

May the new year hold peace and happiness for us all.



A Fine Art Exhibition "After 9-11"

The Old Court House Art Center is pleased to present an art exhibit titled "After 9-11," a show of fine art created in response to our national tragedy.


On Sept. 11, the day that changed America and Americans, our society had the strange experience of witnessing, live and in replays, the destruction and collapse of New York's World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Those unforgettable images of the terrorists' attack dominated our televisions for the next four days.

Most Americans found it difficult or even impossible to return to life as it was. The artists in this show were invited to express those changes and share their feelings through their artwork. Approximately 15 artists will be showing almost 30 pieces of art produced after Sept. 11. Some of the titles of the artwork in this exhibit include: Shattered (with a ray of hope) by Jane Johnson, Twin Towers by Sarah Hahne, Collateral Damage by Jade Catlinoliver, Orphan of War by Susan Fosnot and Please Guide Us by Nancy

Sarah Hahne of Bull Valley has taken a feminist approach in her mixed media on paper piece titled Twin Towers. In this two-panel piece, she has depicted each tower separately. The panel on the left represents the north tower, which was hit first. Here, Hahne has created a silhouette of a woman in profile. She is waving her arms trying to warn her sister tower, the left panel. On the second tower (or panel), a female form stands unsuspectingly with her back to us.

Hahne explains, "I'm trying to represent the fact that after the first tower was hit, some of the people in both towers were told they were safe and didn't need to evacuate. This was wrong.'

The negative space in Hahne's work is covered with large flowers that seem to be stenciled on the surface. She explained

the background represents the burqa worn by the Afghani women. Hahne feels that U.S. women and children lost their lives so the burqa could be raised.

Woodstock artist Nancy Steinmeyer has developed a technique she calls three-dimensional painting. This allows her to show two images at the same time, much like a hologram. In Steinmeyer's piece Please Guide Us, she has made a detailed painting of the south tower just after impact while the north tower is burning. Suspended over this background painting is a screen with a painting of Uncle Sam praying for our guidance in the aftermath of this terrible event.

Steinmeyer said, "I conceived the idea for this piece and began to work on it about a week after the attacks. In the original plan, I was going to put the traditional Uncle Sam pointing his finger in revenge and retribution. During the three weeks it took me to paint the burning towers, I learned more about the Afghani people and their plight and poverty. By the time I was ready for the over painting of Uncle Sam, I just couldn't paint revenge. So I changed it to Uncle Sam praying for guidance."



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
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
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
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French Art in the 18th Century







Facility—The dancers should have a large room with a special sprung floor. Dancing on concrete covered with tile or other hard surfaces is dangerous. There should be ample mirrors and well-constructed ballet barres for older students.

Observation of Classes-Before enrolling in any school, you should make an appointment to observe a class. Even if you are not knowledgeable, you will be able to judge certain critical things

1) Is the teacher well organized and pleasant?

2) Is he/she knowledgeable? (Check the school brochure for teachers' backgrounds.)

3) Are the teacher's corrections made clearly and in a positive way?

4) Are the students well behaved and attentive for their age?

Performing Opportunities—As dance is a performing art, it is imperative that the students get the chance to dance for an audience. However, a good school should stress education and not detract from that for the sake of performing. A fancy costume will never cover up poor dancing!

Tuition-Do some comparison shopping as to class rates. Classes should be competitively priced but one should not think that the cheapest class means more for your money. As with everything, quality costs more. Schools should have discounted tuition for multiple classes if your child is a serious student. Family discounts may also be available.

Even pre-schoolers taking lessons should have a fun, interesting and beneficial class. A little extra time will result in a decision that you and your child will be happy with for years to come!







Evaluating Workplace Harassment

by Joette S. Doran, J.D.

To determine whether a legally actionable claim for workplace harassment exists, the facts of the situation must be evaluated in connection with the state and federal laws that prohibit discrimination.

The most common form of illegal harassment is known as "hostile work environment harassment." Hostile work environment harassment is defined as an intimidating or offensive working environment which unreasonably interferes with an individual's ability to perform their work. Sexual harassment is the most wellknown form of a hostile work environment claim and is defined as "unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature which unreasonably interferes with an individual's work performance or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment." Sexual harassment can occur in a variety of circumstances, and the victim as well as the harasser may be a woman or a man. The victim does not have to be of the oppo-



site sex and the harasser can be the victim's supervisor, an agent of the employer, a supervisor in another area, a co-worker or a nonemployee. The victim does not have to be the person harassed but could be anyone affected by the offensive con-

It is helpful for the victim to directly inform the harasser that the conduct is unwelcome and must stop. The victim should use any employer complaint mechanism or grievance system available.





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

Facelift Surgery

Most people who are familiar with modern facelifts and other facial cosmetic procedures are aware of their important benefits, in terms of improved appearance as well as self-esteem. • Was the procedure itself painful?

No, I didn't feel anything. I really don't recall a thing about it.

• What was your recovery like?

I think that my recovery was phenomenal. I had the surgery on a Tuesday and we had a family party the following Sunday. I will admit that it was in a kind of controlled light, evening situation. But my daughter, who is a young woman, didn't notice anything, so I think that's a pretty good indication. By seven days, I was totally, totally functional. I had a little bit of concern about sleeping in a balanced way. I would sleep on my back. And then, after I slept on my left side, I would try to sleep the same amount on my right side. Other than that, I would say that I had barely any discomfort. I had very little bruising—very, very little bruising. It was a very positive experience, both spiritually and in a more concrete, tangible way.

• Would you go through it again?





Since prevention is the best tool to eliminate sexual harassment in the workplace, employers are encouraged to take steps necessary to prevent sexual harassment from occurring. The employer should clearly communicate to employees that sexual harassment will not be tolerated. They can do so by establishing an effective complaint or grievance process (distributing a written policy against harassment) and taking immediate and appropriate action when an employee complains. Such a policy can aid employees by instructing them to voice complaints regarding unwelcome conduct without the fear of retaliation. Additionally, the policy can help protect the employer from legal action in certain circuma claim of harassment to the employer's

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
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
