**Outline Northwest Conference Plans at Meeting Here**

Supt. E. S. Smith Elected President to Succeed Bright of Antioch

Supt. Erman S. Smith, newly elected president of the Northwest high school conference, announced the program for the year's activities in an address with a Review reported. There will be two meetings, December 6 and March 7, the December one to arrange a basketball schedule and award football trophies to the winning party of the conference. At this meeting, too, the football schedule for next year will be worked out. The March meeting will be held at Antioch and to the arranging of a basketball schedule and conference for the next season.

Thirty men attended the conference which held at the Barrington school last Wednesday. The afternoon discussion of conference problems was followed by a dinner, served at the Methodist church, after which election of officers was held.
