Finance Outlook Healthy for Lake County Is Report

Treasurer Able to Meet General Expenses, Payrolls and Bond Issues

Up to the present time, Lake county has been in a position to meet all its obligations in the financial, general, operating, and if necessary, bond issues, promptly, according to County Treasurer J. B. Morse, and the outlook for the future is good.

At the August session the members of the Finance Committee of the county board were advised that there would be insufficient money to meet the bills which now are due monthly. After a conference with the board, however, it was discovered that the bills would not exceed \$15,000, and the treasurer stated that he could issue warrants for that amount.

When the August bills are paid at the September meeting of the board, Morse said, he thinks he will be able to cover the month.

September begins the fiscal year the board will approve an issue of tax anticipation warrants. Morse said that will allow for any payments to be made.

Last year the county issued \$250,000 in tax anticipation warrants that were sold to Chicago bankers at a favorable price. Morse said that warrants up in the fall may cover the first of the taxes now due.

The county now has about \$200,000 from its return of the motor fuel tax to your relief. Taking this amount, however, deprived the county of using it in its road building program and consequently no other money was used for highway projects from other sources, which contributed the highway program during the summer season.

Nudest Colony Is Reported Planned Near State Line

The northern part of Lake county should be a popular place for the nudest colony which will be formed near the state line, it is reported.

Five different groups of nudeists, according to the report, met in Chicago one day last week and organized under the name of the "Gymnophiliasts." They have engaged an attorney and have secured an option on a 250-acre tract of land located north of the state line in Kenosha county, Wis.

No definite plans for the exact location of the colony have so far been announced. Whether or not the venture will call for only new buildings or landscaping projects is yet a matter of conjecture. However, indications are that interest will be aroused to such an extent that the colony should at least be in the market for a high form of soap.

The name "Gymnophiliasts" is taken from an ancient group of Hindu philosophers who spurned clothing.

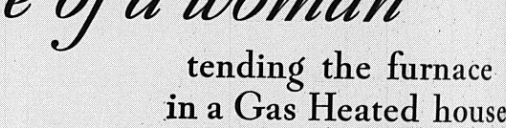
