Spring Excursion to Include Wright's Robie House

The annual Spring Excursion sponsored by the Barrington/Northwest Community Associates (B/NWCA) will take place on Friday, May 21 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and promises to be a highlight of an impressive season. B/NWCA members will travel to Hyde Park and tour one of the most important buildings in the history of modern architecture, enjoy a carillon concert in a gorgeous chapel, and view late 19th-century European art works originally compiled by collectors for private viewing only.

This wonderful tour will begin with a stop at Robie House. Frederick Robie was only 28 years old

when he and his wife, Lora, commissioned Frank Lloyd Wright to design a home for them on Woodlawn Avenue in Hyde Park. Wright designed the house in his studio in Oak Park between 1908 and 1909; once completed, Robie House became the greatest example of Wright's Prairie style, an architectural style that was uniquely American. The fascinating history of Robie House equals its design merits. Frederick Robie, Lora and their two children moved into the house in May 1910, after spending \$58,000, which included land, structure and furnishings. Unfortunately, just 14 months later, the Robie House was for sale, following Frederick's financial problems and the deterioration of his marriage. The second owners fared no better. David Lee Taylor purchased the house in December 1911 and died less than a year later; his widow, Ellen, sold the property in November 1912. The saga continued until 1957 when Robie House was scheduled to be demolished; fortunately protestors, including Wright himself, then 90 years old, saved the structure which is today a Chicago Landmark Building.

The next stop for B/NWCA members is an equally riveting structure—Rockefeller Chapel, the tallest building on the campus of the University of Chicago. It was designed by architect Bertram Goodhue and built between 1925 and 1928 without the use of structural steel. It occupies a full block, seats 1,700 people and boasts 70

gorgeous sculptures lining the interior and intricate woodcarvings that adorn the organ. The chapel also contains the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial Carillon and tower, the 72-bell carillon being the second largest carillon in the world. B/ NWCA members will enjoy a carillon concert at noon and then savor a delicious lunch at La Petite Folie.

The excursion will conclude at the Smart Museum, also located on the University of Chicago campus. Although the museum houses a permanent collection of 10,000 objects, the tour will focus primarily on a featured exhibit entitled "The Darker Side of Light: Acts of Privacy 1850-1900." Organized by the National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C., this unique exhibit features 100 prints, drawings and small sculptures compiled by collectors during the second half of the 19th century. These artifacts reveal the "darker side" of European life and were collected for private use only. They offer a unique look into a part of European history rarely seen.

Reservations are required and accepted in the order received. The reservation period closes May 7

This is the final event of the season and will undoubtedly be a huge success for B/ NWCA members who have the opportunity to visit three diverse but outstanding attractions in Hyde Park.

Fellowship Housing's Second Annual Gala "There's No Place Like Home"

Fellowship Housing (FHC), a nonprofit standing ovation and lots of hugs. organization, raised more than \$200,000 at their second annual gala, "There's No Place Like Home." The event was held Feb. 27 at the beautiful Stonegate Conference Center in Hoffman Estates. The Wizard of Oz was the theme, helping to connect the event to the mission of the organization—to transform the lives of homeless or at-risk single moms and their children by providing safe, affordable housing and holistic mentoring to guide them from crisis to long-term stability and independence.

A sold-out crowd of 250 guests celebrated the evening. Barbara Beckman, executive director for Habitat for Humanity, Northern Fox Valley, was the event honorary chair. She shared with guests how the Fellowship Housing program prepares families for independent living upon graduation and financial stability. Guests were also inspired by the life stories of a current Fellowship Housing mom and a 2008 Fellowship Housing graduate. These women shared their heartbreaking stories and how Fellowship Housing was able to provide the life changing environment they needed. Bev, a current FHC mom, told of how she had been raised in an abusive household. Bev is working her way to becoming independent as she thrives in the Fellowship Housing program. Kim, a FHC graduate, spoke of the struggle she had raising her son on her own and how Fellowship Housing was able to provide housing at a time when she didn't have money to pay her next months rent. Kim was successful in the FHC program and now has her own apartment and plans for further life achievements. The audience showed support to the two moms, encouraging them with a 1-847-882-2511.

The Fellowship Housing's Executive Director Susan Forbes shed light on the many ways FHC supports families in addition to housing. Due to the economy, several single mothers had been laid off. But with the support and guidance of FHC staff, these moms found new employment within a matter of weeks. Fellowship Housing also allows families with teenage boys to enter the program and in many cases these families would be turned away from other agencies simply because of the age of their sons. "The challenge ahead for Fellowship Housing in this economic climate is to sustain the program and move the 15 qualified families who are waiting into apartments. Tonight I am asking you to make an investment in these families and join our efforts to transform the lives of the mothers and children who are desperate to have a new hope filled life," Forbes urged.

Toward the end of the evening, a Fellowship Housing board member, Tony Orsini, shared his personal story of being raised by a single mother, followed by a compelling challenge to all the guests to give what they could. This challenge spurred additional guests to come forward with funding to support a family for an entire year.

Before the night came to a close, "There's No Place Like Home" resonated with all in attendance, as enough had been raised to bring seven new families into the program. These families will now have access to case management, subsidized rent, and other assistance that Fellowship Housing has to offer.



Where Do You Carry Your Extra Weight? by Lisa Shanahan

Did you know that where you carry your weight is very important according to the National Institutes of Health? People who carry too much weight in the stomach areaknown as an apple shape—have greater health risks than those who carry extra pounds in their hips and thighsotherwise known as a pear shape. 



Cosmetic Dentistry: Getting the Color Right with Technology

Over the last two months, I discussed now new technology, new techniques and new materials constantly challenge he dental profession. Sorting these out and selecting the best is a consistent endeavor for any quality dentist. I discussed he advantages and disadvantages that lasers and digital X-rays have brought to the dental profession. This month, I would ike to review color-scanning technology.

Have you ever seen someone with a crown or veneer on their front tooth and could tell from a mile away that it doesn't natch their other teeth? Until just recently, dentists had to use little colored shade abs and try to figure out what color porcelain the dental laboratory should use when making their new crown or veneer. Infortunately, this left a lot up to the inerpretation of the dentist or assistant and often times, it was wrong. Teeth appear o be all one color but actually have mul-




tiple bands and layers of different colors. Communicating these subtle nuances to the lab was virtually impossible. Often times, the patient had to visit the lab so the technician could attempt to match the porcelain of a new crown to the rest of the patient's teeth.

Now there is a new technology called ShadeVision. The system works with the same technology that matches paint color. The ShadeVision scanner is placed over the tooth and records color data. That data is e-mailed to the dental laboratory, and they use it to make a perfectly matched crown. They can even scan the crown they made and check it against the measurements provided by the dentist. This technology eliminates the guesswork and provides the patient with a well-matched, natural-looking crown.

Major Award to Citizens for Conservation

Citizens for Conservation (CFC) has received a Conservation and Native Landscaping Award for its restoration of Grigsby Prairie in Barrington Hills. The award was presented by the Environmental Protection Agency and Chicago Wilderness at a ceremony at the Chicago Botanic Garden. The organizations sponsor awards to recognize exemplary sites featuring native landscaping, restored ecosystems or best practices of conservation-style develop-

Grigsby Prairie was recognized for the work which transformed it from a fallow field into a thriving ecosystem. Grigsby represents a number of land donations to CFC from Peggy Grigsby Richards and now totals 42.4 acres. These former farm fields were being invaded by box elder, buckthorn, black locust, and other alien

CFC's management activities, supervised by Tom Vanderpoel and implemented by devoted volunteers, include clearing brush, planting plugs and seeds as well as conducting controlled burns. Grigsby is now a source of seed for other restorations thanks to the 1,000 volunteer hours devoted to it annually.

Grigsby's biodiversity is thriving. Over 175 species of native plants inhabit its wet, mesic and dry prairie, savanna and wetland habitats. Grasses include prairie

dropseed, big bluestem, and little bluestem. Forbs consist of species such as wild white indigo, rattlesnake master, Indian paintbrush, and four gentian species.

Rare birds have returned to this open prairie with several declining grassland species nesting at Grigsby: Eastern meadowlarks, bobolinks, dickcissels, grasshopper sparrows, sedge wrens, king birds, savanna sparrows and bluebirds.

Seed of the very rare, almost extirpated, eastern prairie fringed orchid has been sown, and CFC hopes the plant will appear in the next year or two.



corner, my flip-flops are calling my name. I know they are bad for my feet but what can I wear?

Flip-flops and open-toe sandals feel liberating, but the lack of protection leaves the toes vulnerable to injuries. Stubbing a toe in flip-flops can do a number on your nails and toes. Many of the more active styles of sandals have a closed toe just for this reason. When choosing sandals, look for a pair with some toe protection. This is especially true when we are choosing. sandals for children.

A flip-flop should be reserved as a pool shoe only. However, if you must have a flip-flop, there are a couple key things to look for. Select a rigid sandal that has a little bit of an arch. You should not be able to easily bend the sandal in half. Avoid the inexpensive foam type of flipflops, as these give no support or protection and they harbor bacteria and fungus.



your foot or nails, you should make an appointment to see a podiatrist to evaluate the injury. Injuries that leave bruises under the nail will leave the nail bed more With warm weather just round the vulnerable to a fungal infection. The daily use of a topical medication applied to the nail as it grows out will help prevent a fungus. The last thing you want to do is wait 6 to 12 months for the ugly bruised nail to grow out only to be replaced with a yellowed, thick, fungal nail.

Are those rocker-bottom shoes and sandals good for my feet?

A rocker-bottom shoe has been around for a long time but just recently became wildly popular. They claim to burn more calories and tone your backside. While this may be true, they also could lead to injury. The shape of the shoe puts more strain on your Achilles tendon and heel. If you are suffering from heel pain or Achilles tendinitis, this would not be the shoe for you. If you have forefoot pain, this shoe may help take the pressure off the front of the foot.

Symptoms—Visual signs of EAB infestation usually go unnoticed for 1 to 3 years and once they are apparent it is usually too late to save the tree. Visual signs can be yellowing of foliage, thinning of canopy, shoots sprouting from the trunk, meowners to cut down their ash trees at branch dieback, and the presence of their own expense if they find EAB or woodpeckers.

Invasiveness—EAB spread so fast dead ash trees in its path in just six years. On July 1, 2008, a single tree was discovered in Algonquin, Ill., that was infested with EAB. Within one month, 42 trees in three different nearby areas were destroyed, as they were found to be infested as well. Officials believe that the first ash confirmed case of EAB in Barrington was in 2009. Experts believe that EAB has
