacant lots in the village. It was suggested that one or two men from the fire department with the small truck could handle any emergency. This work is expected to be done in a week or two.
