**80 Per Cent of Stockholders in Bank Agreement**

**Liquidating Group Report Progress at Meeting**

Disclosed since August meeting, 80 per cent of the stockholders of the liquidating group have agreed to the plan for the sale of the assets of the corporation, according to a report presented at a meeting of the stockholders at the village hall last week.

Under the plan for the sale of the assets, the stockholders will receive 80 per cent of the net proceeds of the sale of the assets of the corporation, after the payment of the liabilities of the corporation.

**August Buechling Named on Committee of 7 to Aid Corn-Hog Plan**

August Buechling of Barrington was one of the seven men appointed by the state advisory committee to be members of the temporary campaign committee for the government's corn-hog adjustment program in Lake County, according to an announcement received today by Farm Advisor H. C. Gilkinson.

Other members of the newly appointed committee are: C. A. Faulkner, Ottawa; Heiler Radtke, Grayslake; Dave Covert, Mundelein; H. C. Ames, Zion; Carl Hughes, Lake Villa, and Anthony W. Wagner, McHenry.

Appointment of the temporary committee marks the first step in the local campaign calling for sending to the government of 20 to 30 per cent of the average corn acreage grown during the past two years, the basis of the payment to be 30 cents a bushel on the average yield. The hog agreement, in return for a reduction of 25 per cent from the average production of the past two years, will pay the cooperatives the balance of the production of the two-year base period. Expenses for the state advisory committee will be deducted from benefit payments due the contract growers.
