Court Orders Board of Supervisors to Divide Precincts

A writ of mandamus was submitted Saturday by Judge Ralph J. Dady in the Lake county circuit court, requiring that the board of supervisors reappoint the 78 voting precincts in the county. According to the writ the action must be taken at the June 13th meeting of the board.

The supervisors had proposed to act on the precinct problem on their own volition at the June meeting, but in order to make it mandatory the group of "interested citizens" who filed the petition for a writ last winter appeared before Judge Dady Friday.

The order, instructing the board of supervisors to divide, reappoint and adjust the large voting precincts was issued after State Attorney Charles E. Mason, representing the board of supervisors, stated there were no objections to the plan.

According to the order the Cuba precinct will be divided into two units. Waukegan township's 25 precincts will be readjusted to 29 or 30, Deerfield including Highland Park which has 15 voting districts will be split into 16. The total number of precincts after the revision is expected to be increased to 101. Those precincts having more than 800 voters in the last general election will be their best split up or adjusted so that none of them will have more than 678 voters.

In Cuba township it is expected the division will be made by having route 29 the dividing line.

Threat to Dynamite House Lands Man in Lake County Jail

Because he threatened to blow up a neighbor's home during an argument, Julius Zelmair, 42, of Half Day, found himself held in the Lake county jail Sunday. Zelmair had boasted that he possessed nine sticks of dynamite at home with which he was going to wreck his companion's residence.

According to information given Chief of Police Ray Lesch of Wheeling, Zelmair was visiting at the home of George Rutkowski of

Wheeling Sunday. While in a belaguered and drunken mood, he grabbed a sledge and started to assault John Liebelis, 62, an armless acquaintance.

During the ensuing fracas with Liebelis, Zelmair allegedly said that he would blow Liebelis' home up with dynamite but he had at Half Day. Chief Lesch called for a sheriff's squad and a search was made of Zelmair's home, where three sticks of dynamite were found.

The explosives were retained by the police while Zelmair was placed in the county jail. Monday morning he could remember nothing about his actions Sunday.
