

**State Fair Will Give Children T. B. Tests**

A new service for children will be developed at the Illinois state fair this year by the state department of public health and the Sangamon county health department according to the announcement made by Dr. Frank J. Cook, state health director. Every child whose parents do not desire any special advantage of a free test for tuberculosis should be given the test. The test is a simple one and is given by a physician or a nurse. It consists of a skin test which is made by injecting a small amount of tuberculin into the arm. The reaction is observed after 48 hours. The test is free of charge and is given to all children who are present at the fair. **P. S. Launches Employment Drive Thru Gas Heating**

Falling into step with President Roosevelt's plan for continued recovery, the gas industry of northern Illinois announced a new heating sales campaign last Saturday which is expected to create work for 15,000 to 20,000 men.

The drive started this week with a combined staff of 400 heating engineers and was backed by an intensive advertising program.

The objective of the campaign is to install 60,000 house heating units in the area and it is predicted on the new low gas house heating rate recently put into effect and a new plan of gas burner installation which requires the expense to make it possible for us to make this definite move.

Gas officials point out that sales promotion is fundamental in assisting the recovery and that the demand for gas heating units will be met by the employment of plumbers, pipe fitters, and skilled labor in plants which manufacture gas house heating equipment.

"We must go after business to keep moving ahead," Britton L. Budd, president of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois said in closing his address at the sales drive.

The new low rate for house heating and the new plan for installation of gas heating burners without initial expense to customers, makes it possible for us to make this definite move.

The sale of 60,000 house heating units will mean tremendous activity on the part of manufacturers who will furnish employment to the trades engaged in installations.

The Public Service Company of Northern Illinois, the Peoples Gas Light and Coke company and Western United Gas and Electric company have joined in the campaign.

The sales organization of house heating specialists has been assigned to exclusive districts in the area served by the three companies and they are equipped to make a study of individual house heating problems and handle specific problems on the ground.

Converting the present heating systems to automatic gas heating will be made at the expense of the company. It was explained, and the new burners installed at no initial expense to the householders. A rental-purchase plan with easy terms is made available and, if the installation is not satisfactory, the gas company promises to remove the burners.

**Was Ark of the Covenant Stolen by Babylonians?**

One of the greatest mysteries of all times is found in the question: What became of the Ark of the Covenant? The ark, which was made of acacia wood overlaid with gold and which contained the tables of the law, a gold pot of manna and the rod of Aaron, disappeared after the capture of Jerusalem in 586 B. C. and the destruction of the temple by the Babylonians. The ark, directions for building which are found in the Book of Exodus, constituted the mercy seat, or place of propitiation, over which two cherubim extended their wings. There are several traditions as to the final disposition of the ark, which was taken to Jerusalem by David when he made that city his capital and later placed in the Holy of Holies of the Temple of Solomon's temple.

The Jewish editors of the Talmud state that the ark was hidden by King Josiah in a secret place which had been prepared by Solomon himself in case the temple were taken and destroyed. In the Apocalypse of Isaiah, which is regarded as apocryphal by both Catholic and Protestant theologians, it is related that the ark of the covenant was carried away by the Babylonians. This seems probable, because the troops of Nebuchadnezzar took from the temple all the brass, silver and gold they could lay hands on. Reference to an ark in heaven is also made in the Book of Revelation as follows: "And the temple of God was opened in heaven, and there was seen in his temple the ark of his testament."—Montreal Herald.
