Chicago to Host Exhibition of Sept. 11 Photographs

"here is new york: a democracy of photographs" Features Images by Professional, Amateur Photographers Feb. 1 to March 30, 2002

An internationally acclaimed, grass roots not-for-profit organization Here Is New exhibition of more than 1,500 photographs relating directly to the events of the Sept. 11 World Trade Center tragedy and its aftermath is coming to Chicago, Mayor Richard M. Daley recently announced.

"here is new york: a democracy of photographs" will be presented by the Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs at 72 E. Randolph Street, across from the Chicago Cultural Center, from Friday, Feb. 1, through Saturday, March 30.

The Chicago presentation of "here is new york" is the first major venue for the exhibition outside of New York City. The exhibition evolved from a small SoHo storefront in response to the tragedy. The resulting flood of images has attracted up to 3,000 visitors a day in New York. The exhibition in Chicago is organized by the ceeds will go to the Children's Aid Society

York and is sponsored by Target Stores and Marshall Field's.

The exhibition includes powerful and poignant images taken by professional and amateur photographers. Regardless of source, the photographic prints are displayed anonymously and frameless and informally hung on walls and from wires. A 12-minute video shot during the 24 hours after the tragedy will also be shown continuously in the gallery. Chicagoans are invited to contribute their own photographs relating to the events of Sept. 11. These photos will be scanned on site and added to the archive.

Selected digital prints will be available for sale at \$25 each as well as the video in VHS or DVD format for \$30. Net pro-

The exhibition concept was developed by Here is New York, a not-for-profit organization dedicated to exhibiting and archiving these images and donating net proceeds from sales to public charities that assist those whose lives have been directly affected by the tragedy. There are more than 3,000 photographs in the archive, many of which are available at www. hereisnewyork.org along with additional information.

"Fashion, Flappers 'n All That Jazz"-a major exhibition at the Chicago Historical Society, Clark Street and North Avenuecaptures the spirit of this roaring decade by illuminating the connections among music, dance, fashion and social change in what came to be known as the Jazz

Described by F. Scott Fitzgerald as "the greatest, gaudiest spree in history," this era gave rise to a new generation with its own social conventions.

"On the heels of the horrors of World War I, our society witnessed an explosion of rapid changes-from women gaining the right to vote to the prohibition of alcohol to the flood of African-Americans who poured from the south into Chicago and other industrialized cities-and ultimately set in motion the rise of a new youth culture that would foster and reflect a moral revolt and social transformations," explains Lonnie Bunch, president of the Chicago Historical Society.

Leading this social revolution were the newly "liberated" women-known as flappers—whose rebellious attitude inspired risque, flashy fashions, unorthodox behavior and a demand for equality. Drawing from the Chicago Historical Society's preeminent Hope B. McCormick Costume Center collection, "Fashion, Flappers 'n All That Jazz" showcases stunning dresses, suits, coats, undergarments, shoes, accessories and men's suits displayed against ing legacy—Chicago Jazz. the backdrop of the innovative music and athletic dances that became the hallmark 2002.

"Fashion, Flappers 'n All That Jazz" also touches on other icons of this decade including the Chicago gangster and the speakeasy. With the passage of the Volstead Act in 1921, alcohol became an illegal substance, prompting an enormous black market for liquor controlled by organized crime. Nightspots—or speakeasies where drinks were served out of the sight of the law, became the rage and the destination of choice for men and women.

Through a series of scenes depicting a night out in Chicago, visitors can immerse themselves in the age of the "lost generation." "Dressed to Thrill" shows a liberated young woman in the process of choosing what to wear for a heady Saturday evening of music and dance. "Stepping Out" focuses on a young trio who has just arrived outside one of Chicago's "hot" clubs -and illustrates how prohibition spawned a new culture that championed unchaperoned dates, suggestive dancing, smoking and illegal drinking. "Come Dancing" depicts a downtown nightspot where people gather to dine and dance to such legends as Ben Pollack and his Orchestra and Isham Jones and his Orchestra.

Finally, "Chicago Jazz" transports visitors out of the Loop in search of late-night entertainment. This scene celebrates "black and tans," nightclubs that became home to such celebrated black jazz musicians as King Oliver's Creole Jazz Band or Louis Armstrong's Dreamland Syncopators. At a time of widespread racism in the United States, many white patrons clamored to hear this new style of music. Some of the southside clubs catered to both black and white audiences, giving rise to an endur-

Protection for Employees Over 40— The Age Discrimination In Employment Act (ADEA) by Joette S. Doran, J.D.

The Age Discrimination in Employment Act, or ADEA, protects individuals who are 40 years of age or older from employment discrimination based on age. The ADEA's protections apply to both employees and job applicants. Under the act, it is unlawful to discriminate against a person because of his/her age with respect to any term, condition or privilege of employment. This includes but is not limited to: hiring, firing, promotion, layoff, compensation, benefits, job assignments and training.

It is also unlawful to retaliate against an individual for opposing employment practices that discriminate based on age. The ADEA applies to employers with 20 or more employees, including state and local governments. It also applies to employment agencies and to labor organizations as well as to the federal government.

Remedies under the act include lost wages, reinstatement and/or front pay (continuing damages for lost wages) and

liquidated damages if the jury finds that the employer's conduct was willful. A violation is willful if the employer either knew or showed reckless disregard for the matter of whether the conduct was prohibited under the ADEA. If the conduct is deemed to be willful, then the employee is entitled to liquidated damages, or double damages, in an amount equal to the employee's actual damages. Should the jury find for the employee,







Your Diet and Your Teeth

It is not so much what you eat as how often you eat that affects your teeth!

Almost everyone has some remaining plaque on his or her teeth, even after brushing and flossing. Bright and early on the final day of 2001, Ruth L. Kern, international etiquette consultant, dressed in holiday attire, was giving last minute party etiquette advice to Judy Hsu, co-host of The Morning Show, and the show's audience.

She started by demonstrating a proper American handshake, stressing the importance of web-to-web contact for the hands and eye-toeye contact of the individuals when they are shaking hands. She told Ms. Hsu that an American won't trust you unless you look him straight in the eye.

Ms. Kern then emphasized the importance of mailing invitations at least four weeks before a party but six weeks before a holiday party or a wedding. Invitations should include an RSVP request as well as a

map. The host should call all guests who have not responded to the invitation seven to ten days before the party and accept whatever excuse his guests give for not having responded earlier.

Ms. Kern demonstrated how a lady can hold a cocktail glass, an evening bag and still be able to shake hands at a party; she should carry a bag with a strap that she can put on her shoulder or hang from her left arm. Her cocktail glass should be held in her left hand, thus freeing up her right hand to shake with when greeting a fellow partygoer.

Key Provisions of the 2001 Tax Relief Act Take Effect

- Adoption Tax Credit increases from \$5,000 to \$10,000 per child (phases out for taxpayers with modified AGI's of \$150,000)
- Education IRA contributions limit increases to \$2,000 per child. Qualifying education expenses now include elementary and secondary school expenses. AGI thresholds increase to \$190,000 to \$220,000 for taxpayers filing jointly.
- · Qualifying distributions from Section 529 Plans, such as Illinois' Bright Start, are exempt from federal income tax. (This exemption is due to expire on Dec. 31, 2010, unless the law is extended.)
- IRA contribution limits increase to

- Contribution limits for 401(k), 403(b) and 457 Plans increase to \$11,000.*
- Salary deferral limits for SIMPLE plans increase to \$7,000.*
- The unified credit exemption amount for estate taxes increases to \$1 million.

The baby boomer generation is the first generation to have the luxury of experiencing a lull after the intensity of raising children and building careers. The Healing Process

Patients frequently become nervous during the healing phase following a surgical procedure. They see certain changes in the affected areas which are actually quite normal and predictable. It is helpful if patients are aware of these normal changes and the reasons for them, as it will help them feel more relaxed about the final outcome of the procedure.

Any surgical or traumatic injury to the skin and soft tissue results in the same steps of healing. There is an initial release of enzymes from the damaged tissue which starts the healing process. These enzymes actually cause inflammation, without which there would be no healing. This is the start of the first phase of healing called the "proliferative phase." During this phase, the tissue proliferates or buildsup. The ultimate goal of this phase is the buildup of collagen, which in turn mends and binds the tissue. The human body is very efficient and therefore very quickly binds the tissue with a crude form of collagen which is thick and bulky. In addition to the buildup of collagen, new blood vessels form, which explains why scars are pink at first. Also, many white blood cells, other repair cells and inflammatory components rush into the tissue. This causes swelling and a thickening where the incision or surgery was performed. The proliferative phase of healing lasts for approximately four to six weeks.

After this, the second phase of healing, the "remodeling phase," begins. During this period of time, the collagen that was produced in the first four to six weeks is broken down by the body's enzymes softer and thinner collagen. It is during tic surgery.

this time that the blood vessels that formed during the proliferative phase shrink and disappear from the wound, which explains why scars fade over time. In facial wounds, much of the remodeling phase happens in approximately eight weeks. While three months after the initial trauma or procedure, facial scars are much softer and smoother, full maturation of a scar can take nine months to a year.

Our typical follow-up for patients is in one month, so that we can see the healing of the wound when it reaches the peak of the proliferative phase, and then again in two months, after the end of the remodeling phase.

It can be helpful and reassuring to patients to realize that there are sound, scientific principles behind much of what we do in our practice of medicine. When patients understand the natural course of healing and what to expect, they are less anxious about their recovery from facial surgery. We always try to educate our patients so their concerns are addressed and their fears are minimized.

Poor Report Cards: What to Do...

January marks the beginning of a new tify and remedy the basic problem so it year as well as the halfway point in your child's school year. The skills developed during the first half of the year will be work ahead. Midyear report cards will be distributed soon. If you are unhappy with your child's midyear report card, what should you do?

Ask to be kept informed of things, whether or not they are going well. If and when a problem arises, it is easier to handle when a relationship has been established with your child's teacher or counselor.



Brother Guy Consolmagno of The Vatican Astronomical Observatory to Speak at the Adler Planetarium

Back by popular demand, Brother Guy Consolmagno of The Vatican Observatory, will lecture at two very special classes at the Adler Planetarium & Astronomy Museum on Wednesday, Feb. 6, and at a twosession class on Thursdays, Feb. 7 and 14.

"The Vatican and the Sun" on Feb. 6 will delve into the historical role that the Vatican has played in the development of astronomy and how the Roman Catholic Church and today's astronomers react to issues like the Big Bang, the discovery of other planets and the possibility of extraterrestrial intelligence.

Offered in two parts, "New Moon: Radically New Views of a Very Old Planet," on Feb. 7 and 14 will explore the history of the classical ideas (and the reasons for them) of how the moon formed and evolved to what the lunar revolutionaries

Consolmagno returns to the Adler to provide a unique perspective on the relationship of science and religion. He is currently the meteorite curator at The Vatican's Astronomical Observatory, where he studies the origins and evolution of meteorites and asteroids and writes about the historical relationship between science and the church.

Consolmagno obtained his bachelor of science and master of science in earth and planetary sciences from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and his Ph.D. in planetary science from the University of Arizona. After receiving his Ph.D., he became a postdoctoral fellow and lecturer at the Harvard College Observatory and later at MIT. In 1983, Consolmagno left MIT to join the U.S. Peace Corp where he served for two years teaching physics and astronomy in Kenya. Upon returning to the United States in 1985, Consolmagno became an assistant professor of physics at Lafayette College, where he taught until his entry into the Jesuit Order in 1989. Since taking his vows as a Jesuit Brother our changing ideas about the moon, from in 1991, Consolmagno has continued his studies in philosophy and theology at Loyola University-Chicago and in physics at the University of Chicago. He is the author of several books, including Brother Astronomy: Adventures of a Vatican Sci-





REMODELING 2002

A brand new house with a big kitchen is a dream that most of us share. For Palatine's Joseph and Laura Quinn and their two teenaged children it was a dream soon to come true. "American Glass" is the second program in the February Seminar Series "The Glory of Glass," sponsored by the Barrington Community Associates of The Art Institute of Chicago. This lecture will be Wednesday, Feb. 13, 1 p.m., at the Barrington Area Public Library, 505 N. Northwest Highway.

Jennifer Downs, Andrew W. Mellon research assistant for American Decorative Arts at the Art Institute of Chicago, will discuss the highlights of the museum's collection of 18th, 19th and 20th century American glass, which includes examples of hand-blown, mold-blown, pressed and art glass.

Using color slides, Ms. Downs will place objects within a historical, social and aesthetic context. 



Blown Glass Sculptures by Chihuly

The role of artist Dale Chihuly in contemporary glass will be discussed in the next February Seminar Series, "The Glory of Glass," on Wednesday, Feb. 20. This lecture, sponsored by the Barrington Community Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago, will begin at 1 p.m. at the Barrington Area Public Library, 505 N. Northwest Hwy. In "Form From Fire: Studio Glass and Chihuly," we will follow American glass from the factory setting to the studio furnaces, from forms of function to works of art.

The Studio Glass Movement grew out of the Craft Movement in the 1960s. Harvey Littleton and Dominic Labino were the leading pioneers of this period. Dale Chihuly was one of the early students at Harvey Littleton's University of Wisconsin Freshly Minted Glass Program and is the name now synonymous with contemporary glass. His blown glass sculptures are currently on exhibit at the Garfield Park Conservatory in Chicago.




