Tour the property of three gorgeous private estates in beautiful Barrington Hills. View acres of wellmanicured lawns and gardens, enjoy the party-themed designer-created vignettes scattered throughout the estates, and see impressive floral containers adorning poolside patios. Stroll down winding pathways and discover secret gardens and unusual interpretations of common landscape features along the way. In addition to the gorgeous grounds, you will find a seemingly endless array of antique and boutique shopping on the main estate grounds. Specially selected vendors will be featured in a French Market setting along with unique decorative garden items and furnishings, and an upscale flea market overflowing with unusual finds. Featured Garden Estates: Flower Hill

Once a simple farmhouse property, this beautiful estate now features abundant self-contained gardens and lush shade borders. The peaceful grounds will captivate you from the minute you pass through the entrance, but are all the more impressive knowing they are designed, cultivated and maintained by the homeowner himself. The drive is lined with crab apple and Hawthorne trees, blossoming in shades of pink, red and white. Beds of delicate Japanese iris provide contrasting color. Central to the front gardens is a fountain, amassed with impatiens and encircled with crab apple trees. Colorful perennial gardens of hydrangea, sedum, pulmonaria, ferns and native grasses border the home. A new garden, fountain and stonework greet you as you meander to the back of the home, toward the tranquil pool and patio area. The bluestone pool deck, beautifully integrated into the landscape, is surrounded by established perennials, overflowing containers and fragrant trees. A stone path leads past the charming guest house, and into the lush gardens that really set this property apart. Shade was not a detriment here, where

from beneath the old growth pine trees. Several stone benches and garden statues embellish this peaceful paradise.

The gardens adjacent the home offer a pleasing palette of perennials and foliage. Note the huge Buckeye tree, which has established itself far north of its customary zone. A quick walk across the lawn brings you to the vegetable garden, fenced to keep the abundant harvest safe from everhungry deer. Laid out in four quadrants and encircled with day lilies, this garden, indeed, this property, is sure to inspire the gardener in everyone.

Splendor in the Hills

Lavish perennial gardens and elegant custom gates set the tone for this splendid estate. Colorful perennials bloom all season along the drive as you enter the property. The Indiana limestone home, flanked by two huge oak trees, is an exquisite backdrop for vibrant perennial beds, numerous specimen trees, and containers brimming with seasonal foliage. The hill-side above, shaded with pines, features a rock garden embedded with sedum, phlox, hosta and hydrangea.

Boxwood is featured throughout the property, but is especially striking in the large, structured gardens of the patio terrace. Here, koi swim in a water garden adjacent to the pergola-covered dining area. In contrast to the upper terrace gardens, the pool landscaping is casual and less refined. Designed and maintained by Michelle D'Arcy with Horticultural Associates Inc., these gardens are filled with Russian sage, false indigo, hardy geranium, fragrant tree lilacs and a large smoke bush. The pool deck provides a breathtaking view of the surrounding property, but don't let that be enough.

Shade was not a detriment here, where Follow the stone outcroppings down to the homeowner has coaxed abundant life the first of two impressive fire pits, de-

signed with metal work from "The Metal Man," Frank Mussmacher. From there, spill out onto the lawn and follow the dry river bed to the hydrangea-filled ravine which serves as a gallery for more of The Metal Man's spectacular metal sculptures. The artist will be on-site during the tour to personally answer questions about his work, featured throughout the property, including a magnificent spiral staircase winding up an old hickory tree (known as the "Birds Nest"), and a delicate ornamental fence bordering the ravine edge.

An English Masterpiece

Stately columns of trees, and containers brimming with color set the stage for this estate. Designed by John Staab of the Brickman Group, these 10 acres offer everything from formal, terraced gardens to carefree cottage borders. The gardens surrounding the main house are decidedly formal, as evidenced by the English-style boxwood gardens and brick path lined with white begonias and yews. Vignettes in the center of the circular drive and the rear of the home always delight with their extravagance and whimsy. Travel through the garden gate to visit the serene grand terrace and lawn area.

A gravel lane will lead you through the pool parterre and into the formal garden. The ornate pavilion covers distinctive perennials, annuals and roses, all in riotous bloom. Notice the use of containers to add more color and dimension throughout the area.

A short stroll brings you to the potager garden, a French-inspired vegetable, fruit, berry and cutting garden sure to delight. Nearby, the charming cottage gardens bordering the 19th century farmhouse and guesthouse will have you pointing out your favorite blooms and noting new possibilities for your own garden.

Age Discrimination and **Release Agreements**

The Age Discrimination In Employment Act (ADEA) protects individuals who are 40 years of age or older from employment discrimination based on age. The ADEA's protections apply to both employees and job applicants. Under the ADEA, it is unlawful to discriminate against a person because of his/her age with respect to any term, condition, or privilege of employment-including, but not limited to, hiring, firing, promotion, layoff, compensation, benefits, job assignments and training. The ADEA applies to employers with 20 or more employees, including state and local governments. It also applies to emby Joette S. Doran, Esq.



ployment agencies and to labor organizations, as well as to the federal government. Remedies under the ADEA include lost wages, reinstatement and/or front pay

(continuing damages for lost wages), and liquidated damages if the jury finds that the employer's conduct was willful.

Often employers will attempt to avoid an action for age discrimination by offering a terminated employee a severance agreement that includes the waiver of a claim for age discrimination. The waiver of legal rights for an age claim will be effective where the employer has complied with the Older Workers Benefit Protection Act (OWBPA). Under the OWBPA, the release will be considered valid to waive an age claim where the company complies with the Act by providing adequate consideration, advises the employee to consult with an attorney, provides at least 21 days to consider the agreement, provides seven days to revoke the agreement after execution, and specifically provides that rights under the ADEA are waived. As such, because an agreement drafted under the OWBPA is effective to waive your legal rights, you are well advised to review the facts of your employment situa-

tion and the release with legal counsel. In order to pursue a case of age dis-

crimination, a Charge of Discrimination must first be filed with a state or federal administrative agency. Because the time limitations are strict, if you believe that you are being subjected to age discrimination or that your employment rights are being violated, I encourage you not to delay receiving information regarding your legal rights.







"Silver to Gold: Poised for the Future," launched BACOA's 25th anniversary year and was also an occasion to thank the volunteers, donors, staff and community members who have supported BACOA.



My daughter tripped over a hose in the yard three days ago and she continues to limp and complain of pain in her ankle. The area looks a little swollen but she can move it without Help! I have extreme sharp stabbing pain. Could her ankle be broken, or is she just being dramatic?

Children generally do not complain of pain for multiple days, unless they mean it. If your daughter continues to complain and exhibits signs of guarding that limb, it is best to have her evaluated by a Podiatrist. We at Family Foot and Ankle Specialists have the ability to take a digital X-ray in our office and can review them with you in a matter of minutes.

The bones of growing children have areas of cartilage called growth plates. These areas allow the bones to grow in size and length.
