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Trapping of Fur Bearing Animals to Start Dec. 1

Acting director of the state department of conservation, C. P. Thompson, has called attention to the fact that the law upon the shooting and trapping of fur-bearing animals in the northern and central zones of Illinois would remain in effect until December 1 this year.

Heretofore, in the northern zone, the open season has been from November 1 to February 15, inclusive, and in the central zone, from November 15 to February 1 inclusive.

This slight change of date is vital to the preservation of this kind of game in the affected zones, according to Mr. Thompson. Violation of the game and fish codes are punishable by fine, imprisonment or both.

ADVERTISEMENTS NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Village Board of Barrington at a meeting held on the 11th day of December, 1933 will receive bids for the furnishing and complete installation and testing of a deep well pump and motor, with all necessary electric control apparatus and piping connections and foundation at a twelve inch (12 in.) diameter, with one electric in the Village Hall in the Village of Barrington, Illinois.

The lower bowl or the lower end of the working barrel of the pump will be set at an elevation of at least one hundred feet (100 feet) below the surface of the existing floor in the well room at an elevation of 237.0 Village Datum, and the pump will be furnished with a twenty (20) foot length of suction pipe on the lower end with necessary strainer.

The successful bidder will be required to make all such electrical connections to existing panel as will be required; all foundations and all piping to discharge into the existing surface reservoir; and complete the installation to the satisfaction of the Village Board and their engineer. The pump may be of the reciprocating or turbine type, as the bidder may select and shall be of such capacity that will deliver not less than 600 gallons per minute from the existing well to the surface reservoir.

Each bidder will be required to attach to his bid, complete plans and specifications of the type of equipment he proposes to supply. All electrical equipment must meet the requirements of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois.

All bidders shall submit complete details, description and drawings of the pump motor and electrical apparatus to be furnished. If in the test, the pumping unit does not meet the efficiency and output of the Village of Barrington shall have the option of requiring another pumping unit meeting the guarantee to be installed, or of deducting \$50 for each per cent of friction thereof, if the overall efficiency falls below the guaranteed efficiency.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a surety bond in the total amount of full amount of his contract guaranteeing the installation against detaching for a period of one (1) year after completion of the work. The following information is offered for the bidder, but no guarantee is made as to its accuracy, but is the best information obtainable from records: The well is 305 feet deep, it is 12 inches internal diameter at the top and is cased with 12 inch pipe to a depth of about 200 feet. It is now delivering approximately 300 gallons per minute, with a drawdown of 3.05 feet.

In a recent test by the Illinois Water Survey the static water level in this well (Well No. 1) was 60.77 feet below the surface, the pumping level when pumping 300 gallons per minute was 64.42 feet or a drawdown of 3.65 feet. When Well No. 2 (130 feet from Well No. 1) was operating at a discharge of 100 gallons per minute, (Well No. 1 not operating) the effect on Well No. 1 was to draw the water down to 62.42 feet or a drawdown of 3.35 feet.

When operating the turbine pump in Well No. 2 above, (Well No. 1 not operating) there is produced a yield of 700 gallons per minute with a drawdown of 11.75 feet. The static level in this well is 50.75 feet below the surface.
