

Young Farm Worker Killed by Lightning Wednesday Morning

The severe rain and electrical storm which swept northeastern Illinois early Wednesday morning brought death to Vernon Marsh, 19-year-old Marengo farm worker. His companion, a cousin, Charles Stogdill, also 19, was knocked unconscious by the same bolt which felled Marsh.

The lightning struck both youths as they entered a field to pick corn for the Holmes Canning Co. by whom they had been employed for several weeks.

The lightning struck Marsh in the back of his head, tearing his clothes to shreds and burning all the hair from his body.
