Prairie View Stock Raiser

Is Suing Irene Castle McLaughlin for \$10,000

William Schroeder, Prairie View stock raiser, is plaintiff in a civil suit against Irene Castle McLaughlin of Lake Forest, former famous dancer and movie star.

The case now being tried in court at Waukegan grew out of money against Schroeder which was brought by the former dancer, Mrs. Schroeder is suing Mrs. McLaughlin for \$10,000 which amount he attempted to prove in court Tuesday.

First, he explained that his several appearances in courts in Cook county where he eventually was dismissed, cost him \$1000.

Mrs. McLaughlin has signed complaints charging him with the conduct, cruelty to animals and maintaining a nuisance.

He was fined \$100 on one complaint by Justice of the Peace William Ward of the Peoria, but appealed to Judge John Pratzelski of Chicago, where he was found not guilty.

Schroeder denied that he had had a dog around the place, and that he buried or burned those that died. He admitted on cross examination that he forcibly ejected the woman from his farm on one occasion.
