Survey Started to Reveal Beer License Evaders

Lake County Receipts Fall \$1400 Short of Anticipated Amount

Their revenue receipts for Lake county are not coming in as fast as anticipated. The total is \$18,000 short of the expected total, according to a report by Miss Florence H. Fisher, chief clerk.

Revenue short from the county beer tax since April 13 when the first accounting was made is the county board of supervisors, received \$276 up to Wednesday morning to Miss Fisher, who has preparations to turn the money over to County Treasurer Jay H. Morone.

The June 15 report showed that \$1,500 had been paid. The total to date is \$276.

The Finance committee of the county board started their second survey of the territory yesterday to locate places operating in violation of the law. They will be forced to provide licenses to be closed and penalized, members of the committee said.

The drive is being cleaned up the largest part of the places operating without license, and work the county revenue fund.

The first group of work will be done through the county sheriff, who will lead squads to check each place in order to force 100 per cent payment.

Thundertown Rays

Lotteries Were O. K'd by Government, States

A New York woman who had the time and money has gathered several hundred lottery tickets which had been officially sanctioned by the government, state or city of that country at some time in its history. It has been presented to the historical society of that city. The collection includes advertisements and other references to this method of raising money for various public purposes.

There are tickets in the collection for a United States lottery sanctioned by congress; a New York city lottery in 1700 for enlarging city hall and tickets for a Washington monument in Baltimore in 1810, with engraved portraits of George Washington on them.

Of equal interest are Delaware lottery tickets of 1772 signed by Lord Sterling, major general in the Revolutionary war; the Hon. Will. Ham Byrd's lottery signed by Peyton Randolph of Virginia in 1788; a Pennsylvania lottery ticket, dated Boston, 1795, and signed by John Hancock. In 1800 the state of Delaware sponsored a lottery for its benefit with \$25,000 offered in prizes. The Louisiana State lottery company was incorporated in 1808 and was perhaps the largest, doing business in the United States.


