



Beat the Winter Doldrums Attend the Seminar Series

The annual "Seminar Series" will take place in January on two dates-Tuesday, Jan. 12 and Tuesday, Jan. 19, and the public in invited to attend. Photography is the subject for both sessions with two outstanding speakers presenting lectures at the Barrington Area Library, 505 N. Northwest Highway. The presentations begin at 12:30 p.m. with light refreshments; the lectures begin at 1 p.m.

On Jan. 12, Miranda Hofelt will present "Sunlight and Shadow: The Legacy of Adams, Weston, and Cunningham." Hofelt is an adjunct lecturer for the Museum of Education at the Art Institute of Chicago and will use many photographs from the Art Institute's permanent collection in her discussion. She will focus her attention on a group of California photographers who in the 1920s began to explore the unique visions which the camera offered. Their breathtaking photographs attest to their realization of the immense potential of photography. Hofelt has worked at the Art Institute of Chicago for almost a decade. She has designed several presentations focusing on photography, obviously an area of expertise, and her comments on Jan. 12 will certainly reflect her knowledge and passion for this medium.

"The Dialogue Between Painting and Photography" is the title of the second "Seminar Series" presentation, held on Jan. 19. Cynthia Noble, an adjunct lecturer from the Art Institute's Museum of Education Department, will explore the complex relationship between photography and painting. Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act

On Nov. 21, 2009, Title II of the Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act (GINA) of 2008 took effect. Under GINA, it is illegal to discriminate against employees or applicants because of genetic information. GINA prohibits the use of genetic information in making employment decisions, restricts acquisition of genetic information by employers and other entities covered by Title II, and strictly limits the disclosure of genetic information. Genetic information includes information about an individual's genetic tests and the genetic tests of an individual's family members, as well as information about any disease, disor-



der, or condition of an individual's family members (i.e. an individual's family medical history). Family medical history is included in the definition of genetic infor-

mine whether someone has an increased for leave to care for a family member with risk of getting a disease, disorder, or condition in the future. The law forbids discrimination on the basis of genetic information when it comes to any aspect of employment, including hiring, firing, pay, job assignments, promotions, layoffs, training, fringe benefits, or any other term or condition of employment. An employer may never use genetic information to make an employment decision because genetic information doesn't tell the employer anything about someone's current ability to work. Under GINA, it is also illegal to harass or to retaliate against a person because of his or her genetic information. It will usually be unlawful for an employer to get genetic information, however, there are certain narrow exceptions to this prohibition. Inadvertent acquisitions of genetic information do not violate GINA and genetic information acquired as part of the certification process for FMLA leave (or leave under similar state or lo-

mation because it is often used to deter- cal laws), where an employee is asking a serious health condition, is allowed.

> It is unlawful for an employer to disclose genetic information about applicants or employees. Employers must keep genetic information confidential and in a separate medical file.




Cosmetic Dentistry: See and Feel the Future!

There are no crystal balls in life that can show you the future. But seeing what is possible can certainly help someone make decisions in order to change their set path. With new technology, it is now possible to see the results of a smile makeover before the dentist even starts any treatment.

Computer imaging software has worked its way into dental offices. The dentist can take an image of his patient and make a limitless amount of changes to the teeth. A completely new set of teeth can even be introduced into the image. Patients can now see what they will look like, and for the first time they can be involved in the esthetic decision.

Once the image is approved, it is e-mailed to the dental laboratory and technicians use it as a guide for creating a 3-D model. This model is then used to make temporary veneers or crowns that will fit onto the patient's teeth. Now the patient can feel what the new teeth will be like. They wear the temporary teeth home and use them so that they can determine if they like the fit and feel. The patient can even consult with friends or relatives on the appearance of their new smile. If there are any changes to be



made, the patient can advise the dentist at the next appointment. The temporary teeth can be made longer, shorter, wider, flared in and out, or whatever else is required to satisfy the patient's esthetic and phonetic requirements. Once the requirements are met, an impression is taken and sent to the dental laboratory as a guide for the final veneers or crowns.

They may sound like a lot of work, but it is the only way your dentist can guarantee a predictable result. All the hard work comes first. The payoff is being able to look in the crystal ball so you can see and feel your new smile before you actu-



Don't Let Foot Injuries Ruin **Your Fitness Resolution**

If pain or the threat of a recurring injury in your feet is getting in the way of your Happy New Year, it is time to find the help you need. Dr. James Baird is a Board Certified Podiatric Physician and Surgeon and is now accepting new patients in his Barrington office. Here is an answer to a question on injury prevention from Dr. Baird.

Last year's fitness resolution and ama stress fracture in my foot. I have resolved to get into a regular exercise routine in 2010. What can I do to avoid a similar injury?

A stress fracture is a tiny crack of the outer shell of bone, much like a crack in an egg shell. Over time these small stress cracks can progress to a full break of that bone. The symptoms of a stress fracture are pain and swelling at the site of the injury. Healing a stress fracture in the foot will likely put you in a cast boot for four weeks, which can dampen your resolu-

A stress fracture is an injury that is caused by overuse of the bone due to repetitive activity. To avoid injury when starting a new impact type of workout program, you should make sure you have proper athletic shoe gear. The best type

shoe will have better support and construction then a cross trainer or a walking shoe. There should be a finger widths space ahead of the longest toe (which may not be the biggest toe) to allow room for the feet to swell.

Since you have had a stress fracture bitious workout schedule left me with previously, you may benefit from a custom orthotic made by a podiatrist, to help your foot function more efficiently and distribute the forces more evenly across all of the bones.

> Often we will start an exercise program to quickly, trying to make up for lost time. Increasing activity levels slowly in the beginning will give your body a chance to respond to the additional stresses and allow time for your bones to strengthen. When selecting your workout routine, mixing up the activities will also help give your body time to recover. It is best not to do the same exercise every day and doing a combination of aerobic and weight training exercise is ideal.



February is a chance to convey how important regular dental checkups and proper oral hygiene are, among other things. Children's Dental Health Month was recognized nationally in 1949 and every year since. Organizations like the American Dental Association (ADA) and the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry (AAPD) have been raising awareness about oral health in chil-

One of the most important ways to avoid oral health problems is to take your child to regular, preventive dental visits. According to the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry, nearly 50 percent of children will be affected by tooth decay before age 5. Twenty-five percent of children spend their first dental visit in an emergency room. With the backing of Children's Dental Health Month, Drs. Herer and Patenio are trying to lower these numbers. Children should be seen by a pediatric dentist by their first birthday. Doing this will lead to the early detection of oral health issues and nursing bottle caries. This is when a child is put to bed with a bottle of milk or juice.

Another crucial aspect of maintaining good oral health is to limit the amount of snacking. "Junk" food is increasingly replacing well-balanced meals and nutritious food for children. A consistent amount of sugar in foods and drinks consumed by a child can destroy teeth greatly. This includes a steady flow of snacking throughout the day as well. The sugar that is con-

Drs. Paul Herer and Melissa Patenio, stantly consumed sits on the teeth and provides a food for the bacteria, which produces acid. This acid eats away at tooth enamel. According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, students between the ages of 5 and 17 missed over 1.5 million days of school because of dental problems. Much of this can be related back to snacking and poor oral hygiene. A child's diet must be monitored and snacking limited. Any between-meal snacks should be nutritious and healthy.

Children's lives are jam-packed with sports and activities, making it easy to forget about mouth safety. Each year thousands of children get injured playing a sport or participating in other activities. A hit to the face can not only injure teeth, but the lips, cheek and tongue as well. A properly fitted mouth guard is a way to prevent these kinds of injuries. It is an important piece of athletic equipment that will protect your teeth. These should be used in both contact and non-contact

Children have very busy schedules, as do parents. Keeping up with the basic, proper care for your child's teeth will prevent troubles in the future. Drs. Three Sisters Preserve Grandparents' Lakefront Legacy

The Land Conservancy (TLC) is now the proud owner of lakefront property, thanks to a generous donation by sisters Elisabeth Geraghty, Judith Uehling and Lynn Gilchrist. The land has been in the family since their grandparents purchased it in the early 1900s. Their grandfather, Henry Ericsson, was a renowned builder in Chicago, and bought the lakefront property for a summer retreat. The three sisters, who eventually inherited part of their grandparents' property, don't live in the area and wanted to donate it to an organization that would make sure it was cared for and remained in its natural state.

The land is situated on an island in Pistakee Bay, accessible by foot or car over a bridge that leads one back to a place in time when well-to-do Chicagoans would come out to escape the stress of city life. The area was historically known as "Palm Beach," and looks out across the bay to Coon Island. Because the Ericssons were the first Pistakee residents to have a telephone, they would use a megaphone to inform Coon Island resident James Pugh that he had a telephone call.

Coon Island has recently been designated as a McHenry County Natural Inventory (MCNAI) site, "Coon Island Rookery," due to its heron nesting habitat. The donated land lies within a mile of four MCNAI sites and several other state des-

ignated natural areas, including Volo Bog and Pistakee Brandenburg Bog. Over the winter, TLC will begin clearing invasive species in order to restore it to forested floodplain, providing prime habitat for a diversity of birds, mammals and amphib-







Citizens for Conservation 2009 Seed Harvest a Success

Citizens for Conservation (CFC) volunteers collected an amazing 266 pounds of seed of native plants this year. This is the weight after the seed had been cleaned, which also involved many hours of volunteer work. Quantities ranged from a high of over 48 pounds of the prolific Indian grass to trace amounts of bottle gentian. One hundred fifty different species were collected including four new species that had not been found in CFC preserves but locally in the wild. The seeds of these plants are either rare or very difficult to collect and will add diversity to CFC and other preserves as they take root and grow. The new species are swamp thistle, pale vetchling, smooth woolly panic grass, and climbing wild rose/Illinois rose.




