

Peddlers License Ordinance May Be Enacted Locally

Traders Asked to Protect Barrington Consumers and Stores

For the protection of the consumers and the merchants of Barrington, Illinois, it is suggested that a peddler's license ordinance be enacted locally. The ordinance would require all peddlers to obtain a license from the local business houses before they could work in the village. This would help to protect the consumers from the sale of inferior goods and to protect the local business houses from the competition of itinerant peddlers.

Depositors Vote to Go Ahead on Liquidating Plan

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The new frozen assets would be available for the liquidation of the bank. The liquidator could exercise his powers in applying offsets, that is, now permitted through a receivership.

The steps necessary to put the plan into effect were briefly outlined by Chairman Parker. In the first place, he pointed out, the suit filed by the state of Illinois for the liquidation of the bank will have to be dismissed. The suit was heard before Judge Thompson of the circuit court of Illinois. It was stated that he will dismiss the suit whenever shown that a majority of the people concerned are in favor of the plan so that the liquidation corporation will have working possibilities. In regard to the proposed plan, Parker said, "This is the best constructive plan that I have seen in a closed bank case." The liquidator, he said, which has control of the liquidation of the bank by the state, has advised that they will give their control and turn over the properties whenever shown that the liquidation corporation has a reasonable chance for success.

The depositors' plan calls for the liquidation of the bank by the state, for the extent of their liability in return for which they will receive common stock. These notes would be payable 1 per cent per month for the first year, 2 per cent per month for the second year, and 3 per cent per month for the third year and nine months, or until the notes were retired, according to the depositors' plan. The corporation would hold back the notes and the stock at security until the notes were paid.

In regard to the cost of setting up the corporation, the committee reported that the expenses would be about \$200 filing fee, \$200 franchise fee, \$200 stamp tax, based on a \$40,000 corporation. After the first year the filing fee and stamp tax would be eliminated and the franchise tax would be reduced as the stock was retired. Very little legal expense would be incurred, the committee decided, as the corporation could operate on a simple charter.

England Protects Dogs

England has a law that provides that if in the present any person is convicted of cruelty to a dog he can not own another one "for such a period as the court see fit to set." The dog he has abused is taken from him.

Cost of Changing Sewer System Set at \$325,000

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Gift from the R. F. C. of \$25,000 would be donated by residents west of town (providing the appeal were dropped), and about \$14,000 could be assessed against the Jewel Tea Co. for cost of sewer outlet from the plant and park.

At this rate the village would ultimately pay \$146,000 plus interest at 4 1/2 per cent. This is also based on the supposition that the R. F. C. will make a loan to the village.

Attorney Maloney estimated that with the above condition possible, the cost would amount to \$150 to \$175 per front foot for property directly benefited and 42 cents to 60 cents per front foot for property indirectly benefited.

Drop Appeal?

There were two main points of difference expressed during the discussion. One was on the construction of a complete sewer disposal plant in place of fixing up the one now in use. The more vital discussion was based on carrying out the appeal of the sewer case. It was proposed that the appeal be dropped to pave the way for a government loan.

Trustee Hatje objected to dropping the appeal until the village is assured that a loan can be obtained. He contended that the village can proceed with the first steps and at the same time file application for a government loan.
