Early School of Lake Zurich in Building of Logs

History of District 93, Formerly District 113, Compiled by Donald Young

An interesting history of Lake Zurich elementary school No. 95 was given by Donald Young on Tuesday evening, March 21, in the dedicatory exercises when that school was added to the group of superior schools in the state of Illinois. The history follows: Before our school was established in 1856 it was a log school. It is believed that the first school was on the southeast corner about one-half mile south of Lake Zurich. The building was made of logs, the furniture was very heavy, and the seats, desks and paper were rough, slates being used instead of paper.

As records were not kept, terms were about three months in length, unless sickness or absence prohibited further teaching. This usually was not the case, spring and fall and sometimes a summer term. Sarah Adams was one of the first teachers in 1852. The district then contained 67 children as recorded in the school census taken in 1852. The teachers were given half board free. Local boys were boarded with the parents of the children.

A school district was also formed taking the north half of the old Black School house district and the south part of the Belmont district. Seth Paine agreeing to furnish a school-room free of rent in his stable of humanity for all time to come. He kept his word, the public school was conducted in this building until it was destroyed by fire and for some time thereafter Mr. Paine furnished a room on the south floor of what is now the Maplefield hotel.

This was used until late in the winter when a schoolroom was built in combination with the town hall, which is still standing. In 1857 the school was changed from the town hall to the present location. At the corner of the school are the names of the board at that time. They are H. L. Proulx, president, H. G. Hill, secretary, H. P. Rogers, treasurer, H. J. D. P. and Elmer Fink directors. The first principal was E. D. Brantley. Afterward, E. J. Roberts.
