"SLAVERY OF THE PURSE"

Congressman Celler of New York has proposed a consti-tutional amendment to limit the federal government's now plete power over the purse of the people.

Almost all state governments have limited, by constitu-tional provision, the taxing and borrowing powers of local governments, as well as the states themselves. Only the fed-eral government, through the income tax amendment, has the legal authority to take all or any part of the earnings of its citizens.

The Celler amendment would limit the income, gift and inheritance taxes to a maximum of 25 per cent. It would thus guarantee to every citizen 75 per cent of his earnings and possessions. It would do away with what the American Taxpayers league dramatically but accurately terms, "slavery of the

e protection such as this must be placed in the basi w of the land if ruinous taxation—taxation that destroys jobs, opportunities and progress—is to be prevented. No issue is more vital today. And Mr. Celler has performed a tremendous public service by bringing it to the fore.
