## Appropriation Is Trimmed Eight Percent by Trustees

Annual Estimated Expenditures of Village Reduced \$3975

A reduction of \$3075 in appropriation for the village of Barrington, almost 8 per cent of the total appropriation for the village last year, was effected by the village trustees Monday night when they passed the annual appropriation ordinance.

The reduction was effected by trimming the budget for nearly every department of the village. A few items were raised, but about half of them were lowered.

The reductions included: salaries of the police department lowered from \$1000 to \$800; maintenance of jail, Marshall of Peoria.

## All Bugs Guaranteed to Be Dead; Library Will Open Saturday

The village hall and library building is guaranteed to be free from vermin and can be put in use again Monday night by Heriberto Kuhlman, chairman of the committee appointed to rid the building of the pests.

The Marine Laboratories, experts of getting rid of the pests, placed a one year guarantee on the building from the Marine company, suggested that the pests probably were carried into the building by a hobo who slept in the hall.

While the building was being fumigated last Saturday all of the books were out of the shelves and opened to be inspected for vermin.

Mrs. Violet Burrige, librarian, reported that library books which were taken to be inspected for vermin have fallen due while the library was closed, will not be delinquent or damaged.

The library will open Saturday morning at 10 o'clock.

## Early Resident of Barrington Dies at Nebraska Home

A notice was received in Barrington Tuesday that Charles Colton, formerly resident of this village, died Monday morning at his home in Valley, Neb. He had been in failing health for the last year.

Mr. Colton, who was about 65 years old at the time of his death, was born and raised in Barrington. He left this village more than 40 years ago, moving to Nebraska. He was a member of the village for many years and was at one time deputy sheriff.

The deceased man is survived by his wife and one son, Roland. Dead relatives are residing in Barrington. Mrs. Anna M. Colton, a sister, and C. P. Page, a nephew.

Funeral services were held at Valley Wednesday.

## Village Will Be Defendent, Bond Suit for \$25,000

Defaulted Assessment Bonds Are Basis of Claims to Be Filed

Suits against the village of Barrington for payment of principal and interest on assessment bonds will be filed within the next few weeks according to Village Attorney David R. Malone, who reported developments of the situation at the special meeting of the village board Monday night.

The suits are for judgments totaling about \$25,000 when the municipality may be held liable for delinquent interest and defaulted bonds are the result of failure of some property owners to meet their special assessments.

Mr. Malone reported that the village Cuba school bonds, which came up for trial at the next term of the circuit court.

About two months ago a large dog was stolen from the Hobbs store, not far from the Klingenberg home. A less than five burglaries and holdups of Cuba township gas stations and homes have been reported during the last two months.
