116 Favor Proposal: 109 Are Opposed to New Village Building

A proposition for the approval of a \$14.000 bond issue for a new village hall narrowly won out at a special election held at the village hall in Lake Zurich Monday. The vote tabulation was 116 in favor with 180 opposed.
