Rev. Eagle in his sermon related the interesting fact that Mr. Muir's parents once lived in the vicinity of Wauconda during the Civil war period.

Mr. Muir's all-around athletic prowess while a college student and in later life were also part of Rev. Eagle's discourse. He was a member of the University of Minnesota basketball team and later its manager while attending that school. He was handball, tennis and chess champion while at school and in 1908 was runner-up for both singles and doubles tennis championships of the Big Ten conference.

Mr. Muir and John Adams won the conference doubles tennis title in 1909. He remained active in tennis circles during his entire life, holding the doubles championship of the state of North Dakota for several seasons, and later became the Chicago North Side Parks champion.

Early in the day—and packing and addressing parcels with great care, mailers will materially assist the postal service as well as prevent possible disappointments to themselves or those they are remembering. Mr. Padlock pointed out. Parcels wrapped in stores should be examined and repacked, it was emphasized, so that accepting clerks may be informed exactly how articles are packed and wrapped. This is essential when articles are offered for insurance.

A point that the many who mail greeting cards unsealed at the 1½¢ rate may not have thought of was mentioned. These cards are handled as any other third class matter, if improperly or incompletely addressed, or if the address has moved, they must be disposed of as waste; they are not entitled to the free forwarding privilege accorded those mailed in sealed envelopes at the first class rate and, consequently, the senders in many cases never know that the greetings were not received by the addressees.

Greetings mailed at the first class rate are dispatched and delivered first, given directory service, forwarded if necessary, and, if undeliverable, are returned without extra charge provided the sender's return address is shown on the envelope. They may contain written messages, therefore having a personal appeal which is more highly appreciated by the recipients.
