We of America, distant by thousands of miles from the scene of disturbance, but closely knit by conomic ties to all the world, have played in history a noble part. We gave of our men and resources without stint in 1917 for what we deemed a meritorious cause—the preservation of democracy. those of cynical bent who have not examined our own comings and who have been blind to the shortcomings of our allies are saying that the last world war was in vain. They fail to see that the sacrifices made on the field of battle by the men who sleep in Flanders field will not be futile if America has the courage today to conduct the greatest crusade of all times in behalf of a simple principle of justice to all and ill-

will toward none.

What America can do to save the world from war is not measured by the extent of threats or belificose words nor even by a program of enlarging armament. It is measured rather by the power of the American government to look with uner-ring eye at the truth—the basic causes that have produced the economic upheaval, which in turn has produced the polit-ical unrest of Europe and the world.

st thing the United States can do at the mo to confess her sin—the wrong done in post-war days when the ills of the Versailles treaty were left uncured as an isolationist America, demanding her pound of flesh in war debts, kept all Europe from recovering economic strength and ultimately brought on our worst depression of all times. Why should the Germans believe in democracy's prom-

ises again? The miserable treatment of the German Republic by Britain and France which in turn gave rise to the outraged public opinion that finally welcomed Hitlerism in Germany must be fully recognized before any progress can be made to-ward winning the German people to the cause of peace as we

world back to its senses. It is by the doctrine which the Script-ures have taught us and which if we but give it an opportunity to function even in world diplomacy may bring us further along toward the goal of peace than anything else we have along toward the tried. It is this:

If the government of the United States upon receiving forthcoming German and Italian replies will, without anger or resentment over the sarcastic phrases or hostile tones of the communications and speeches, begin anew a detailed ex-amination of the issues raised by Hitler and Mussolini, the debate will reach to the far corners of the world. And why should anyone fear open discussion as a possible means of

preventing war? For fundame For fundamentally, Germany's refusal to accept Amer ica's friendly intervention is based on a distrust of the position of the United States. It is regrettable that America does not convey to Germany today the essence of impartiality which our historic prestige should permit us to enjoy
