### Has 101,020 Marks, 3 Rubles; Beware of Holdup Men, Frank

Frank Teschik of Barrington thinks he has a little inside information on whether or not currency inflation wrapped up in a roll of German marks issued prior to and during Germany's period of wild inflation. His note of earliest date is a 1000 mark note issued April 21, 1910. This note represented some real money in Germany at that time. He has a 20 mark note issued February 19, 1914, just before the beginning of Germany's most inflationary action was started. At that time this note would purchase about five dollars' worth of goods. He has a 100,000 mark note issued February 1, 1923. This note had the date of issuance nearly represented the value of the 20 mark note in 1914. Half a year later it would not buy groceries for a family of four for one day.

### Closed State and National Banks to Get R. F. C. Loans

Will Take Months to Work Out; Local Depositors May Benefit

No specific information about federal funds available for banks which closed prior to the moratorium has been received. William Basse, Jr., receiver for the First State Bank of Barrington and the Des Plaines State Bank, Washington dispatches printed in the daily Review on Monday indicated that the Reconstruction Finance corporation will have approximately one billion dollars for loans to state and national banks closed since the moratorium and one billion dollars for the collection of the assets. J. I. Jones, chairman of the R. F. C. reported in Washington Monday that banks closed prior to last January will be given consideration, although the R. F. C. has not yet officially announced. He said that consideration of state and national banks closed prior to January 1 will be a natural course, but probably will not be taken care of until after the banks closed prior to January 1 have been taken care of. This should be done in some time early in the spring, he indicated.
