McHenry County Is First in State With Four DHIA's

The first county in Illinois to organize a dairy herd improvement association, McHenry, is now the first one in the state to have four complete associations in operation. It is reported by J. G. Cash, dairy extension specialist, college of agriculture, University of Illinois.

"For more than a quarter of a century, McHenry county has been a leader in dairy herd improvement association activities," Cash explained. "The first association in the state was organized there back in 1910, and at least one association has been in operation there since that time. At present members of the McHenry county associations are keeping production and feed records on approximately 3000 cows."

Sponsored by the extension service of the college of agriculture, dairy herd improvement association activities have now spread to the point where 64 associations are in operation in 83 counties with 1450 members having 21,100 cows on test.

Running McHenry county a close second on the number of associations in operation are Stephenson, Winnebago and Kane counties with three each.

"Growth of interest in dairy herd improvement association activities has been rapid after dairymen have realized the advantages of such membership," Cash said.

"By keeping an account on each cow, members obtain information which makes possible strict feeding according to production, intelligent culling of unprofitable producers and the adoption of a constructive breeding program."

"Evidence of the dollars and cents value of continuous testing can be found in McHenry county

where associations have been in operation 25 years and where returns above feed cost for the average cow on test last year was approximately three times that of the average cow in the county."
