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
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Women's Board of the Chicago Zoological Society Raises \$1.3 Million at Whirl Gala

Seven hundred and sixty guests gathered at Brookfield Zoo for the 29th annual Whirl fundraising gala hosted by the Women's Board of the Chicago Zoological Society. The \$600-per-person black-tie event raised nearly \$1.3 million, which will benefit the animals at the zoo, as well as the society's conservation and education programs. This year's Whirl, themed "A Whirl in the Wilderness," celebrated the zoo's new exhibit—Great Bear Wilderness-and was chaired by Vicki DeMar of Winnetka

A highlight of the evening was the cocktail hour held in the 7.5-acre naturalistic Great Bear Wilderness exhibit. Whirl guests were among the first to meander through the National Park-like experience featuring iconic North American animals -polar bears, grizzly bears, bison, Mexican gray wolves, and bald eagles-before it opened to the public on May 8.

A scrumptious three-course dinner catered by Blue Plate and dancing to the music of Maggie Speaks followed in the Grand Tent, located on the zoo's West Mall. Bukiety provided the décor, which invoked the feeling of being in the forests of North America.

Richard Glazier is a master storyteller whose charming, insightful narration is the perfect accompaniment to his brilliant piano performances. Playing rare arrangements of the great Gershwin songs, and the complete solo piano version of Rhapsody in Blue, Glazier brings his audiences entertainment of the highest order.

Glazier is one of today's foremost interpreters of the American Popular Songbook and probably most closely associated with music of George and Ira Gershwin. According to Michael Feinstein, "Richard Glazier has Gershwin in his soul." And Clavier Magazine wrote of him, "Gershwin's piano music has found an exquisite voice in Richard Glazier."

Trained in the classics, Glazier earned bachelor's and master's degrees in piano performance from Indiana University School of Music and a doctorate of musical arts from the Cleveland Institute of Music. An employer may prefer arbitration because it is viewed as quicker and cheaper than going to court. However, arbitration has been questioned for being unfair to employees since mandatory arbitration provisions deny the employee their right to proceed in court. ment delegates the decision regarding unfairness to the arbitrator, it should be the arbitrator rather than the court who decides whether an arbitration clause is enforceable. In Rent-A-Center, West, Inc. v. Jackson (No. 09-497), the Supreme Court considered whether a black employee who filed a racial discrimination claim against the company after he left his job was forced to have his discrimination case arbitrated. Rent-A-Center moved to have his complaint dismissed because he agreed to submit job disputes, including discrimination claims, to arbitration as part of his employment agreement. The employment contract also provided that any question of whether the arbitration was enforceable would be decided by an arbitrator instead of a judge. Mandatory arbitration provisions in the employment area have been challenged as fundamentally unfair or unconscionable. At issue before the Supreme Court was whether the judge or the arbitrator has the authority to decide whether a mandatory arbitration agreement is unconscionable. In a 5to-4 decision, the Court sided with the employer. Critics argue that by siding with the employer, the Court removed an im-

Court held so long as an arbitration agree- portant check on the arbitration system, especially in the use of one-sided arbitration clauses since if an agreement to arbitrate is unfair, the arbitrator should not decide that question since as a result of their training and vocation arbitrators have a tendency to believe that arbitration is inherently fair.



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
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Art Associates Plan Fall Tea

Adults and Fractured Teeth

As young people, many adults in the United States were not exposed to quality dentistry or could not afford it. We grew up prior to fluoridated water, sealants to prevent cavities in grooves and the current concepts of oral hygiene.

Almost everyone had cavities. Dentists usually watched a cavity grow until it was large enough to warrant a silver filling or amalgam, as it is properly called. Placement of an amalgam at this point structurally weakened the tooth. Amalgams seal the tooth better; they are stronger and have poor compressive strength, meaning that over time and under the pressure of biting and chewing, they crack and wear, subjecting the remaining tooth to excessive forces. This is the reason that many adults frequently fracture their back teeth.

In addition, as these amalgams age, they corrode, causing the edges of the filling itself to break down and allow the entry of saliva and decay-causing bacteria into the tooth. Since these fillings were originally large and close to the tooth's nerve, these teeth often require root canal therapy after being exposed to the bacteria.

These problems are neither the fault of the dentist nor the patient. However, they can usually be prevented by the use of porcelain or gold inlays, instead of silver fillings at the time the cavity is initially detected. Porcelain and gold restorations in Barrington.

more resistant to wear than amalgams. Instead of wearing and cracking under the forces, they actually become stronger.

Once the damage is done, however, the dentist has limited options. They are forced to suggest a more expensive as well as extensive restoration, such as a crown. Unfortunately, this is a fact in adult dental care. Insurance companies try to control their costs by limiting benefits to their policyholders and encouraging the repair of teeth with the weaker amalgam material. The cost to the insuring company is less now, but it will be more to you, the patient, later when the tooth fractures-at this point, you are retired and no longer covered under their policy.



Dr. James Baird Addresses **Common Foot Problems**

Dr. James Baird is a local Podiatric Physician and Surgeon and is now accepting new patients in his Barrington office. Here are a few solutions from Dr. Baird to some common foot prob-

Six months ago I fell down some stairs. Since the fall, I have had constant pain in the outside of my foot that extends up to my toes and ankle. My doctor has not been able to diagnosis the problem. I have tried physical therapy but it has not helped.

You are likely suffering from a condition called cuboid subluxation syndrome. The cuboid is a bone on the outside of the foot. It can be dislocated with a sudden movement of the foot either inward or outward. If the bone stays out of position, it causes irritation along the outside of the foot that radiates down the toes and up the ankle. The condition often goes undiagnosed and is not easily identified by X-ray or MRI. Once diagnosed correctly it usually can be treated quickly with a manipulation of the bone back into position. An orthotic with a cuboid pad is usually necessary to hold the bone in place to minimize recurrence.

feet. When the feet sweat it causes bacteria to form in her socks and shoes which give them the foul odor. I would prescribe a roll on medication that will resolve the problem quickly. Your daughter should also change to a synthetic athletic sock (Thorlos is a dependable sock brand). These types of socks will help to get the moisture away from the skin to decrease the bacteria and odor. Socks should be cleaned in warm water and bleach.

My son has started football and he has been limping after practices. He says his heel hurts. What could be the cause of his pain?

Most likely your son has developed an injury called calcaneal apophysitis or Sever's Disease. It is most common between the ages of 8 to 14. Pain is usually felt at the back and side of the heel. Squeezing the sides of the heel bone is often painful. A recent growth spurt or weight gain with increase of activity can trigger the condition. The treatment for this combines rest and modification to his shoes and insoles. 



Plum Grove Road in Palatine. So much so that the agency's Baby & Maternity Closet was moved offsite in 2003 to 140 W. Northwest Highway to make room for additional counseling

All that changed on July 2, when PHD said goodbye to 37 North and hello to 1610 Colonial Parkway in Inverness. The move comes in the midst the agency's \$2.25 million capital campaign, "Imagine the Possibilities," launched in mid-2009. PHD's new home is more than double the size, increasing the charity's operating space from 5,000 square feet to just over 10,000 square feet.

"We are thrilled at the possibilities this new home will bring," says Catherine Vincus, PHD's executive director. "It has been a long time coming. Fortunately for us, our donors and businesses in the community have embraced our mission and want to see us succeed."

PHD, incorporated in 1971, has provided therapeutic counseling and support services to women who are pregnant or parenting children under the age of 3 as well as educational outreach programs to adolescents and their parents. The agency served a record number of people in 2009, emphasizing the organization's desperate need for increased space.

Kim Stobbe, PHD's clinical director for the past four years has watched PHD's numbers steadily increase. "Last year we provided over 1,245 clients with 8,204 visits to the counseling center and Baby Closet alone. Our Educational Outreach Department reached over 6,500 students in local schools and over 125 parents through specialized programs.'

Seeds for the campaign, and the move itself, were planted in 2008 thanks to a generous couple who gifted PHD with \$1 million. The additional \$1.25 million will help pay for renovations on the building, first-year operations and to start an endowment to secure the future work of PHD. The new building will provide such

ervation of Human Dignity (PHD), a coun- confidential professional counseling and case management services, a children's play area, conference rooms for meetings, focus groups and staff and volunteer trainings and a larger Baby & Maternity Closet.

Not to be forgotten are the volunteers who have donated time and energy to ensure a successful move. Palatine resident Patrick Norman, 16, was invaluable to PHD directors on move day, July 3. Aiming for his Eagle Scout badge through Scout Troop 188, Patrick organized and executed the move of numerous boxes and bags to the new building.

"Patrick really took the reins on this project. He oversaw over 30 volunteers and raised nearly \$1,700 by sending letters to friends, family and businesses to help PHD. We are proud of him and extremely pleased with how well the move turned out," says Yvonne Gardner, volunteer coordinator for PHD.

Patrick will also coordinate the move of the Baby & Maternity Closet when it moves into the new space in mid-August.

Founded over 39 years ago, PHD offers comprehensive counseling, case management and baby closet services to women who find themselves pregnant or parenting a child age 3 or younger. Counseling programs include pregnancy and decision-making, pregnancy planning, grief and loss counseling, post-adoption and post-abortion counseling. Women also have access to a variety of community based referrals, pregnancy testing, childbirth preparation, postpartum depression support and parenting education. Prevention services include programs for teens, elementary students and parents which address issues of healthy sexual relationships and character development. All counseling and support services are offered free of charge.






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
